

Gospel Meditation: The Exaltation of the Holy Cross

One of my favorite movies is the 1991 comedy What About Bob? Bill Murray plays a troubled, paranoid hypochondriac named Bob Wiley who innocently but annoyingly hounds Dr. Leo Marvin, played by Richard Dreyfuss. Bob is paralyzed by his fear of, well, everything, and is convinced the psychologist can heal him. But Dr. Marvin's failed attempts to heal Bob end up driving the doctor to attempt to murder Bob. He fails. The surprise is that, having faced death head on, Bob is suddenly healed. He attributes his healing to Dr Marvin for break-through "death therapy." In facing the cause of his deepest illness and dysfunction, Bob is healed.

Underneath this light-hearted comedy is a dead-serious resonance with this week's feast: the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. Christ is lifted up on the cross to force us to face the truth of sin and death. In that reckoning we find healing. Like Moses' snake on a pole, the cross says: this is what is causing your sickness – rebellion, disobedience, sin. Look at it! Don't run from it. Now seeing it exposed, we see life. We see our physician mercifully healing us. In this sense, we are all like Bob Wiley. The "death therapy" of the cross is our only hope for healing.

This week I invite you to "exalt the cross." If you don't have one in your house, get one. Use it for prayer. Gaze on it frequently. It teaches us to not be afraid. It heals us.



From Mark:

What do you hold up to others?

In this Sunday's readings we hear of different stories of folks healing coming through the lifting up of something.

In the first reading, we hear the story from Numbers in which Moses holds up pole in which people who had been bitten by snakes were healed.

This story is cited in John when Jesus says that the Son of Man must be lifted up so that all may have eternal life.

In our everyday life, these readings give us an invitation to think about what do we "hold up" in our own lives.

Are we like Moses and Jesus and "holding up" things that bring healing to the world?

Are we holding up things that heal the "snake bites" of the world?

There are different needs around us that can be brought to healing when we hold up a positive attitude, love, understanding, connection, invitation to community.

In a world that seems to be falling apart by the seams and where people are captured by an unhealthy individualism, we need people to go out into the world and hold these virtues up higher!

Hold your love and understanding higher than others hold their anger, suspicion, and hatred.

Take some time this week to reflect on the values you hold up in your life and put the most positive ones high above your head like you are Moses healing snake bites.

Fiscal 2025 Finance Report:



As outlined in the accompanying table, St Teresa's net surplus for fiscal 2025 (the year ending June 30, 2025) equaled \$211k. Excluding investment results, the net surplus equaled \$42k, a continuation of our more than decade long string of full year net surpluses.

The net surplus excluding investment results was \$20k higher than last year and \$77k better than budget. Per Archdiocese reporting guidelines, results are segregated between Net Ordinary (recurring activities) and Net Other (non-recurring activities). The favorable variances versus last year and budget resulted entirely from non-recurring activities included within Net Other.

Other Revenue included the first tranche of the parish's share of contributions to the Generation to Generation Capital Campaign (\$28k), a major gift to Loaves & Fishes (\$25k), prior year contributions for capital improvements recognized as income in the current year (\$19k), and support of Fr Frank's Camino de Santiago (\$11k), among others. Another \$25k gift to Loaves & Fishes was received this year but will be recognized as revenue next year.

Other Expenses were lower due to lower Capital Improvements. This year's capital improvements included expenditures for HVAC, kitchen equipment, and the roof, among others.

Net ordinary income, excluding investment results, equaled a loss of \$35k. This amount was \$48k below last year and \$31k below budget. A successful Together in Joy, included within Fundraising, accounted for the favorable revenue variances. However, higher Ordinary revenues were more than offset by higher expenses.

The unfavorable expense variances are largely the result of higher Salaries and Benefits. Staffing accounts for approximately 60 percent of recurring expenses, and the number of staff was at planned levels for the entire year. The variance versus last year largely reflects planned salary increases. The unfavorable variance versus budget reflects higher than forecast visiting priest costs and staff bonuses. These items will be better reflected in future budgets.

Looking ahead, the budget for next year anticipates a modest net loss. However, we will continue working diligently towards a full year net surplus. Thank you again for your attendance at Mass, your contributions of time to our ministries, and your financial support of the weekly collection and Together in Joy. They are essential to the parish's success.
