Parish Life

Easter Sunday:

Easter Sunday marks the Resurrection of Jesus three days after his death by crucifixion.

Easter is the joyful conclusion to the Lenten season of devoted prayer, fasting, and penitence.

The Easter story, as recounted in all four Gospels of the New Testament, begins with the crucifixion of Jesus Christ, His burial, and culminates in His resurrection from the dead. In Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, Jesus is crucified by the Roman authorities at the instigation of religious leaders. He is then buried in a tomb belonging to Joseph of Arimathea. On the third day after His death, women visit the tomb and find it empty, with angels announcing Jesus' resurrection. They encounter Jesus alive, who then appears to His disciples, providing them with evidence of His resurrection before ascending into heaven. This miraculous event confirms Jesus' identity as the Son of God and the fulfillment of prophecies regarding the Messiah.

For many, Easter is also a time to reflect on the meaning of life and the power of love and forgiveness. Through the symbolism of Easter we are reminded that no matter how dark things may seem, there is always hope in the power of resurrection and new beginnings.



The Octave Days of Easter:

The Octave of Easter is the eight-day period, or octave, that begins on Easter Sunday and ends with Second Sunday of Easter. It marks the beginning of Eastertide. The first seven of these eight days are also collectively known as Easter Week.

As with the Octave of Christmas, the Octave or eighth day is not as liturgically important as the feast day of Easter, but it is higher in importance than the preceding six days of the Octave. The Easter Octave is concluded by the Second Sunday of Easter, which has many titles. The current designation is Sunday of Divine Mercy, designated by St. John Paul II.

The closing of the greatest week of the liturgical year does not mean an end of Easter. The Easter season continues until Pentecost, a total of 50 days!



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Easter Sunday, The Resurrection of the Lord:

Station with Santa Maria Maggiore (St. Mary Major):

The Station is at St. Mary Major, the principal church of all those that are dedicated to the Mother of God in the holy city. This is to associate with the Paschal solemnity the memory of her, who, more than all other creatures, had merited its joys, not only because of the exceptional share she had had in all the sufferings of Jesus, but also because of the unshaken faith wherewith, during those long and cruel hours of his lying in the tomb, she had awaited his Resurrection.



Meditation—He is Risen!

"I rose up and am still with Thee." After His labors and His humiliations, Christ finds rest with His Father. "I am still with Thee." This is perfect beatitude. Through His cross He entered into the possession of eternal glory. Christ has gained the crown of victory; through Christ men also win their crowns of victory. Humanity was under a curse and subject to the wrath of God. Now that they have risen with Christ, their guilt has been destroyed. "I rose up and am still with Thee." The liturgy places these words in the mouth of the Church that she may pray them with Christ.

"The earth trembled and was still when God arose in judgment." The resurrection of Christ is the judgment and condemnation of those who have turned away from God. This judgment was prefigured by the angel who passed through the land of Egypt destroying the first-born of the Egyptians. The Israelites marked the doors of their houses with the blood of the paschal lamb. We are the new Israel, and "Christ our Pasch is sacrificed." We mark ourselves with His blood, which we enjoy in the Holy Eucharist. We have been pardoned, we are saved, we shall live.

"He is risen." The resurrection of Christ is a pledge of our own resurrection. It is the foundation upon which our faith rests. It is the guarantee of our redemption and God's assurance that our sins are forgiven and that we are called to eternal life. "This is the day which the Lord hath made; let us be glad and rejoice therein. Give praise to the Lord, for He is good, for His mercy endures forever. Alleluia."

Easter Fun:

1. There are religious connections between Easter and pastel colors.

Pastel colors are bright and pretty, and we often connect them to springtime. Each color also has religious symbolism for Lent, Good Friday, and Easter.

2. World's largest chocolate egg was made in Italy.

The world's largest chocolate Easter egg was made in Italy in April 2011. It measured 34 feet and 1.05 inches in length, and weighed approximately 15,873 pounds.

3. Americans will consume more than 16 million jelly beans.

That's enough jelly beans to circle the globe not once, not twice, but three times — or to fill a plastic egg the size of a nine-story building.

4. The first White House Easter Egg Roll was in 1878.

Rutherford B. Hayes was the president at the time. But it was President Nixon who first included a bunny in the festivities with a member of his wife's staff as the lucky person who got to wear the costume.

5. It used to take more than a day to make a Peep.

Approximately 27 hours, to be precise. That was back in 1953, when each candy was handmade with a pastry tube. Today they have machines that have dramatically sped up the process to just six minutes.

6. Most Americans bite off the ears of a chocolate bunny first.

In fact, a whopping 76% say that's where they take their first mouthful, followed by 5% who eat the feet first, and 4% who eat the tail first.

7. The date of Easter changes every year.

Unlike Christmas or Halloween, Easter does not have a fixed date, due to Passover, which is influenced by the moon's cycle each year.

Easter Fun:

8. The original "Easter Hare" would judge kids to see if they were naughty or nice.

Just like Santa Claus, the first Easter bunny was created to ensure kids were well-behaved before Easter started. Treats were only given to good kids, while those who were naughty were left with empty baskets.

9. Eggs used to be colored with natural ingredients.

Leftover onion peels, tree bark, and even flower petals used to be key ingredients to dye eggs.

10. Buying a new outfit for Easter stems from a superstition.

Back in the mid-1800s in New York, people believed that buying new clothes to wear on Easter would bring them good luck for the rest of the year.
