The Czech National Ballet will present a premiere of Bigonzetti's work Kafka: The Trial on June 13, 2019

The third premiere of the Czech National Ballet in the season 2018/2019 is a modern production created by a renowned Italian choreographer Mauro Bigonzetti. He draw inspiration from the famous novel *The Trial* (Proces) that Franz Kafka wrote in 1914. Fascinated by the irresistible language of the novel, its traumatizing plot and still valid message as well as by the visual appeal of the Orson Welles film, Bigonzetti entered the dark world of Josef K. We will present a work of art that reminds us of the personality of Franz Kafka but also resonates with current political situation in the world.

The German-speaking Bohemian Jewish writer Franz Kafka is closely connected with Prague. Genius loci of the Old Town where he spent a great part of his life had a crucial impact on his work. His letters, diaries, short stories and existential novels belong to the most influential artworks of the 20th century. Franz felt estranged from his family, his health was poor, he was tortured by doubts and lack of self-esteem. His novels reflect this inner fight and open up profound existential questions. His characters find themselves in absurd situations they cannot control, become victims hopelessly searching for their true self and sense of security.



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Kafka's Trial is monstrous. Nothing is normal there, nothing is easy. We can concentrate on the history of the origin of the novel, the style of writing, the plot or meaning – it always leads to the same conclusion: There is darkness everywhere, no matter where you look. (Reiner Stach)

Josef K. is also a victim. He is arrested but is not present at his own trial, he has no idea what the charges are about, the dark game devours him and he cannot extricate himself. In an atmosphere of madness and horror where light alternates with darkness the dancers express the agony of characters thrown in a sheer nightmare symbolizing a downfall of a man destroyed by regulations he cannot understand, rules he cannot fight.

The famous Italian choreographer Mauro Bigonzetti took the novel (one of the three novels of Franz Kafka concerned with "the tragedy of loneliness") and transformed it into a dance performance. Would you like to feel the mystery? Come to The Estates Theatre.

The character of Josef K. touched me, it talks about a man feeling lonely in the world. I saw and felt the body of this sad, alienated human being. This is what Kafka's work is about – loneliness. Not simple detachment but insurmountable inner estrangement. Doubt, superficiality, misunderstanding. Those are the themes he offers. (Mauro Bigonzetti)

Mauro Bigonzetti

He was born in Rome where he studied Opera academy. After finishing his studies he joined the Rome Opera Ballet where he spent ten years. From the season 1982/1983 he was a member of Compagnia Aterballetto, he appeared in all the important ballets and cooperated with famous choreographers such as Alvin Ailey, Glen Tetley, William Forsythe or Jennifer Muller. In 1990 he created his first choreography *Sei in movimento* accompanied by music of J. S. Bach. It was first presented at Teatro Sociale in Grassina, Italy. Bigonzetti then left Aterballetto and became a freelance artist. He collaborated with Balletto di Toscana, English National Ballet, Ballet National Marseille, Stuttgarter Ballett, Deutsche Oper Berlin, Staatsoper Dresden, Ballet Teatro Argentino, Balè da Cidade de São Paulo, Ballet Gulbenkian, Ankara State Ballet and Ballet Capitole Toulouse. He created choreographies for La Scala, Opera Rome, Arena Verona or Teatro San Carlo Naples.

From 1997 to 2007 he was artistic director of Compagnia Aterballetto and from 2016 to 2017 of La Scala Ballet.

His most significant works are *Pression, Cantata, Rossini Cards, Vespro, Les Noces, Wam, Romeo & Juliet, InCanto, Certe Notti, Le Sacre, Festa Barocca, In Vento, Oltremare, Luce Nascosta, Le Quattro Stagioni, Caravaggio, Il Concertone, La Piaf, Der Prozess, Pietra Viva, Vertigo, Alice and others.*
