

Suicide Data: Connecticut



Suicide is a public health problem and leading cause of death in the United States. Suicide can also be prevented – more investment in suicide prevention, education, and research will prevent the untimely deaths of thousands of Americans each year. Unless otherwise noted, this fact sheet reports 2022 data from the CDC, the most current verified data available at time of publication (May 2024).

81% of communities did not have enough mental health providers to serve residents in 2023, according to federal guidelines.

Almost **four times** as many people died by suicide than in alcohol related motor vehicle accidents in 2021.

The total deaths to suicide reflected a total of **7,350 years** of potential life lost (YPLL) before age 65.

52% of firearm deaths were suicides.

33% of all suicides were by firearms.
