

3-STEP GUIDE TO CREATING A MINIATURE JAPANESE ROCK GARDEN

BEFORE YOU START - GO ON A SCAVENGER HUNT

- 1. Write a list of the things you will need to find from around your house and outside.
- 2. Take a photograph of all the things you collect on your scavenger hunt (or draw a picture).

Look for:

- 1 container, lid, plate or dish to make your garden on
- Rocks and stones
- Twigs and bark
- Something green
- For your sea base, choose ONE of the following:
 - Traditional: you need sand or salt AND a fork
 - Towel: you need a small blue towel, or cloth
 - Paper: you need a piece of paper AND a blue pencil or marker.
- Optional extras: Toilet paper roll, scissors, pencils, paper, sellotape or Blu-Tack.

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STEP 1: MAKE A BASE FOR YOUR GARDEN

To make a base for your garden, you will need to choose one of the options below and follow the instructions.

For step 1 you will need:

- Something to make your garden in such as a container, lid, plate or dish.
- For your sea base, choose ONE of the following:
 - Sand/salt and a fork
 - Small blue cloth/towel
 - A piece of paper and blue pencil/marker.

Sand or salt base

- 1. Get your container, lid, plate or dish.
- 2. Fill it with sand or salt. Check with an adult first that it is okay for you to use sand or salt.
- 3. Grab your fork; hold it so it is facing backwards. Then slowly drag it across your sand or salt to create a swirling ocean pattern.
- 4. Take a photo or draw a picture of you garden so far at step 1.

Note: If you use salt, it will absorb moisture from the air and become hard after 1-2 days.

Towel or cloth base

- 1. Get your container, lid, plate or dish.
- 2. Grab your blue towel or cloth.
- 3. Place it inside your container
- 4. Make a ripple in the fabric to look like the waves lapping in the ocean.

Hint: You can place small twigs under your towel to create the effect of water.

5. Take a photo or draw a picture of you garden so far at step 1.

Paper base

- 1. Get your container, lid, plate or dish.
- 2. Grab a piece of paper to fit your container.
- 3. Colour the paper in blue.
- 4. Draw swirls or waves to represent the ocean.
- 5. Place the paper into your container.
- 6. Take a photo or draw a picture of you garden so far at step 1.

Note: scissors may come in handy if you wish to trim your paper.

STEP 2: CREATE YOUR GARDEN

To create your miniature Japanese rock garden, follow the instructions below.

For step 2 you will need:

- Rocks and stones
- Something green
- Twigs or bark (optional)
- 1. Chose an odd number of rocks and stones such as 3, 5 or 7 to create a more natural look.
- 2. Place the rocks and stones in your garden to represent islands.
- 3. Check that you have left some free space in your garden. You don't want it to be too full.
- 4. Take a photo or draw a picture of your garden so far at step 2.

Hint: As an extra feature you can create a pile of stones by balancing them on top of each other.

Handy tip: In traditional Japanese rock gardens, the stones represent mountains and waterfalls.

STEP 3: GET CREATIVE - ADD A JAPANESE TWIST

To add a Japanese element to your rock garden, follow the instructions below.

For step 3 these items may be useful, but feel free to use anything you wish:

- Twigs, bark or extra stones
- Toilet paper roll and paper
- Pencils, scissors, sellotape or Blu-Tack
- 1. Decide on something Japanese you would like to include in your garden, such as a temple or shrine, lantern, gate or something of your choice.
- 2. Be creative and make your 'something Japanese'.
- 3. Place your 'something Japanese into your garden'.
- 4. Check that you have left some free space in your garden. You don't want it to be too full.
- 5. Make any final changes.
- 6. Well done you did it! Take a photo or draw a picture of your miniature Japanese rock garden at step 3.

Hint: You can use a toilet paper roll and cardboard to create a temple or shrine, or draw a lantern on paper and stick it to a twig.

RELAX IN YOUR GARDEN

Now all the hard work is done, you can relax in your miniature Japanese rock garden.

Follow the steps below, or relax as you wish:

- Place your garden on a table or desk.
- Sit and look at your garden.
- Imagine the water moving, or the waves splashing around your islands.
- You can move objects around in your garden.
- You can use your fork to gently drag it across your garden base to create a motion of gentle waves.

When you feel like taking a break, you can look at your garden and move objects around to relax.

BE A TIDY KIWI

Once you have finished using your garden, tidy up.

- Return the rocks, stones, twigs, and bark back to nature.
- Recycle your cardboard and paper where possible.
- You may need to ask an adult to help you tidy up the sand or salt.
- Wash and dry the container you used.
