Overview

In Uganda, Terre des Hommes Netherlands works on preventing child sexual exploitation, child trafficking and unsafe migration, the worst forms of child labour and violence against children. Lack of educational opportunities coupled with poverty lead to numerous incidences of child exploitation.

Child sexual exploitation is one of the most complex forms of exploitation which is quite persistent, in the major urban centres and along the main transport and transit routes. Most domestic trafficking victims are children from the Karamoja region, exploited in forced begging and commercial sex in the capital Kampala and beyond. More in general, children are expected to contribute to the family income, making hazardous labour in agriculture one of the most common forms of child exploitation.

In addressing these issues, we work together with local civil society organisations. We do not only offer direct help to exploited children and children at risk, but collaborate with duty bearers from the local to the national level, to achieve an improved environment for children to grow up in.



Sadly, she was exploited by her employer and ran to the streets when her situation turned out to be overwhelming. Luckily, she was repatriated back home, safely reintegrated with her family and is currently being supported to set up her salon business.

lan (11 years) was abandoned by his mother at the age of three. His polgymous father would take him to live with his different stepmothers. They mistreated him and he was forced to seek refuge at his grandmother's house. Sadly, he lost his way and ended up on the streets of Uganda.He was identified by our project team, rescued, rehabilitated and taken back home.
