

# Gospel Meditation: 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

One hot Arizona summer afternoon my car ran out of gas. I phoned the parish office and begged for help. My secretary came and helped me fill the gas tank. She chided me, "If you can't manage getting your car from A to B, how can we expect you to guide the parish where it needs to go?" Point taken, Julie. I vowed to always make sure I have plenty of gas in my car.

The Lord Jesus chides us in this week's Gospel, too. He uses the two images of a man building a tower and a king marching soldiers into war to make this single point: acquire what is needed to follow him or look ridiculous. We rightly mock the builder who lacks money for his tower and the king with a short-handed army. But our mocking boomerangs back on us. How do we expect to follow Jesus to the end with insufficient detachment from our possessions and divided hearts?

The good news is, there is still time. Jesus is building a great tower to heaven-his own body. So we renounce all and give ourselves to him as his precious stones. Jesus is waging a battle against our enemy. So we forsake all and swear allegiance and march under his banner. In this way, we will finish what has begun in our discipleship. Or better put, our Lord will have the stones and soldiers required to see his great work through.



#### From Fr. Frank:

As I was praying on my retreat last week, I heard about the horrific tragedy that occurred at Annunciation Church: during Mass to celebrate the beginning of the school year, a deranged person opened fire, shooting through the stained glass windows killing two children and injuring many more. These horrible, senseless acts of violence using guns are occurring on a regular basis. What was something that could never even be imagined not so long ago, is now commonplace. Countless numbers of innocent lives, particularly children, have been brutally taken due to the stark reality of gun violence.

We keep saying something must be done but nothing changes. The "issue" is mired in political realities hinging on the interpretation of the Second Amendment. Powerful gun rights lobbies and a lot of money make this a reality that has divided our country, making any kind of substantive change next to impossible. There are more guns than people in our country, meaning well over 300,000 million, creating a culture of violence that leads to a total disregard for human life. Perhaps we need to revisit how we interpret the Second Amendment.

Prayer for the innocent victims must be accompanied by action, yet make no mistake about it, prayer is a powerful force in helping to transform hearts. Some of the comments by politicians calling into question the power of prayer show their crass ignorance. All our prayers, especially the Eucharist, engage our Lord to ACT in reaching out to those who suffer injustice. Christ ACTS through our prayers AND through our actions, rooted in social justice and the Beatitudes. This most certainly involves our faith influencing our political involvement and action. We must have both prayer and action.

I spent much of the time during on the retreat praying for various needs of parishioners and for all those involved in this act of violence at Annunciation Church. All of our prayers are making a difference in ways known only to God and all those being prayed for. Prayer is a powerful force for goodness and truth, a belief only possible with Faith.

On the weekend of September 13/14, the Little Sisters of the Poor will visit our Parish to share their vocation of hospitality to the elderly. St. Mary's Home in Chicago is one of 19 Homes for the elderly poor operated by the Little Sisters in the United States and in 31 countries around the world.

Acute and considerable continues to be their need for financial support. Virtually all of the current

Residents of St. Mary's Home qualify for Medicaid, and a few receive meager

pensions. But these modest funds cover, at best, about half of the annual expenses. The Little Sisters have ministered to thousands of elders in Chicago for 146 years. # Statement of Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, archbishop of Chicago, on the School Shooting in Minnesota

#### August 27, 2025

I have been following news reports on the shooting at Annunciation Church and School in Minnesota. While events are still unfurling, what we know now is that two children ages 8 and 10 were killed and 17 persons were injured, 14 of them children. Two children are in critical condition. While such shootings have sadly become commonplace, this one hits close to home, not only because it occurred at a Catholic school, but also because the gunman shot through the windows of a church where children and their teachers were praying at the start of a new school year. If any place should have been safe, it should have been there. If any time should have been safe, it should have been then. Tragically, we know no place or time when Americans – even children – are safe from the curse of gun violence. While we join our prayers with others that those injured in body and spirit will heal and that the murdered children will be received into heaven, we must also cry out for action to prevent even one more such tragedy.

The facts are clear. Guns are plentiful and common sense attempts to limit their availability have been largely rejected in the name of a freedom not found in our constitution. Cutbacks in funding for health care and social service programs will only exacerbate a national mental health crisis and increase alienation. We therefore pray for those who hold the power to make the safety of our people a national priority.

We ask God to give them the courage to take the steps they know will alleviate if not eliminate the fear parents must feel sending their children off to school and Americans feel leaving their homes for simple errands. Surely they must be moved by these shootings. We pray that they will not see them as inevitable because then we will have certainly surrendered our rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Please pray and please act.

The Loaves & Fishes ministry has been inviting guests indoors to enjoy their meal on Friday evenings.



# Devotions, Explained!

Lectio divina ("divine reading") is a practice of praying through the reading of Scripture, opening oneself to the inspiration and communication of the Holy Spirit.

The practice of Lectio divina dates to ancient monastic communities, but it has gained popularity in modern times as a way to meaningfully engage with the word of God.

The formula for Lectio divina is simple and follows four steps. The text of the Scripture is read (lectio) multiple times, and the reader takes note of any words or phrases that resonate with him in a particular way. The reader then reflects deeply on the passage (meditatio) and the words that he noticed, turning them over in his mind. Following this, the reader prays with the passage (oratio), and dialogues with God, inviting him to illuminate the reader's understanding of the text. Finally, there is rest and contemplation (contemplatio).

### Catholic Q&A:

Question: What Happens if Someone Drops a Consecrated Host?

#### Answer:

Despite our best efforts, and this is as true in our liturgical celebrations as in all of life, accidents happen. Occasionally at Mass, a host may be dropped or some of the Precious Blood could even be spilled from the chalice, despite the best efforts of the priests, deacons, and extraordinary ministers of holy Communion assisting at the liturgy.


So, when a host is dropped or the Precious Blood is spilled, we can take guidance from the U.S. Bishops' statement Norms for the Distribution for Holy Communion Under Both Kinds:


All ministers of Holy Communion should show the greatest reverence for the Most Holy Eucharist by their demeanor, their attire, and the manner in which they handle the consecrated bread or wine. Should there be any mishap — as when, for example, the consecrated wine is spilled from the chalice — then the affected "area . . . should be washed with water, and this water should be then poured into the sacrarium."

According to no. 280 of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, the general rule is that a dropped host is picked up by the minister distributing Communion and reverently consumed. The minster should be careful to make sure that no other particles from the host remain on the ground. As we see in the instruction from the bishops, the Precious Blood would be absorbed (customarily with a purificator) and the area attentively and reverently washed with water which would then be disposed of properly.
