Parishioner Spotlight: Lorrie Donnell


Many St. Teresa of Avila parishioners are taking action to care for God's creation in more

impactful and meaningful ways. One example is the family of parishioner Lorrie O'Donnell, who

describes her family's efforts to cut back on polystrene."Recycling is the very care of creation, but sometimes, that little triangle and number don't mean as much as we think. So, what do we do? As complicated as the process is, we have a much easier way of being better: avoid personal us of polystyrene. Now, we can never be perfect, but somany of our daily choices can remove polystyrene from our lives. Take ordering out, for example. My family and I have a practice we started during Covid. We call it "The Good Place List" out of reference to the tv show the Good Place. Restaurants we frequented that did not use polystyrene packaging got placed on the "Nice" list, while those that continued to use the material would be placed on the "Naughty" list. Restaurants that went above and beyond in their use of recyclable materials got moved up a notch further, to the "The Good Place" list. We occasionally call the restaurants on the "Naughty" list, asking if they still use polystyrene packaging. If they do, we express to them how much we enjoy their food, but we cannot in good concious order from them. Those that stopped moved up the list, and several have stopped in the few years since we started. We have a chance to show polystyrene and other single-use plastics to the door simply by favoring businesses brave enough to make the change. Multiple plant-based and biodegradable options already exist. You don't

have to change everyone's mind on the first try. But a river that runs long enough inevitably carves a canyon. Stick with it, and the change will happen"
