

Establish a Voluntary Firearm Do-Not-Sell List

Firearms are the most common and most lethal method of suicide. To reduce deaths by suicide, AFSP urges states to allow individuals to **voluntarily and reversibly suspend their own ability to purchase firearms** as a protection against future impulsive firearm suicide attempts.

The Facts



Firearms account for **over half** of suicide deaths¹



Suicide risk is exacerbated by **ready access to firearms** or other lethal means^{2,3}



46% of psychiatric patients and **22%** of Veterans surveyed said they would sign up for a Do-Not-Sell list^{4,5}

AFSP Recommendations

- **Require a cooling-off period of at least 7 days between receipt and execution of a removal request**
- **Provide a mechanism for enrollees to relinquish personal firearms**
- **Promote simple ways to be added and removed, e.g., via an online portal, healthcare providers**

Background

- Putting time and distance between a person at risk and lethal means can save lives; this allows time for the suicidal risk to subside and for someone to intervene with mental health support and resources⁶
- 85-90% of suicide attempts with a firearm are fatal; by reducing suicide attempts by firearms, lives can be saved^{7,8}
- Most individuals who are prevented from making a suicide attempt via one method typically do not go on to attempt with another method; if they do substitute another method, it will likely be less lethal⁹
- Individuals with firearm access are no more likely to have suicidal thoughts than those without firearm access; however, at-risk individuals with access to firearms in the home are much more likely to use a firearm than those without¹⁰
- Like designating a medical power of attorney, waiving one's right to purchase a firearm offers a safe way to plan for possible impairments in future decision making¹¹
- This concept has been successfully enacted in Utah, Virginia, and Washington, and introduced as legislation in over half of states

The Voluntary Firearm Do-Not-Sell List empowers individuals to make the personal decision to protect themselves in the event of a future suicidal crisis.
