Parish Life

St. Patrick Feast Day March 17th:

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints known as the Apostle of Ireland.

Patrick was born around 385 in Scotland, probably Kilpatrick. His parents were Calpurnius and Conchessa, who were Romans living in Britian in charge of the colonies.

As a boy of fourteen or so, he was captured during a raiding party and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep. During his captivity, he turned to God in prayer. He wrote "The love of God and his fear grew in me more and more, as did the faith, and my soul was rosed, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same." "I prayed in the woods and on the mountain, even before dawn. I felt no hurt from the snow or ice or rain."

Patrick's captivity lasted until he was twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. He reunited with his family in Britian.

He began his studies for the priesthood. He was ordained by St. Germanus, the Bishop of Auxerre, whom he had studied under for years.

Later, Patrick was ordained a bishop, and was sent to take the Gospel to Ireland.

Patrick began preaching the Gospel throughout Ireland, converting many. He and his disciples preached and converted thousands and began building churches all over the country.

After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461 at Saul, where he had built the first church.

Why a shamrock?

St. Patrick used the shamrock to explain the Trinity, and has been associated with him and the Irish since that time.

St. Joseph Feast Day March 19th:

Always held on March 19th, the feast honors Joseph, husband to the Virgin Mary and earthly father to Jesus. The feast of St. Joseph has the rank of a solemnity in the Catholic Church.

It is also the day in which Italy celebrates Father's Day and if your name is Joseph or Josephine, you will also be celebrating your "onomastico."

Saint Joseph was said to be a carpenter, and a highly-skilled artisan and tradesman.

He married the Virgin Mary and became the stepfather of Jesus Christ. Together, the three are known as the Holy Family.


In 1870, Pope Pius IX named Saint Joseph as the protector of the Catholic Church. He is also the patron saint of unborn children, fathers, immigrants, and workers.

St. Joseph's Day Celebrations

During a period of famine in Sicily, where crops weren't prospering, Italians prayed to St. Joseph for successful harvests. These prayers were answered, and with enough yields, the famine ended for the poor people.

To give thanks, Italians began giving annual offerings of food for the saint, these were placed on altars known as Saint Joseph's Tables. These celebrations have continued to this day.

Saint Joseph's Day is celebrated with altars filled with food such as pasta, fish, bread, cakes, pastries, and fava beans. The food must be meatless, as March 19 happens during lent. These altars are blessed by a priest and hold a statue of St. Joseph.

Lenten Refugee Project:

During this Lent, we ask that you considering supporting our refugee program. St. Teresa's partners with Exodus and assists in welcoming families who are coming into the United States for the first time, and we are helping to build a Welcome Pack for a handful of families. These Welcome Packs are basic household items to help set up an apartment when they first arrive. The refugees are very limited with what they bring into this country, so we help to provide basics for the kitchen, bathroom, and bedroom. All items must be new.

In order to collect these items, we had a wooden cross in the front of church with nails and items tagged to those nails. If you took a nail with a tag, we kindly ask that you purchase the items and return them to church by Sunday, March 17th. There will be bins located around the cross where you can return the item too.

If you did not grab a nail and want to contribute, below is a QR code that links to an Amazon Registry. Items purchased from this link will be shipped directly to the rectory.

Our goal is to complete the drive before Palm Sunday so we can be prepared to welcome families in the Easter Season.

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Fifth Sunday of Lent:

This is the final Sunday before Holy Week, which begins next Sunday with Passion or Palm Sunday. Today we focus our attention on the nearness and coming of the hour of Jesus' glorification. The glorification of Jesus refers to his suffering, death and resurrection, for the life of the world.

Jesus had already told his followers that he would lay down his life for them, like a good shepherd willing to die for his flock.

Previously called "Passion Sunday," this Fifth Sunday of Lent marks the beginning of Passiontide, a deeper time of Lent. This is the third Sunday of the scrutinies for the preparation of adult converts, and the final Sunday of Lent before the beginning of Holy Week. The Liturgy of the Word of this day speaks of re-creation, resurrection, and new life.

Fifth Sunday of Lent

Station with San Pietro in Vaticano (St. Peter in the Vatican):

In the 1962 Roman Missal, this would be Passion Sunday. All Station Churches for Sundays in Lent were held at basilicas of Rome, but the major basilicas particularly for the first, fifth and sixth Sundays of Lent. The original church was erected on the site of the Roman Circus built by the Emperor Caligula around the year A.D. 40. and where St. Peter was crucified and placed upside down at his request and later buried here.



Liturgical Minister Training:

Have you ever considered becoming more involved in liturgy by serving as a Lector or Eucharistic Minister at Mass?


Today is- St. Patricks Day and Green Beer Day


