Parish Life

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From Fr. Frank:

One of my Lenten practices this year will be praying through the Imitation of Christ, a beautiful, short book attributed to Thomas A Kempis. It is the second most widely read book in the world, after the Bible.

This little spiritual gem was written well over five centuries ago and it's message is as relevant as ever: as disciples of Christ we are called and challenged to imitate the manner in which He lived His life. We do do not by imitating His cultural expressions, how He looked, what He ate, but the way he loved and embraced in love ALL God's people.

In the gospel on this Sunday before Ash Wednesday, Jesus refuses to shun a man with leprosy, a practice common at that time. A leper was considered cut off from community, shunned, so that this person lived in isolation. Jesus turned this attitude upside down and inside out. The leper IS our neighbor, a part of the community.

We shun lots of people for different reasons, mostly having to do with ideologies of political or theological in nature. We shun people we believe to be hateful, uneducated, ignorant or beneath our standards. We shun people with whom we have serious disagreements about morality and ethics.

When we shun, we cut people off, separate ourselves from them and label them in derogatory terms. No one is out of the reach of God's love... no one. Jesus had many people, like some of the religious leaders of the day, who were very rigid and difficult in their beliefs. And they hated Jesus because so many of His teachings and practices were subversive to established customs. But Jesus never shunned them by refusing to engage them. He certainly didn't like many of these deceitful detractors, but He still loved them, "Forgive them Father for they know not what they do." Imitating Christ is a demanding way of living because it challenges our selfishness, our judgmental attitudes, our envy, jealousy and lust. Imitating Christ means daily examining one's conscience to acknowledge the ways we do not imitate Christ so that we can grow to gradually conform ourselves to His Cross. Imitating Christ means choosing the narrow road of His way that expands our vistas and horizons to love when it doesn't feel good to do so.

Shunning a difficult person is easy; finding a common human thread beneath the layers of alienation is much more difficult.

Annual Catholic Appeal:

We make this Lenten journey together, as indeed, our whole life's journey in the company of one another. We support each other in our needs- with our prayer, compassion and resources.

Last Sunday, we began the Annual Catholic Appeal that helps those in need, individuals and communites. If you did not have a chance to make a commitment then, you can do so today.



Parish Life

Lenten Project:

During Lent, many of us think of things to give up, or discover different ways that one can give back and donate their time, talent, or gifts. This Lenten Season, we encourage you to especially remember those that have less than us, and in some cases, nothing. As you are aware, we have an influx of refugee's trying to get resettled in Chicago; in fact there is expected to be 3 time more refugees this year than in past years. We currently partner with an organization called Exodus and we have committed to welcoming a handful of new families into their homes this year.

Starting on Ash Wednesday, we will have a cross displayed in the front of church. The cross will have nails on it, and attached to each nail, are items that a family would need when moving into a new apartment.

We encourage each family to grab 1 nail to take home and display during the season of Lent, to remember not only the Lord's suffering, but those who have suffered persecution in their own country and have fled to the US to build a new life. We ask that you buy the items listed on the nail, and return the items by March 17th to the parish. The items must be new, and you can return them unwrapped and drop them off in Bins in church.

This is a wonderful activity to do as a Family during Lent, and you can involve your kids and encourage them to assist in picking out items to purchase.

If you prefer to do this online, or when we run out of nails, we have a QR Code listed that is tied to an Amazon Wish List for the refugees (provided below). You can scan and purchase items that will be shipped directly to the rectory.

First Sunday of Lent:

The scene of the temptation, which opens the public life of Jesus, declares in the Gospels in a very forceful manner the great change in our lives that He introduces into the world by His work of redemption. Where Adam fell, Christ, the new Head of humanity, triumphs over the power of Satan: at the time of His passion "the prince of this world" will be cast out. The Gospel of the temptation heralds Christ's victory.

By appointing this Gospel for the beginning of Lent the Church proclaims that this victory should be ours also. In us, as all around us, it is Christ's temptation, Christ's struggle, Christ's victory which is prolonged; our effort is His and so is our strength; His will be our victory at Easter.

Grant, almighty God, through the yearly observances of holy Lent, that we may grow in understanding of the riches hidden in Christ and by worthy conduct pursue their effects. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

The Chair of St. Peter the Apostle:

Feast Day February 22nd

The Chair of Saint Peter (Latin: Cathedra Petri), also known as the Throne of Saint Peter, is a relic conserved in St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City, the sovereign enclave of the Pope inside Rome, Italy.

The relic is a wooden throne that tradition claims belonged to the Apostle Saint Peter, the leader of the Early Christians in Rome and first Pope, and which he used as Bishop of Rome.

In 2012, Pope Benedict XVI described the chair as "a symbol of the special mission of Peter and his Successors to tend Christ's flock, keeping it united in faith and in charity."

Celebrating the "Chair" of Peter, means attributing a strong spiritual significance to it and recognizing it as a privileged sign of the love of God, the eternal Good Shepherd, who wanted to gather his whole Church and lead her on the path of salvation.


