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# Welcome

Knology was not immune to the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic crisis. As we write this introduction, we count ourselves fortunate that our organization, staff, Board, and fellows continued to survive (and even thrive), even though no one was left untouched by the tragedy. We began the year with a clear plan of growth across our portfolio. While we had to adjust and adapt as the pandemic progressed, we are grateful that with the hard work of our team, the perseverance of our partners, and the assistance provided by the government's PPP program, we have emerged from this past year well-positioned to continue our mission of producing practical social science for a better world.

In retrospect, it is notable how one of our studies of news media hinted at the severity of the looming pandemic. In February 2020, we analyzed hundreds of news stories for our Meaningful Math project with PBS NewsHour. Over one-fourth of the stories focused on COVID-19: the rapidly changing scientific information about the virus itself, its economic impacts across the globe, and case and death counts across multiple continents. The first wave of the pandemic in the United States found our entire team and the Board of Trustees in quarantine, engaged in emergency planning, and reenvisioning our projects. That planning and federal government support made survival possible. Our shift to remote work itself was relatively smooth because we had incorporated virtual collaboration into our practice for the past few years.

Many of our partners that provide direct public service were closed in early spring 2020. The crisis meant that more than half of our projects were restructured in a few weeks in early spring 2020, and some simply shelved or canceled. Thanks to our collaborative process, we found new ways to work with many of our partners to help them move forward and minimize all of our losses.

We would be remiss if we didn't draw attention to the Black Lives Matter movement that gained worldwide momentum in 2020. In addition to our own statement of solidarity with BLM issued by our Board, we gathered scholarly contributions on the significance of BLM in museums for the peer-reviewed journal we operate, supported interventions in the refugee crises, and worked to support a front-line team dealing with food security in Rwanda.

We could not have survived 2020 without the generosity of our donors. When the quarantine was announced, we had just completed upgrades to our New York office thanks to the generous gift of furniture from Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom LLP. Thanks to legal support teams including Proskauer Rose LLP and Davis Wright Tremaine

LLP, we ended the year with our intellectual property and trademarks secure, and a generous donation from GFP Real Estate ensured we could retain our New York office.

With viable vaccines being deployed as the year closed, we all look forward to a 2021 recovery, working alongside one another in person, sitting in new chairs and an upgraded office, and teaming up with our partners to make the post-pandemic world a better place.

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## **Critical Thinking**

Use diverse perspectives to challenge the status quo and navigate the great social issues of our time.

Today's complex problems require a clear-sighted understanding of their root causes and smart, evidence-based solutions. To meet this need, Knology was created to use transdisciplinary research that draws on multiple perspectives to untangle problems. This year, we dug in and delivered on this promise by studying increasingly urgent social issues, from confidence in the news media, to institutions' approaches to identity, to the politics and potential for using statistics.

#### The Numbers in the News Initiative

How do audiences and journalists understand and use statistics? With funding from the National Science Foundation, we're working with the PBS NewsHour to study how people think about numbers in news stories, and whether different ways of reporting on numbers improve public understanding of statistics. This research will give us insight into trustworthiness of the news and what this means for critical issues like public health. Read about Numbers in the News >>

#### **Emerging Research on Identity & Museums**

With funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, we led a project called Emerging Research on Identity & Museums. Our team examined graduate-level research to reveal how museums are addressing identity across the U.S. We also led the first-ever *Curator*-Knology Writing Scholars Workshop, a professional development program for emerging museum professionals. ## Inform & Shape Action

Equip leaders with social science research for evidence-based decisions and meaningful action.

At Knology, we produce social science research that is practical. We want leaders in government, business, non-profits, and philanthropy to have actionable research that can make the difference in their programs. To accomplish this goal, we publish open-access, approachable stories to guide decision-making. We are also committed to research transparency through our archives, National Science Digital Library, and other public databases. This year, our work helped shape science learning, news media, and libraries.

#### Building the Case for Trust and STEM Learning in Zoos & Aquariums

With funding from the National Science Foundation, Knology and partners studied the STEM learning ecology and where zoos and aquariums fit into the landscape. We won an award in the 2020 STEM for All Video Showcase for a 3-minute film about our findings. In 2020, we continued to strengthen these principles across our projects and our institutional commitments.

#### **Black Lives Matter**

As protests of racism took hold throughout the United States and the world in 2020, Knology reflected on how our team could address injustices. Our Board and staff released a statement condemning racist violence and oppression. This statement directed attention to the history of suppressing the voices of Black and African American scholars in the social sciences. #### **Education in the Pandemic & Computational Thinking**

With funding from the Department of Education, we led an interview study of educators across the country to understand the uncertainties facing teachers, students, and families as the pandemic continued to unfold throughout 2020. ## Strengthen Alliances

Invest in people and organizations working toward a common good.

At Knology, we embrace and promote alliances that expand notions of the possibilities for solving complex social issues. Oftentimes, these partnerships are unusual -- by tapping into the expertise of diverse organizations and thinkers, we're able to shift the needle on intractable problems. In 2020, we kept up this tradition with our partners, funders, and among our team members. These stories capture the power of alliances that bring together good ideas and people, especially during times of crisis.

#### **Designing a Research-Driven Award Competition**

Our exploratory research and gap analysis led to the first-of-its-kind UL Innovative Education Award competition for nonprofits. This initiative was born out of a partnership between Underwriters Laboratories, an international safety science organization, an environmental education association, and our social science think tank. ## Research Fellows: Systems that Work for Societies & Early Care to Reduce Health Care Costs

Research Fellows are a vital part of Knology's team of experts. Erwin de Leon published on the ways that the pandemic and BLM protests underscored the importance of people who were previously invisible in U.S. systems, especially immigrant communities. He advocated for further study of the network of institutions that support these groups, to understand and improve the systems that can enable people to flourish in this country. ## Refine Our Model

Cultivate our collaborative philosophy to make our model resilient and replicable.

Knology's model is unconventional: we think applied research can be dynamic in a shifting landscape, customized to the context, and independently minded. This model gave partners, funders, and our own organization the flexibility to navigate the tumult of 2020. We feature three types of applied research that excelled this year: a research partnership that improved a professional association's capacity to use data, a localized initiative in Los Angeles, and a federally funded research project with a news organization.

#### How a Research Partnership Informs the Work of a Sector

In collaboration with the Association of Children's Museums, Knology publishes ACM Trends Reports, a research-focused publication series for museum professionals. Since 2016, the Trends Reports series has helped this field identify patterns in their sector and plan for large-scale shifts. In 2020, we studied the impacts of the pandemic on the museum field and provided essential analysis through the Trends Reports. ## **Financial Stability**

The onset of the pandemic in the US in March 2020 found nearly half of our work suspended, accompanied by a vast round of staff furloughs among our valued partners, as well as the loss of participants and programs we were studying. But the Knology team was resilient, leveraging the techniques and technologies we developed for remote work prior to the pandemic.

Knology successfully navigated the initial financial turmoil of March 2020. Thanks to the efficient work of our Board of Trustees' Finance Committee and our finance team, we secured a CARES Act Paycheck Protection Program loan to support a return to full time work within a month of the shut down. Our team also secured funding to research public understanding about the pandemic, using our skills to help in the crisis.

As a result of some very nimble work by our staff and supporters, we were also able to rethink our work plans for a new reality, ending 2020 in a sound fiscal position, ready to take on the next wave of financial challenges in the coming years. These final numbers do not reflect the terrifying ups and downs of spring 2020, but the result demonstrates that our organization remains financially stable and has the staff skills and capacity to weather the most violent of tempests to rock our economy.






# Distribution of **Functional Expenses**
