Overview

In Kenya, 1 in every 4 children have experienced some form of violence, translating to 8 million of the 24 million children. The primary focus of Terre des Hommes Netherlands is on curbing sexual exploitation of children, child labour and child trafficking and unsafe migration. Kenya is a source, transit and destination country for human trafficking. One-third of all trafficking victims is a child, mostly trafficked for sexual exploitation.

We work with communities, government, private sector, civil society organisations and children themselves, at the centre, to address systemic and structural drivers that expose children to exploitation. As such, we support children to access education among other skills development to enhance their opportunities to live a decent and dignified life, we build the capacity of communities and local structures to effectively prevent, detect, report and respond to child exploitation, we purpose to address systemic and structural drivers of child exploitation, and we collaborate with other actors to influence strengthening of the legal and policy environment for better promotion and protection of children rights.

Children's voices

"I am in a better place today. The teachers and my club members are always around to guide and help me meet my basic needs."

Following the passing of his father, Emoit was taken to live with his paternal uncle as his mother was unable to meet his basic needs. He faced many hardships in his life and longed to be reunited with his mother. Unfortunately, things got worse for him and he started harvesting sand. He eventually engaged in criminal activities which almost cost him his life. Luckily, he was rescued and referred to the Child Protection Volunteer (CPV). With support from the JOFA project, Emoit was integrated back into school and joined the child rights club where he benefited from the sensitisation forums. He received emotional support from the peer network and gradually developed a stronger sense of self-confidence.

"I am grateful for the support offered to me by Kesho Kenya and TdH NL. I was able to get educational support, counselling sessions and dignity packs."

18-year-old Zawadi lives in a small village in Kwale County. Poverty and her mother's illness forced her to drop out of school in order to supplement her family's income, which made her vulnerable and she ended up being sexually exploited. Luckily, she was identified and supported through the Building a Future Project. She was provided with counselling and psychosocial support as well as essential amenities. She was also enrolled at a vocational training institute, enabling her to acquire valuable skills for her future.
