The Feast of Epiphany 2023

You don't have to look up into the skies to see the Star of Bethlehem, it shines brightly in unlikely places. I made a visit, a pastoral visit to the emergency room at a local hospital. The environment was very brightly lit, filled with people of all ages and from many walks of life, as you would expect. Certainly, within this room filled with light, there was much darkness. The pain, suffering, uncertainty, loneliness were palpable, just to prayerfully gaze in the faces of this gathering of people. The wounded Church.... One young woman walked in with a companion and she was clearly in much pain... inner pain, the pain of depression. I heard her concerned companion say she's been struggling with depression and he spoke with such lo de. This companion was "light" in the ER room... a living STAR. The nurse who managed the intake was one who cared for the troubled woman, truly cared. The way she spoke, the words of hope and comfort were spoken in gentle tones of compassion. The nurse was a living STAR. A nurse called the name of one of the patients. No response. He called again, but louder; no response. He called again, raising his voice. A frail woman raised her hand and he went to her and helped her up. The patient was embraced with patience and calm. He was a living STAR. A father was walking around the room with his 10 month old son who was clutching his dad's fingers on each hand bouncing him up and down as they walked. Everyone in the area began to smile, wave their hands, make cuddling sounds, one gentleman, in much discomfort, started making bird noises that were truly believable!!! "What's his name?" asked one of the people. His dad said with pride, "Marco!" This little boy was a living STAR!! Many STARS filled that emergency room, stars of humanity letting the "light" within emerge, MANIFESTING the Light of Christ. "Epiphany" simply means a manifestation, an outward revelation of an inner, dynamic love....God. The Magi were looking UP into the sky, guided by ONE STAR, not any other nor any other constellation. That one star led them over the infant Child, human and divine, the "light" that dispels all darknesses. Those "wisemen", astrologers, left the child, no longer needing to gaze into the darkened skies for guidance and knowledge. They could look WITHIN and SEE the star through the eyes of wonder, awe, rooted in faith. All the lights in the sky: the stars and the countless constellations, the light from millions of galaxies, all these lights up there converged and coalesced in the ONE LIGHT: Christ!!!!

Christ is the one star that draws us all together, each and every single human being, united in and with the ONE Incarnation. All Creation, every human being who lived, is living, will live are united in ONE family of "light." Epiphany draws the many shades of humanity into a living quilt of beauty. But we live in a world in which darkness seems to prevail: the wars, violence, endless poverty, abuse of children, loneliness, racism and the list goes on. There are many Herods in our day, political and religious leaders, who abuse power and create idols to be worshipped....themselves!!!! These leaders create so much darkness as they invade countries to amass power and control. Just like those Magi, the STAR within, Christ, beckons us to choose other paths, new routes that embrace the living God in the stranger, the lonely, the one on the fringes. Living the eight beatitudes ignites the light within each of our hearts, our centers, and our life's purpose is to let the "light"shine in the darkness. Each of us, every human being, is on a journey, a unique journey given them by a God who just refuses to stop loving us, especially when we wander off our chosen paths onto paths that lead to no where but alienation. We are loved even as we get lost on routes leading to darkness. The Three Person God, ONE in Love, will never give up on us. NEVER!!!

A nurse, a dad, an infant boy, a person in pain making bird noises.... YOU are a living STAR, making God present in your compassion, your care, your being engaged, your work for justice, your joy. Let your LIGHT shine in the darkness, making God present through your humanity.

Epiphany and the Christmas Tree

When should you take your Christmas tree down? Once Christmas Day is over?

There's often confusion – and debate – about the right time to do this. But you shouldn't be tempted to take your Christmas decorations down too quickly because tradition stipulates that it should stay up for a little longer than you might think.

Twelfth Night

Christian tradition dating back to the 4th century marks Twelfth Night, the end of Christmas and the Eve of the Epiphany (Christian feast day), as the time to take down your Christmas tree and pack away your decorations again.

That means you can enjoy the glow of the lights for a little while longer, because Twelfth Night falls on either 5th or 6th January 2023 – and the dates depend on tradition. Be warned though: leaving your Christmas decorations up after this date is thought to bring bad luck.

After Advent, which is the four weeks before Christmas in preparation and celebration of the birth of Jesus, Christmas celebrations traditionally started on Christmas Day and lasted for 12 days (known as the 12 Days of Christmas), finishing on the evening of 5th January, known as Twelfth Night.

The Epiphany on 6th January is a celebration in itself, marking the Magi – the Three Kings or Wise Men – visiting baby Jesus in his manger in Bethlehem, with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Twelfth Night is the night before Epiphany and is the night, tradition says, when Christmas decorations should be taken down. Epiphany, on the other hand, is the day when the Church, theologically, marks the arrival of the wise men to give their gifts to the baby Jesus.

Roman Catholic's can choose to keep their tree up until 2nd February, according to the traditions of Candlemas, which commemorates the presentation of Jesus at the Temple.



Together we turned an empty apartment into a home by collecting and delivering basic household items for the kitchen, bath and bedroom, as well as a first month's supply of food staples.

Less than 1% of all refugees are resettled each year. Refugees invited by the U.S. government to resettle in America are the most thoroughly vetted individuals allowed in our country. Once approved to resettle in the U.S., refugees pay for their own flight through a revolving loan fund and enter the U.S. as legal residents. Refugees start their new lives in the U.S. with next to nothing and face the difficult challenge of learning a new culture and language. What's more, refugees' deepest wounds are often emotional. Even after reaching safety in the U.S., many refugees still struggle with fear and loneliness. They need welcome, friendship and a place to belong


