Call for Volunteers

It has been wonderful to welcome our parishioners back to St. Teresa. Since July, we have celebrated Sunday morning Mass for 12 consecutive weeks, welcomed 12 new members to our church at Baptisms, restarted weekly Adoration on Tuesday evenings, and begun offering weekly morning Masses on Wednesdays at 8:00AM. None of this would be possible without the support of a team of volunteers who help with greeting, ushering, and cleaning at each of these events. THANK YOU to all of those volunteers!

As we look to maintain and hopefully expand our offerings, we need more volunteers! Can you help? As a volunteer, you would be required to watch an overview video provided by the Archdiocese and arrive early for a Mass to receive St. Teresa specific training. You would sign up online for the dates that are convenient for you, using the same Signup interface we use to register for Mass. Even if you can only help for one or two Masses a month, we need you.

Please note that the minimum age to serve as a greeter or usher is 18, and the maximum age is 65. Teenagers, between the ages of 14 and 18 can help with clean up after Mass. Also, it is essential that anyone who volunteers is healthy and does not have other risk factors.

What is a cooperative?

Cooperatives are people-centred enterprises jointly owned by workers. They are democratically controlled by and for their members to realize their common socio-economic needs and aspirations. As enterprises based on values and principles, cooperatives put fairness and equality

Your Vote Matters

This is an election year and this year, in lieu of the Hunger Walk, the Greater Chicago Food Depository is running a program in conjunction with partner agencies, like the St. Teresa Food Pantry, to get out the vote by helping folks with Voter Registration, Early Voting and Mail In Ballots. This Get Out the Vote campaign is not political and not tied to a particular party or candidate but rather is simply trying to help folks participate in our democracy by voting.

This aligns well with our community at St. Teresa and we believe that participating in this program is good for our parish, the guests at our Food Pantry and our community. Voting information and registration will be available to guests at the food pantry as well as parishioners and folks in the neighborhood. In order to be successful, we need some volunteers to help with this. Participation will mean attending a couple of training sessions (one hour each and they are online) and then volunteering one or more Saturdays in the fall during the Food Pantry hours (Saturday mornings) to help with this program.
