Research Facilitation

OSGA Research Director 2015-16 to 2017-18

As part of my post I conducted at 30-45minute with almost all academic members of OSGA (48 interviews in total) about their research experiences in OSGA. I wrote a report as a result of this information gathered which argued for five priorities for OSGA (available on request). These were, to target efforts with research assistance to early career academics, better focused and more pro-active targeting of research funding opportunities to OSGA colleagues, to given more early assistance with planning research impact strategies, to set up research clusters, initially across OSGA and later to connect OSGA to the wider University, to target assistance from the Research Director, Research Officer and Social Science Research team from the early stages of a research bid. These recommendations were largely implemented.

I set up eight research clusters in OSGA, I organized and chaired an introductory meeting for each <https://www.area-studies.ox.ac.uk/research-clusters>

During my time as research director, I worked closely with the OSGA Research Officer to give targeted assistance for all post-doc applications. We sometimes read and commented on three drafts of post-doc funding applications and received outside expert advice. The effort was successful and OSGA gained a significant increase in post-doc positions during my time as Research Director. I worked closely (weekly meetings) with the OSGA Research Officer to devise strategies to increase the research income of the department. Instead of sending out long summaries of research funding available we targeted funding calls based on individuals areas of research expertise/ interest, we organised workshops to explain funding opportunities (such as for the Fell Fund, Leverhulme, Global Challenges Research Fund among others), we proof read and commented on numerous drafts of all funding applications. The research income of OSGA changed from a declining trend before my hire, to £326,000 in 2015-16 to £528,000, in 2017-18 and £822,000 in 2017-18.

Technology Use and Women's Employment in the Textile Sector of Pakistan.

Capacity building with the Governments of Sindh and the Punjab (Pakistan): Data collection, data analysis and evidence-led policy making

I was the Principal Investigator. In collaboration with the Technology Centre at the Lahore School of Economics, we conducted a 400-firm survey of factories across the Pakistani provinces of the Punjab and Sindh in 2018-19. This survey was combined with an earlier (2015) survey which allowed us to construct time-series panel data and see how the textile sector had evolved over time. This survey focused on reasons for the relative absence of female employment in the Pakistani textile sector and also on the economic constraints to technology adoption in Pakistan including technology costs, interest rates, availability of bank credit, links with suppliers, and market

The research included capacity building workshops for government statisticians and officials, the design of a customised app for an I-pad for the fieldworkers, and several dissemination workshops to share our results with policymakers. This research influenced policymakers and influential business groups in their thinking about adoption of technology in Pakistani textile firms.
