



From Fr. Frank:

March 12, 2023

In just a few weeks, several of our young people will be confirmed, a moment in which the Holy Spirit will strengthen their Baptism with gifts to guide them on their journey through life. As the Bishop is the instrument of the calling down of the Spirit through his outstretched arms, as he then anoints them with the beautifully scented Chrism on their foreheads, he will then send them back into their individual worlds to live out their discipleship. The Christian life compels us to keep moving forward, being engaged in the whatever life places in front of us. It's all about movement in the Spirit to grow and be transformed.

Abraham and Sarah are called to move out of their familiar homeland into a new land. They were the bearers of the Covenant forged by the Living God to set in motion (movement, again) a new People, moving from family, to tribe, to a nation, to many nations... to the whole world. These two individuals were well into old age when God called them to a new land. God even asked them to give birth to a child who would keep things moving forward. You are never too old!!!!

In the gospel, Jesus is leading the three disciples UP the mountain where His appearance is transformed, transfigured, right before their eyes. In this magnificent vision of the glorified Christ, they here the voice telling them, "This is my beloved Son," the voice of the Father. But He adds, "Listen to Him." God "speaks" to us by what inspires us, in our desires, and most importantly, in our intuitions. We can't follow God's calling, His voice, if we aren't listening.

The three disciples are so taken by the vision that they become filled with fear as they drop to the ground. Jesus tells them to "rise and not be afraid."

And then....back to "movement" DOWN the mountain and into life. They can't remain immobilized, stuck on the mountain of glory. No, they move back down with the beautiful memory of the moment.

God is calling us like Abraham, Sarah, the disciples to keep moving forward in life, treasuring the moments that make us shine, but accepting the experiences of trial and suffering. The mountain of the Transfiguration led to the mount of Calvary, the crucifixion. Glory and suffering go hand in hand. We can't choose only the glory, shutting ourselves off from difficult and unsettling realities, the many realities of suffering around us. Walls of protection become walls of isolation and inner loneliness.

The saddest thing I experience is when an adult Catholic, a church goer, never got beyond Confirmation in their faith life. Reducing their faith to a checklist of rituals needed to make it into heaven, they never "moved forward" in deepening their understanding of God, Christ, the Church, the Sacraments. Ironically, the rest of their lives is filled with movement: their careers, promotions, higher education, but their discipleship remains a past memory. How sad.

Jesus wants us to have life and have it in abundance. He wants us to keep moving forward in our faith life: learning new ways of praying, studying Scripture and Church Teaching, living out the teachings of social Justice. We are slowly being "transfigured" as we share in the beauty of Christ's divinity. Yes, we are all slowly being "divinized", becoming more and more like God. But only if we keep listening to God's voice and moving forward.



Third Sunday of Lent

Station with San Lorenzo fuori le Mura (St. Lawrence Outside the Walls):

The Station is in the basilica of St. Lawrence outside the walls--the walls being the old walls that marked the boundary and protected Rome. The name of this, the most celebrated of the martyrs of Rome, would remind the catechumens that the faith they were about to profess would require them to be ready for many sacrifices. In the primitive Church, the third Sunday in Lent was called Scrutiny Sunday, because it was on this day that they began to examine the catechumens, who were to be admitted to Baptism on Easter night.

The First Scrutiny – Third Sunday of Lent – The Woman at the Well. The primary symbol in the reading of this Sunday is water. Water is a symbol of life, and it indicates that God wishes to give us life, as shown in the stories of the Israelites in the desert and the woman from Samaria at the well.

I don't even remember how to curse." "You keep pulling on that rope, and it'll come back to you."



St. Patrick Feast Day March 17th Patron Saint of Ireland

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. He was born in Roman Britain and when he was fourteen or so, he was captured by Irish pirates during a raiding party and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep. At the time, Ireland was a land of Druids and pagans but Patrick turned to God and wrote his memoir, The Confession.

Patrick's captivity lasted until he was twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. There he found some sailors who took him back to Britain and was reunited with his family.

A few years after returning home, Patrick saw a vision he described in his memoir.

"I saw a man coming, as it were from Ireland. His name was Victoricus, and he carried many letters, and he gave me one of them. I read the heading: 'The Voice of the Irish.' As I began the letter, I imagined in that moment that I heard the voice of those very people who were near the wood of Foclut, which is beside the western sea-and they cried out, as with one voice: 'We appeal to you, holy servant boy, to come and walk among us." The vision prompted his studies for the priesthood. He was ordained by St. Germanus, the Bishop of Auxerre, whom he had studied under for years, and was later ordained a bishop and sent to take the Gospel to Ireland. He often used shamrocks to explain the Holy Trinity and entire kingdoms were eventually converted to Christianity after hearing Patrick's message.

Patrick preached and converted all of Ireland for 40 years. He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for God in Confessions. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461. He died at Saul, where he had built the first Irish church. He is believed to be buried in Down Cathedral, Downpatrick. His grave was marked in 1990 with a granite stone.
