WRITING A DIAMANTE POEM

A diamante poem is a poem that makes the shape of a diamond.

For this type of diamante poem, you will need to decide on a topic -- which needs to be a **noun** -- and then to think of other words that mean the same thing, called **synonyms**.

Rules for writing a Diamante poem

A diamante poem has some rules that help to make sure it makes the shape of a diamond! Use the guide and the table below to create your own diamante poem.

- 1. Diamantes are seven lines long.
- 2. The first and seventh lines have one noun.
- 3. The second and sixth lines have two adjectives.
- 4. The third and fifth lines have three verbs.
- 5. The fourth line has four nouns.



A **noun** is a word for **a person place thing or idea**. For example, Vivian, Melbourne car or kindness.

Synonyms are words that **means the same thing** or **nearly the same thing**. For example, happy, cheerful, merry & joyful.

An **adjective** provides more information about a **noun**, which means it tells us about things like size, shape, colour, and more. Adjectives tell us whether a thing--a monster for example--is *horrible or beautiful*, *enormous or tiny*, *friendly* or *fearsome*.

Verbs are words that show actions, motions, doing, or states of being. For example, the monster *went* for a walk, then it *shuffled* its feet, and then it *screamed* and *kicked*.
