Message to our Members:

Welcome to the 5th edition of the RAATSICC Focus. The last 3 months have been extremely tense for RAATSICC as we have been eagerly waiting on ministerial approval of future funding for 3 of our major programs. In the latter weeks of September we finally received GREAT news... I am pleased to inform you all that RAATSICC has been successful in securing triennial (3 year) funding for the below programs

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Family Support Service (ATSIFSS)
- Remote Indigenous Child Witnesses of Domestic Violence Support Service

We will also continue to work collaboratively with Wuchopperen Health Service to provide the Recognised Entity Service for all the remote communities in Cape York.

RAATSICC Management Committee also called a Special General Meeting this quarter to propose to members, major amendments to the RAATSICC constitution. RAATSICC members

unanimously voted in favour of adopting the proposed changes, which will now be registered with the Office of Fair Trading. Myself and senior staff will be available to current members or anyone interested in our membership and will provide detailed support in regards to any queries about our amended constitution.

Again I wish to commend the dedicated staff of RAATSICC who continued to work tirelessly in this very tense quarter.

With funding now secure for the next 3 years, I will lead our senior operational staff in the next quarter in planning our service delivery and our secretariat functions to ensure that we not only continue to be a PEAK organisation for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island children. youth and families in North Queensland but also a quality service provider. Not only will we provide and deliver quality programs but we promise to be innovated in our approach.

The workshop covered worker roles and responsibilities, record keeping and reporting, FGM / Scan requirements, RE Data Base, CSIS and RAATSICC policies and procedures. The purpose of the workshop was to improve staff productivity, provide an

opportunity to discuss challenges and develop strategies to actively improve service delivery.

RAATSICC staff also enjoyed a lunch with stakeholder's including *Queensland Health, Child Safety, Apunipima, Weipa Community Care and Napranum Council members.*

This was a great opportunity to network with other professionals involved in the human services sector.

The successful week in Weipa provided RAATSICC management with valuable feedback that will assist in the development of new and improved practices, to support staff better, both with the intention of administering more effective services

throughout the region.

MA'AATHAN WOMEN'S SHELTER, AURUKUN

"Kaath a puk min-am pi-an" (Helping to keep our women and children safe)

Shelter staff are encouraging women and children escaping domestic and family violence to access the Ma'aathan Womens Shelter, and for other community agencies to continue to refer women to the shelter.

The shelter is accessible every day of the year, including public holidays, Christmas and Easter. Shelter workers are rostered on work days from 9am to 5pm and outside of these hours are on-call.

Women accessing the shelter will be provided with case

management support to work through issues in regards to them accessing the shelter, including housing and referrals to other services.

The shelter is available again for

Recognised Entity Advisors May Kepple (Coen REA) and Monica Josiah (Kowanyama REA) travelled to RAATSICC's Cairns office 17th and 18th of September for the last Professional Development workshop of 2014. Matt King led the discussions around decisions in which the RE program are involved.

A Recognised Entity must be involved in all steps in the child protection process including:

- Intake
- Investigation and assessment of suspected child harm or risk of harm
- Suspected Child Abuse and Neglect (SCAN) team meetings
- Childrens Court processes and Court Ordered Conferences
- A child or young person's case planning including family group meetings and the development

of a cultural support plan
•Placement planning and
decision-making including
helping to identify safe and
compatible kinship carers.

A Recognised Entity must also be consulted when decisions are made about temporary changes to an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander child's or young person's case plan or cultural support plan. For example, a Recognised Entity must be consulted about changes to parental visits or the child or young person's participation in recreational or cultural activities.

The workshop was very beneficial with May, Monica and Matt sharing best practice and being more confident in providing RE service delivery.
