Gospel Meditation: 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Once at an evening Mass as a poor college student, the collection basket was fast approaching, and I only had a ten-dollar bill. I was planning on using that to buy my favorite Chipotle burrito that night for dinner. Should I keep the money? Who would know if I did? If I gave it away, what would I eat? Would I be okay? I kissed my future burrito goodbye, dropped the money in the basket, and winced. But strangely, the rest of the Mass I felt more engaged than usual. I had skin in the game. I left the Mass excited to see how God would take care of me. And he did, in amazing ways. When the poor widow places two copper coins in the temple treasury, Jesus doesn't pity her. He praises her. He blesses her. He brags about her. He celebrates her as the temple's largest benefactor. Her giving is an act of radical, concrete trust in God. It is as if she is entering a new level of giving that excites Jesus, because she contributes not out of her abundance, but she gives "everything she had."What a challenge this is to each one of us! How easy it is to ignore this! But imagine the eruption of the energy of faith, hope, and love that would be unlocked if our financial sacrifices to the Church actually tapped into daily bread and not only our disposable income. I challenge us to try this in some way this coming week and see what happens in our hearts. Even if it costs us a burrito.

From Fr. Frank:

Homily for the 31st Sunday Ordinary Time

As I mentioned in my blog a few days ago, I got lost twice in one day, a frightening experience when completely alone. What I do now when uncertain as to where the path is going is to look for the signs of arrows and shells, but I also look with intention at the ground when I can't see any signs. And I see FOOTPRINTS, the "sole" of many pilgrims imprinted in the ground. A truly human made sign embedded in Mother Earth. When I see these imprints, I feel safe.

God has imprinted in each "soul" the imprint of his very presence: we are marked with LOVE, the very foundation of the Law and Gospel that Jesus so beautifully teaches in today's gospel. The Scribe got it right, so to speak. The greatest commandment combines Love with God, neighbor and self. It is never private but very personal and interpersonal, with God, who IS love, connecting us together.

Love binds us together when we allow it to do so. When you read this, the election will be over and we will have a new president. If only we allow Love to be the energy when responding to the outcome. I am writing this on November 2nd, All Souls Day, in Burgos with my hotel in the shadows of a magnificent cathedral. I am in a reflective as I think about how this building came about and what it can say our fragile country.

This beautiful structure goes back to the 11th and 12th centuries and has gone through numerous renovations to its Gothic structure. It is rich in history, architectural innovation, countless pieces of artwork, windows, vaults, chapels, several entrances, spires. The cathedral has seen so many changes in the city of Burgos, the political upheavals, wars, violence, advances in humanity and science to the impact of technology and new ways of looking at human nature. And the cathedral still stands. And so will our country. Hope never disappoints when love is the response not a reaction that is cynical and bitter. But what holds it up, supports and strengthens its foundation are the massive BUTTRESSES. Without them , it would collapse. The Love that is the foundation of Law, religion, ritual, institution and Gospel is what holds the "building" of the Church up: a magnificent building made of "human stone". Love strengthens the foundation, love binds us together, love is the spiritual energy that makes the church open and welcoming to all, love keeps our "doors" open, love most especially includes the sinner, the doubter, the most unlikely of human beings, as the SON shines THROUGH them creating colors of beauty.

The Church, like this cathedral, is always in need of restoration, renovation, changing the "architecture" to include new expressions of faith and theology. The buttresses of Love is the constant in this process of growth in beauty and the Truth. God IS LOVE!!! May LOVE prevail in these painful, divisive times. May WE BE LOVE to our country and our Church.



Saint Martin of Tours | November 11

Saint Martin of Tours was born a pagan in what is now Hungary around 316, but he was raised in Italy where his father, a tribune, was posted. At 15 he was compelled to serve in the Roman military, though he was already a catechumen. There is a popular legend that while on campaign the saint cut his cloak in half to share with a cold beggar. That night he dreamed of Jesus and his cloak was restored. He was baptized at 18. Only two years after his baptism, he was released from the military, he had refused his battle pay and to fight saying he was a soldier for Christ. He is the first recognized conscientious objector.

After his release from the military, he became a disciple of Hilary of Poitiers. He worked diligently against the Arian heresy, which denies the divinity of Jesus Christ, and established a community of hermits near Poitiers in 361, the first French monastery.

In 371 he reluctantly became bishop of Tour. Nearby, he founded a second monastery, Marmoutier, because he preferred the life of a monk he retreated often. In 384 there was a popular heresy infecting the Church in Spain, led by the bishop Priscillian and his followers. The emperor Magnus Maximus became involved, ordering the execution of the heretics. Saint Martin opposed the executions and protested the emperor's involvement in Church matters. Unfortunately, the Priscillians were executed anyway.

Saint Martin died in Candes-Saint-Martin, Gaul in 397. He is notably one of the first saints who was not martyred. He is the patron saint of France.

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini | November 13

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850 –1917) dreamed of being a missionary. She first served Italian immigrant populations, from New York to Chicago, and across the U.S. She is the first United States citizen to be canonized and is the Universal Patron of Immigrants.

Biography St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (July 15, 1850 – December 22, 1917) was born in the village of Sant'Angelo Lodigiano, Italy. Young Frances dreamed of being a missionary. She was educated to be a teacher by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart, but was refused entry to the order due to her poor health. Instead, she worked as a teacher and administrator at an orphanage in Cadogno, Italy, run by the Sisters of Providence. In September 1877, she made her vows there and took the religious habit, adding Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier.

When the orphanage closed in 1880, she founded the Institute of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In 1887, St. Frances Xavier Cabrini sought an audience with Pope Leo XIII, to seek permission to go as missionaries to China. He famously told her to go "not to the East, but to the West," and in 1889 she and six other sisters departed for New York, to serve Italian immigrants in the United States. However, anti-Italian and anti-immigrant attitudes were prevalent at the time, even in the Church. When she arrived, the archbishop advised her to go back to Italy. Undeterred, she provided education and healthcare within the Italian Catholic immigrant community.

At first, St. Frances Xavier Cabrini followed and served Italian immigrant populations, from New York to Chicago, and across the U.S., becoming a U.S. Citizen in 1909. Eventually she also founded institutions in Central and South America and Europe. Overall, she established 67 schools, hospitals, and orphanages. She was also known for her deep spirituality, often entering a trancelike state during the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament.

She died in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago, Illinois. She was canonized in 1946 by Pope Pius XII, the first United States citizen to be canonized. She is the Universal Patron of Immigrants. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, Pray for us!
