From Father Frank:

The storm that engulfed the boat in the gospel, was nothing There are countless storms in the world, from wars to compared with the storm that was brewing within the hearts of the disciples on board that boat. They were filled with terror, with fear at the rising, gushing waves and huge burst of the winds. All the while, on that boat, Jesus was sound asleep. The disciples allowed the external storm on the sea to vanguish their inner peace and equilibrium.

We all have our "inner storms" that unsettle us and compel us to waver and lose hope. There is the inner storm of:

-depression that paralyses and engulfs us in a persistent state feeling listless.

-fear, anxiety that causes us to become frantic with uncertainty and worry.

-illness, when our physical well being is diminishing due to sickness and age.

-aging and getting older when we slowly lose our independence.

-loneliness, whether young or old, married or single, a lack of a truly intimate relationship or friendship.

So many storms can make us so vulnerable. But God speaks to us IN and THROUGH the storm, calling the waves of insecurity to be calm. Jesus was sound asleep, probably having a nice rest and sweet dreams as the disciples were in panic mode. Jesus wakes up, responding to their pleas and calms the storm. But even more, Jesus calms the INNER storm of those disciples, which are much worse than the outer storm.

violence to many forms of injustice. We are being called to be rooted in inner stillness and peace, and from this inner calm, we move into the world's storms responding, not reacting. When we react, we cause more turbulence to the external storm. But rooted in prayer and reflection we can respond and act.

Whether you are experiencing an inner, personal storm or you are being called to help someone in need or to face an injustice, stop... pray... trust that the Lord will guide you and then act. You have the power the speak FROM the storm not add to the storm's turbulence.



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St. Maria Goretti:

Feast Day July 6th

Patron Saint of chastity, rape victims, girls, youth, teenage girls, poverty, purity, and forgiveness.

July 6 marks the feast day of St. Maria Goretti, a young virgin and martyr whose life is an example of purity and mercy for all Christians.

St. Maria Goretti is best known for her commitment to purity and the courageous defence of her faith at the young age of eleven that made her willing to undergo death rather than participate in a sin against God. She is also remarkable for the forgiveness she willingly granted her attacker as she lay on her deathbed.

Maria was born in Corinaldo, Italy on October 16, 1890. Her father, a farmer, died of malaria when she was young, and her mother had to work to support their six children.

Maria took care of the younger children while her mother worked, and she prayed the Rosary every night for the repose of her father's soul.

On July 5, 1902, a neighbouring farm hand, Alessandro Serenelli, tried to rape Maria. On several prior occasions, Alessandro had harassed Maria with impure advances, all of which she has vehemently rejected. This time, he locked her in a room and tried to force himself upon her. She fought against him, shouting, "No! It is a sin! God does not want it!" and warning him that this was the path towards hell. When Maria declared that she would rather die than submit to this sin, Alessandro angrily grabbed her and stabbed her 14 times with a knife.

Maria was found bleeding to death and rushed to the hospital. As she lay dying, she forgave Alessandro for the crime he had committed against her, saying, "Yes, for the love of Jesus I forgive him...and I want him to be with me in Paradise."

Although the doctors tried to save her, she died two agonizing days later, only eleven years old.

Alessandro was sentenced to 30 years in prison. He remained unrepentant until one night, eight years into his prison term, when Maria appeared to him, dressed in white, gathering lilies in a garden. She smiled, turned towards Alessandro, and offered him the flowers. Each lily he took transformed into a white flame. Then Maria disappeared.

From that moment, Alessandro converted and found peace. He repented of his crime and changed his life. He was released from prison three years early and begged forgiveness from Maria's mother, which she duly granted.

Many miracles were attributed to Maria Goretti after her death. In 1950, she was canonised by Pope Pius XII, becoming the youngest Roman Catholic saint officially recognised by name.



St. Thomas, Apostle:

Feast day July 3rd

Patron Saint of architects and builders

St. Thomas the Apostle best known for his initial unwillingness to believe the other apostles in their claim that Jesus had risen from the dead, St. Thomas can teach the faithful about believing without seeing.

As an apostle, Thomas was dedicated to following the Lord. Upon hearing that Jesus was returning to Judea, an area that would pose dangers due to the growing animosity of the authorities there, he immediately said to the other apostles, "Let us also go, that we may die with him" (Jn 11: 16).

Yet despite this determination, Thomas proved not only too weak to stand beside Jesus as he faced his crucifixion, but also doubted the Lord's Resurrection when he was told about it by the other apostles. Denying their story, he told them, "Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe" (Jn 20:25).

A week later, Christ appeared and said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." When Thomas did so he exclaimed, "My Lord and my God!"

In his general audience on September 27, 2006, Pope Benedict XVI spoke of St. Thomas, explaining that we can learn from his doubts, which show us "that Jesus can now be recognised by his wounds rather than by his face."

"The Apostle Thomas' case is important to us for at least three reasons," said the Pope. "First, because it comforts us in our insecurity; second, because it shows us that every doubt can lead to an outcome brighter than any uncertainty; and, lastly, because the words that Jesus addressed to him remind us of the true meaning of mature faith and encourage us to persevere, despite the difficulty, along our journey of adhesion to him."



Dear St. Thomas, you were once slow in believing that Christ had gloriously risen; but later, because you had seen him, you exclaimed: "My Lord and my God!" According to an ancient story, you rendered most powerful assistance for constructing a church in a place where pagan priests opposed it. Please bless architects, builds and carpenters that through them the Lord may be honored. Amen.



Around the Parish

Fourth of July:

The Fourth of July commemorates the passage of the Declaration of Independence by Congress in 1776. This officially declared that the 13 established colonies were now legally separate from Great Britain, one of the motivating factors of the first Pilgrims who first arrived in 1620 to pursue religious freedom.

This most American of holidays will be marked with typical festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues across the country.

Facts About the Fourth of July:

Only Two Men Signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776.

The first public 4th of July event at the White House occurred in 1801, Thomas Jefferson was President.

Three presidents died on July 4th: John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826 – this was the 50th anniversary. James Monroe died July 4, 1831.

Why do we do fireworks on the 4th of July?

Early U.S. settlers brought their love of fireworks with them to the New World and fireworks were part of the very first Independence Day – a tradition that continues every 4th of July when we celebrate as John Adams had hoped "with pomp, parade....

On July 8, 1776, the first public readings of the Declaration were held in Philadelphia's Independence Square to the ringing of bells and band music. One year later, on July 4, 1777, Philadelphia marked Independence Day by adjourning Congress and celebrating with bonfires, bells and fireworks. 4th Of July Food:
