Parish Life

From Fr. Frank:

A happy Feast Day to all parishioners of St. Teresa of Avila Parish, for Sunday, October 15th is her day we celebrate her life and witness to the gospel. Our parish was founded on October 15, 1889, by German immigrants. The parish has grown and developed through several transformations over many decades. The German culture of the neighborhood gradually changed in the late 1950's and early 1960's becoming a Puerto Rican community, rich in culture and tradition. From the late 1980's until the present, the neighborhood has experienced more transformation due to gentrification. Communities and neighborhoods change over time. Who knows what Lincoln Park will look like years from now? It will certainly be different.

One consistent "presence" throughout the various neighborhood transformations over 134 years has been St. Teresa of Avila Catholic Community. The one constant, the driving energy uniting diverse cultural expressions, has been our Catholic faith. The Eucharist is the lifeblood and center of gravity for our parish, gathering us to be formed and shaped by Scripture, the Body and Blood of Christ and the assembly... to be sent out to live and proclaim the gospel. From the Eucharistic celebration radiates our many ministries of formation, prayer, outreach and Catechesis.

We are filled with gratitude for our rich history of people who gave so much to keep our parish vibrant: the countless benefactors of parishioners who supported the parish financially and spiritually, the witness of the Sisters who dedicated their lives for almost 100 years to the school, the priests, deacons, lay leaders and the multitude of volunteers. Without our volunteers, the parish couldn't function.

The readings this weekend, particularly from Isaiah and the parable in the gospel, compare the Kingdom of God to a marriage feast, filled with abundant, sumptuous food and drink. In the parable, the first ones invited were from the establishment, people of means and importance; most had no time for this magnificent feast. The King "invited" those on the fringes, the lowly and unwanted, so that the wedding feast could be filled.

This is a very strange and even disturbing parable: why did those first invited refuse? Why did the King react so violently? Why did he "throw out" the one not dressed properly? The image of the feast and food is beautiful, but the message is meant to shatter our complacency and oh so busy lives. We are being invited to a feast of Salvation!!!! OUR salvation!!! But are we truly ready to accept the invitation of salvation

Yes, all are welcome but to remain within the Feast we must be prepared INTERNALLY, our hearts must be open to transformation and change so that our lives become an extension of the very Feast of God's marriage to humanity. The one not properly dressed wasn't able to actually celebrate because his heart wasn't open to the very salvation being offered. His heart wasn't "clothed" with compassion, mercy, a poverty of spirit, gentleness, humility. His BAPTISM had little effect on his life!!!!

The beauty of this parish has been its open and welcoming spirit. Yes, ALL are welcome, but attitudes of hatred, bigotry of all forms, intolerance of different viewpoints must be open to transformation. Our lives and how we live them are meant to become mirrors of the gospel and Christ's love. As we celebrate St. Teresa, the first woman declared a "doctor" of the Church, meaning a great theologian, we must remember how hard she fought for the reform of the Carmelite Order during the time of the Reformation. She challenged the Inquisition, who tried to brand her teachings on prayer heretical and she also faced horrible opposition from her own fellow nuns who resisted the reform. Teresa steadfastly resisted the naysayers and complainers, letting the fire of the Spirit guide her.

Teresa is a reminder to all of us that change is hard, and most of us don't want or like change. But when rooted in prayer that is deep and contemplative and when we are a part of a community of Eucharist, change is welcome, even if painful. What our parish will look like in the future, how it will be structured, the people who come... will unfold in ways that will certainly involve surprise and change. May the same Spirit that guided Teresa guide us as a Catholic faith community, wherever it may lead. Change is inevitable, for nothing stays the same, except a closed, hard heart. St. Teresa's has a beautiful way of softening hearts!!!! Let the Feast continue...


Blessings In A Backpack:


