

"Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last".-Matthew 20:16

You've heard the saying "it's not where you start, but how you finish." This certainly applies to this Bible passage. We have a responsibility not only for our own lives, but for the lives of others as well. We are called to generously share our gifts with others, not hoard them for our own use. Our sincere gratitude and cheerful generosity will generosity will help us live "God-centered" lives

and not "self-centered" lives.

From Fr. Frank:

Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Next week is National Migration Week and in the Catholic Church it will include World Day of Migrants and Refugees. This gives us as a church and nation to focus on the painful plight of those fleeing their homelands due to poverty, violence and injustice. As Pope Francis reminds us Christians, people have a right to migrate when their lives are threatened and their human dignity denied in horrible ways.

The gospel teaching comes to mind: the measure you measure with will be measured back to you. Jesus tells the story in today's gospel of a man begging for mercy from his master who demanded that his huge debt be paid back in full. The master forgave the entire debt because compassion filled his heart.

This same man had his own servant, who owed him a much smaller amount, pay him back in full, no questions. Unable to so, he had the servant put in prison. Amazing!!!! This same man was relieved of a huge debt he owed, no strings attached. But he returned the mercy shown to him with greed and hardness of heart. Needless to say, it didn't end well for him.

The measure you measure with will be measured back to you.

This gospel teaching pierces the human heart, not only of individuals, but the heart of the church and the heart of our nation. As countless numbers of migrants and refugees are entering our nation and being bussed to cities around the country, including Chicago, we need to respond as we would hope people would respond to us if we had to flee our country. Every nation has a right to borders that are secured and protected. But also, every human being has a right to living in safety, able to take care of the most basic necessities of life.

The crisis we are facing has National and worldwide ramifications, involving economics, trade, food distribution, totalitarian regimes and the destruction of our environment. Much could be added to the list, I have no doubt. But our nation has been blessed in countless ways and immigrants form the backbone of our lifestyles in many hidden ways. The key word is "hidden."

Most of us have families members who emigrated to America, fleeing poverty. My mom's family came from Italy in the 1920's. It took years for the process of entering the US to take place. But if Italy actually bordered the US, not being separated by a huge ocean, would they have not found a way to "cross the border" on the East, if it meant feeding a family?

Oftentimes, "rights" come in conflict: human rights, National rights, constitutional rights... the call of a disciple of Jesus is always mercy and compassion whenever it is possible. Mercy and forgiveness and compassion have no limits. Respecting laws and respecting human beings must somehow come together. Love can never be measured. And yet, if you measure in love... love will be measured back to you. Gospel paradox.

St. Michael, St. Gabriel and St. Raphael

Feast Day September 29th

The Bible mentions 3 archangels, Michael, Gabriel and Raphael. Each angel had a specific mission in salvation history, but they continue their protective help in the world, even though we may not see their invisible spiritual work.

The Roman Rite of the Catholic Church has assigned September 29 to be the feast of Sts. Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, archangels. For many centuries this day was only reserved for St. Michael.

After the Second Vatican Council, the Church wanted to further highlight all three archangels and grouped them all together on September 29. Previously St. Gabriel and St. Raphael had separate feasts during different parts of the year.

St. Michael is the Patron Saint of soldiers, police, paramedics, and the sick and dying.

Michael, whose name means "Who is like God?"

St. Gabriel is the Patron Saint of messengers, postal workers, broadcasters, and expectant mothers.

Gabriel, whose name means "God is my strength" or "Strong man of God,"

St. Raphael is the Patron Saint of travelers, the blind, medical workers, and matchmakers.

Raphael, whose name means "God has healed,"

As we honor these three archangels today, call upon their intercession, seek their mediation, and trust that they will accomplish the duties they are given. Through Michael, seek God's protection. Through Gabriel, seek God's revelation. And through Raphael, seek God's healing. They will not let you down.

Glorious Archangels Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, I entrust myself to your angelic mediation. Please set into motion God's plan for my life, protect me from the evil one, deliver to me God's holy word, and heal me of my sin. I thank you for the glorious duties you fulfill in the divine mission and rely upon you in my life. Saints Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, pray for me and mediate God's grace to me. Jesus, I trust in You.

kingdom and in our lives.


"A Biblical Walk Through The Mass" begins on October 15! Join us, on Sunday at 8:50 –

On the weekend of September 23/24, the Little Sisters of the Poor will visit our Parish to share their vocation of hospitality to the elderly. St. Mary's Home in Chicago is one of 162 Homes for the elderly poor operated by the Little Sisters in 31 countries around the world.

Acute and considerable continues to be their need for financial support. Virtually all of the current Residents of St. Mary's Home qualify for Medicaid,

and a few receive meager pensions. But these modest funds cover, at best, about half of the annual expenses. The Little Sisters have ministered to thousands of elders in Chicago for 146 years.
