09:00 - 10:00	Session 1: Ten Years Later – Reflections on the High-Level Panel Report <p>This opening session will set the tone for the conference by revisiting the landmark High-Level Panel (HLP) Report on Illicit Financial Flows from Africa, a decade after its release. The report, chaired by H.E. President Thabo Mbeki, marked a turning point in Africa's understanding and framing of illicit financial flows—not merely as a technical issue, but as a political, developmental, and justice imperative. This session will offer a retrospective lens to reflect on the report's legacy: what progress has been made over the past ten years, what structural and political obstacles remain, and how the HLP's findings reshaped African and global discourse on tax justice, transparency, and financial accountability.</p>

14:00 - 15:30	<p>Session 3: Decolonising the Global Financial Architecture: Charting a New Economic Future</p> <p>This session will explore the deep structural imbalances in the current global financial architecture and their implications for development and sovereignty in Africa and the Global South. It will focus on the institutions, rules, and ideologies that underpin the system—and propose alternative pathways grounded in justice, equity, and economic transformation using the global tax system as a case study. As we reflect on a decade since the High-Level Panel Report, this session challenges us to think beyond reform at the margins and towards a fundamental reimaging of how global finance serves people and planet.</p>

16:00 - 17:00	<p>Session 4: Rethinking Domestic Resource Mobilization</p> <p>This session takes a critical look at the way taxation and domestic resource mobilisation are usually understood—as though they are interchangeable concepts that both refer to raising tax revenues that are needed to fund public priorities. This approach overlooks one important reality: that the state, through its central bank, is the monopoly issuer of a nation’s currency. It also obscures the true role of taxation in the colonial experience and its enduring effects. This conversation will explore why a deeper understanding of taxation and DRM, and the difference between them, is essential if Africa is to achieve true economic sovereignty and prosperity.</p>

08:30 - 10:30	<p>Session 5: Fiscal Sovereignty and Industrial Ambition: Reclaiming Tax Policy for Africa’s Transformation</p> <p>This session will explore how tax policy can be a strategic tool to support Africa’s industrialisation and structural transformation, rather than only as a revenue-raising mechanism. It will examine fiscal frameworks that can promote value addition, regional production chains, and economic diversification. It will also critically assess current practices and their alignment (or misalignment) with long-term industrial policy goals, while offering insights into how fiscal space can be used to nurture domestic industries and reduce dependence on raw commodity exports. It will also address the domestic and international political economy challenges that such uses of tax policy might encounter.</p>



Having explored urgent and intersecting challenges, the session will ask: If Africa continues on its current trajectory, where will the continent's tax justice agenda be in ten years? What must we do differently politically, institutionally, and collectively to realise the vision of Agenda 2063. The goal is not only to imagine the future, but to actively shape it together.</p>
