## Lenten Family Workshop

St. Teresa's faith formation ministries are hosting a Family Workshop to help families brainstorm and plan ahead to make the most of Lent 2020. This workshop was specifically scheduled to serve families whose children participate in Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (ages 3 through 6th grade), but we invite and welcome any families to participate (probably best for Kindergarten and up). The workshop will be held Sunday, February 23rd 10:30-11:50AM (this is in lieu of regular catechesis on Feb 23/24). It includes activity for both parents and children. In the second reading we learn about the wisdom of God which transcends our current age. This wisdom is otherworldly, supernatural, and outside of our daily lives. Because it is outside of our daily mundanity, this wisdom revolutionizes our lives. It has the the potential to push us to the corners of our neighborhoods, to combat racism when we see it, to welcome the stranger. It also has the potential to solve the problems that face us in everyday life.

How do we tap into this wisdom that can guide our lives? I recommend that you take fifteen minutes to sit in silence and see what happens. When we remove ourselves from the fast paced world of our jobs, families, and friends for fifteen minute, you might be surprised where your mind and your heart takes you. Take some time this week and touch the wisdom and love that transcend all understanding.

The scribes and Pharisees lived according to the letter of the law and they used this to elevate themselves above the other people. Jesus is clear – it’s the love that you have in your heart that will get you to heaven. Simply following church rules out of obligation, not love, does not put you on the path to heaven. Attending Mass on Sunday and then gossiping about a fellow parishioner on the parking lot is an example of a modern day Pharisee.

## Empower St. Benedict the African School!

St. Teresa of Avila has partnered with St. Benedict the African, one of just two schools still servicing Chicago’s Englewood neighborhood, to encourage funding scholarships through the new Illinois tax credit scholarship program. This program is a great way to maximize your charitable dollars. For example, a net contribution of \$1,045 (\$4180 donation with a \$3,135 tax credit) you can support a full scholarship. Until February 29, 2020 or until the matching funds are exhausted, you can provide triple the scholarship. (In the example, \$4,180 donation would yield scholarship funds for St. Benedicts for \$12,540! Your donation after tax credit is only \$1,045.)

If you want to find a way to donate, this is a no brainer! Any amount will go towards a child’s tuition in one of our most vulnerable neighborhoods.

# From The Pastor's Desk

I want to thank everyone for the wonderful celebration last Saturday for my 36th anniversary to the priesthood. People like Charisse and Jennifer worked behind the scenes gathering all the food made by so many parishioners and preparing some of their own dishes. It was just so good to see so many people having a good time, catching up and laughing. Special thanks to Jack for organizing the celebration and for his tireless energy and positive spirit.

This winter has certainly been easy so far; and spring is fast approaching. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 26th. A group of dedicated parishioners will be witnessing and evangelizing by distributing ashes at the EL and on the streets. Maybe one of the news outlets will be there to show our parish in action.

I encourage all parishioners to engage in some form of penance that will give a focus to the purpose and meaning of Lent: to renew and reinvigorate our Baptism, allowing the living waters of the Spirit to flow freely within the heart.

A great Lenten penance is to give up some time by going to a daily Mass once a week or praying for a half an hour at Adoration. I encourage everyone to develop a discipline of daily prayer that will carry one throughout the year. Without personal prayer apart from the Liturgy, we can't get to know the Lord nor experience the depth His love. It takes time, each and every day, and trust that God is present, especially when we don't "feel" that presence.

Giving up food, candy, alcohol, whatever, might be good if the experience leads you to keep turning to the Lord.... if it strengthens your life as a baptized disciple of Christ. If Easter arrives and you go back to the same behavior before Lent, what is the point? The purpose of Lent is conversion, a change of focus that lasts well beyond Easter.

We have daily Mass at 7:30am Monday thru Thursday and a Communion service on Friday at 7:30am. Adoration is each Tuesday from 6:00pm until 7:30pm.

I am inviting all to a presentation by a man named Joshua who spent a number of years incarcerated. His experience proved to be one of conversion to a new way of seeing God, faith and life. This evening will be an opportunity to hear his story and engage in conversation. Come after the 6:00 pm mass on Sunday, March 15th.

In the meantime, it's Mardi Gras!!! Enjoy.
