There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463/511; August, 510/509; September, 566/563; October, 628/652; November 622.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.

To St. Teresa of Avila Parishioners,

The Church will celebrate World Day if the Poor during the weekend of November 17th-18th. This is a great opportunity for all parishioners to support our outreach ministries to the poor, the homeless and the refugee. As you bring an item to Mass, please bring it up and place it around our Altar of the Dead during the Presentation of the Gifts. In this way, we are "offering" to God a gift to help His Poor. In helping the Poor, we help Christ. In Spanish, the Altar of the Dead is frequently called the "ofrenda," which means "offering." When we love as Christ loves, our very lives become an "offering" to Him, transforming the world in which we live. Sacrifice leads to new life. How can we "offer" this Advent to Christ as a parish community?

The collections and attendance are up, thanks to your dedication and love of our Parish. The greatest "treasure "we have as a Parish is the Poor we reach out to through food distribution, hot meals, Night Ministry, and La Posada Mission to refugees and immigrants. Treasures From Tradition

Veterans Day began with the signing of a symbolic treaty between the Allies and Germany ending World War I (then called the "Great War") on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The auspicious date was actually a well-established religious holiday, the feast of Saint Martin of Tours, a beloved soldier saint of the army of Rome. After World War II, Armistice Day was changed to Veterans Day in the United States and Remembrance Day in Britain, but of course the feast of Saint Martin endures.

Martin was named after Mars, the god of war, and against the advice of his parents he went on his own to church. He became a catechumen at the age of ten. By fifteen he was enlisted in the cavalry in France. Coming across a poor man, Martin had an impulse to divide his bright red soldier's cape and clothe him. He later had the insight that he had served Christ, and the other half of his cape became a lifelong sign to him of his duty to serve the poor. Housed in a tiny church capella or "chapel," the cape became a great object of pilgrimage on the way to Compostella, and a favored place for the prayers of soldiers. Martin was not so eager to serve as bishop as he had been as a soldier, and legend says that he hid in a barn filled with geese to avoid episcopal election. To this day, the customary meal for November 11 is goose! Traditionally, this is the last feast day before winter closes in, and begins a period of fasting once known as "Saint Martin's Lent" or "Martinmas," that later developed into the season of Advent.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

No es la dignidad del cura que importa sino, la generosidad de Cristo que desea estar con sus fieles. Uno de estos fieles, el joven uruguayo Walter Elías Chango Rondeau, (19211939) en sus pocos años de vida encontró consuelo en el hecho de que Dios se entrega a sí mismo en la comunión.

Según testigos, Walter animaba a sus

compañeros a la reconciliación y la Eucaristía. Hablaba tan elocuentemente del Santísimo Sacramento, que parecía sacerdote. Siendo laico, él supo ejercer su sacerdocio bautismal.

The Call to Discipleship

The core vocation in the Gospel of Mark is the vocation, or call, to discipleship. Today's Gospel passage provides us with one last example of what the vocation to discipleship means, and one example of what it doesn't mean. A destitute widow shows us that discipleship means following Jesus' way of service,

even if it requires giving one's livelihood (or life). The scribes show us by their bad example that discipleship should entail a vocation to extend God's care to those who are most in need.

In our reading from the book of Kings another widow and her son are close to death. They too give what little they have, but they are rewarded by Elijah with food enough for a year. And the reading from the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us that Jesus sacrificed his life "to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him" (Hebrews 9:28).

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Llamados a Ser Discípulos

La vocación central en el Evangelio según san Marcos es la vocación, o el llamado de ser discípulos. El pasaje del Evangelio de hoy nos brinda por lo menos un ejemplo de qué significa la vocación de ser discípulo y un ejemplo de lo que no significa. Una viuda pobre nos muestra que ser un buen discípulo significa seguir el camino de

servicio de Jesús, incluso si implica entregar todo lo que tenemos para vivir (o incluso nuestra vida). Los letrados nos muestran con su mal ejemplo que ser un buen discípulo implica la vocación de hacer llegar el cuidado de Dios a los más necesitados.

En nuestra lectura del libro de los Reyes otra viuda y su hijo corren peligro de morir. Ellos también entregan lo poco que tienen, pero son recompensados por Elías con comida suficiente para un año. Y la lectura de la carta a los hebreos nos recuerda que Jesús sacrificó su vida "para salvación de aquellos que lo aguardan" (Hebreos 9:28).

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Today's Readings

The Extraordinary in the Ordinary

It was a warm afternoon in the Holy Land when I experienced the extraordinariness of Jesus' teaching. Walking around Capernaum, our guide called our attention to a large, weedlike plant, which he identified as a mustard tree. Seeing this plant literally overgrown and present everywhere, I could imagine the kingdom of God as Jesus describes it — a tiny mustard seed that spreads and overtakes all in its path. We walked further and came across an ancient, heavy concrete object.

Our guide identified this object as a millstone — used in Jesus' time to grind wheat. As I gazed at this millstone, I could hear Jesus' voice warning me not to let any children stumble, or it would be better to have a large millstone placed around my neck and be thrown into the sea. The mustard seed and the millstone meant something to the disciples then, and having seen them, they meant something more to me now.

The extraordinariness of Jesus' teaching was that he used ordinary things and ordinary situations to teach his people then, and he uses ordinary things and ordinary situations to teach his people today.

Which brings us to today's Gospel. Mark begins by telling us that Jesus is standing in the Temple area, which we know was a place of great activity. Imagine what it must have been like that day: Jesus, standing in a group of disciples, people bustling about. In the midst of this activity, Jesus spots a group of religious leaders, perhaps walking quickly — as important people are always walking quickly — sporting their fancy robes and warmly greeting each other, but too busy or too important to greet the common people. Jesus, aware of the teachable moment right in front of them, turns his gaze back to his disciples and warns them not to be like those leaders, who looked so good on the outside, but whose hearts were cold on the inside, cold enough, in fact, to "devour the houses of widows." Then, Mark's Gospel tells us Jesus sits directly across from the treasury receptacles into which worshippers placed their offerings. As Jesus sits there and watches the people make

Jesus used ordinary things and ordinary situations to teach his people then, and he uses ordinary things and ordinary situations to teach his people today. their offering in the treasury, he notices a group of rich people putting in large amounts of money. Can you hear the "cha-ching, cha-ching" as the many coins of the rich people rush down the metal receptacles? Can you feel their sense of pride at the sound those coins make, indicating the size of their great offering? And then Jesus sees a poor widow approach and place her two small coins into the treasury. No fanfare. No cha-ching but a simple, dull "clinkclink."

It seems worth noting that, unlike today's first reading, there is no reward for this poor widow. Jesus does not heal her or reverse her poverty. He does not even speak to her. Rather, Jesus uses this everyday occurrence, with which his disciples would have been quite familiar, as an opportunity to teach. He simply, but profoundly, points out the difference between the poor widow and all the others, noting the greater value of her offering in which she has given her whole livelihood. Indeed, she has surrendered all she has.

And I wonder... when the risen Christ walks around with me today, in the ordinariness of my life, gazing at my calendar, my checkbook, my credit card statements, the people with whom I spend my time, my attitudes and choices, where would Christ find my heart? Does he see in me a religious leader who values prestige and power? Does he see in me a rich person who values money? Or does he see in me a surrendered person who values Christ, and all that Christ loves, more than prestige, power, money?
