This resource explores what school is like in Japan for you to see how similar or different it is to your day.



The school day (Monday to Friday, most schools do Saturday mornings too)

Before school

- Bike or train to school
- Clean the school (including classroom, hallway and bathrooms)

At school

- 9:00 3:30 with a lunch break
- Classrooms are basic, with blackboards and little technology
- No laptops

After school

- Bukatsu (clubs)
- Juku (cram school)
- Home
- Study









Before school

- All students bike or train to school from a young age, often alone or with siblings.
- They may have to take multiple trains and go through complex stations
- Trains are very busy at rush hour
- Students clean the school every day and help to serve lunch as well



At school

- Students stay in the same classroom (teachers move)
- One course for all (no choice)
- Core PE for all
- Strong academic focus with exams to pass each year and move on
- Japanese, Mathematics, Foreign Language, Science, Social Sciences, PE, Health
- Students have multiple pairs of shoes and slippers for different surfaces at school.
















PE at school

- All students do PE from Year 1-12
- 2-3 hours per week
- Topics
 - Budo (martial arts)
 - Gymnastics
 - Swimming (²/₃ of schools have pools)
 - Ball games
 - Athletics
 - Fitness
- Very skill-based there is a textbook, you have to pass
- No "academic" PE

After school

Bukatsu and/or Juku


- Students choose one club (sport or otherwise and stick with that choice throughout high school).
- They train for 2-3 hours each day for tournaments rather than weekly competition.
- Training is drill-based with lots of massed practice.
- Juku cram school to help with preparation for exams.
- Then bike or train home and do homework / more study.

- What do you think happens to Japanese young people's physical activity when they leave school?


