2026 Washington State Spring Fair Washington Junior Poultry Exposition Rules & Regulations

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PURPOSE: To provide youth (8-18) with a chance to raise a small flock of meat birds for a six (6) week period and to experience the process of rearing and selecting quality fryers such as those produced by our Washington fryer industry. Fryer chicks will be obtained through the Washington Junior Poultry Exposition. Five birds will be issued per contestant and three birds will be submitted. Sex will not be considered.

ENTRY: Please enter the contest by emailing wajrpoultryexpo@hotmail.com by January 15, 2026 to secure your place in the Fryer Contest.

JUDGING: Three (3) leg bands will be issued at exposition check-in. The birds will be weighed in to see that they meet the minimum weight of four (4) pounds each bird. Weights will be recorded for judging and payment. The judges will score the birds as blue, red or white ribbons based on the total of the scores. Blue ribbon entries will be further evaluated for special awards.

RECORD BOOKS: The record book will be judged on completeness of labor records (self & hired), mortality records, fryer management records, expense statements, feed conversion records, profit & loss statements and the project story based on the participant's growing experiences. (Project stories will be judged on accuracy, neatness, and legibility.) Typed or computer-generated records are preferred but NOT a requirement. Please put your record book in a binder or folder with brads so it is easy for the committee to page through and keep together.

POSTER: Each exhibitor is require to enter an educational poster. Posters must follow the requirements on page 14 of the 2026 Spring Fair Washington Junior Poultry Exposition Premium Guide.

BIRDSMANSHIP: All exhibitors must do two, one-hour shifts of Birdsmanship or their premiums will be withheld. Each shift requires two exhibitors, plus a parent, leader, or instructor. Sign up will be at Coop-In unless contacted by the manager prior.

Profit & Loss statements should be calculated based on \$1.25 per pound. Extra credit is available for books that include photography and expense receipts.

0- 10 pts. Feed conversion rate @ 28 days
0- 10 pts. Feed conversion rate @ 43 days

100 pts. Total — Final Judging (Heaviest entry used to break ties.)

CHAMPION AWARDS:

Fryer scores and record book scores will be weighted in judging, respectively.

EXPOSITION RULES:

- 1. Fryer contracts must be returned to Washington Junior Poultry with the record book on 4/16/2026 at Vet Check.
- 2. All chicks will be ordered and paid for by Washington Junior Poultry.
- 3. Contest participants will sign an agreement stating that he/she will abide by the rules of the exposition, and if unable to submit three (3) six (6) week-old-fryers acceptable for the commercial market (at a minimum weight of four (4) pounds per bird), he/she will reimburse the exposition a fee in the amount of \$25 to cover chick expenses.

- 4. All chicks will be picked up on the date that is emailed to the contestants.
- 5. Record books will be provided and must be submitted with the entry Vet Check. All forms should be completed in an accurate, legible manner.
- 6. Fryers and record books will be judged separately.
- 7. Birds with lice or mites in poor condition or dirty will be rejected. Wash and dust your birds 14 days before show date.
- 8. Judging will be broken into age group categories: 4H Cloverbuds, 4H Juniors, 4H Intermediates, 4H Seniors, FFA grades 9-10, FFA grades 11-12 and Youth Open Class.
- 9. Points to consider when selecting birds for judging:
 - Uniformity Select birds that weigh the same (within 1/4 pound), with same body type.
 - Size Pick the three largest birds.
 - Health & Vigor Select birds that are healthy with bright red combs, yellow shanks, bright eyes and free from any visible signs of respiratory trouble.
 - Conformation Select birds with broad, long, well rounded and well-fleshed breasts, with plump, meaty legs (thigh & drumsticks). Birds with crooked, dimpled, blistered or bruised breasts should not be considered for competition entry.
 - Fleshing birds should be well fleshed and have good fat covering. The skin should be yellow, soft and pliable.
 - Feathering Select birds well covered with feathers.
 - Defects Select birds with no evidence of skin tears, scratches, calluses or broken bones.

Frequently Asked Questions

What should I include in my project story?

✓ Take notes throughout the project and use these observations to help write your project story. The notes that you take should be written on the "notes" pages in the record book and should include what you saw and learned throughout the growing period. The project story should be written on separate paper and entered with the record book.

What else do I need to include in the record book?

✓ Be sure to keep track of feed and other supplies purchased for the birds, and also record the time that it takes to care for your flock. There are appropriate forms in the book for this information. Be sure that your book is complete when you turn it in at the show, including signatures from your parents and your leader/teacher, when required. If you include photography and receipts, you will be eligible for extra credit.

When do I weigh the birds?

✓ Weigh your birds on April 2 to calculate the 28 day feed conversion. Then, weigh your birds right before coming to the show on April 13 or 14 and use these weights for the 43 day feed conversion. The birds will also be weighed and checked by a veterinarian when you check in at the show.

When do I bring my birds and record book to the fryer show?

- \checkmark Bring your birds and record books to Barn A to Vet Check. Vet Check will take place at Barn A on Thursday, 4/16, from 7 am − 10 am.
- ✓ Each exhibitor is required to participate in three birdsmanship duties during the show. Birdsmanship duties are assigned in shifts, and the sign-up sheet is available when you check in.

Who should I ask if I have more questions?

To Calculate Feed Conversion Rate:

Multiply the number of live birds at the end of project by the average bird weight (of 3 birds) to determine the total live pounds; then calculate feed used to date. Divide total pounds of feed used by total live bird weight to find pounds of feed per pound of weight gain (Feed Conversion Rate).

Record this information on the Fryer Contest Score Card in the back of the book.
