



- A Community Health Worker (CHW) is a frontline public health professional who serves as a bridge between healthcare services and the community.
- Provide education, advocacy, and support to help individuals particularly in underserved communities.

IMPACT ON PUBLIC HEALTH

Chronic Disease Management



- Improve outcomes for diseases like diabetes, hypertension, or asthma through ongoing education and monitoring
- Reduce hospital readmission & ER visits by promoting self-care and adherence to care plans

Maternal & Child Health



- Support prenatal care, healthy pregnancies, infant wellness
- Increase immunization rates, promote breastfeeding, help new mothers access needed services/support

Health Equity & Access



- Help reduce disparties by connecting communities with healthcare, insurance, and social services
- o Increase preventative care utilization by education

Infectious Disease Prevention



- o CHWs are instrumental in testing, education, outreach
- o Vital to HIV, TB, STI prevention education efforts

Mental & Behavioral Health



- Reduce stigma and connect people to services
- Specialized training allows CHWs to identify early signs and provide support

Social Determinants of Health



 Address non-medical factors that are known to affect health: housing, food, transportation, employment

Community Resilience & Preparedness



- Build trust within communities and increase community engagement in public health programs
- Improves health literacy, allowing individuals to take control of their own health
