

Gospel Meditation: 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Before I was a priest, I was a lazy worker for a retail Apple store. Hearing a rumor that my boss was going to fire me, I secretly sold iPhones for half-price, gave away dozens of free iPads, and donated several brand-new laptops to managers in other stores in the mall. After a week, my boss called me into his office. He knew what I was up to. He said I had cost the store thousands of dollars. "Really great work, John," he said. "I am going to recommend you to be my assistant manager and double your pay." I was amazed.

And so are you. Which is understandable because it never happened. How could it? My tall tale is a retelling of Jesus' brow-furrowing parable we hear this week. A lazy, dishonest steward defrauds his boss and then the "master commended the dishonest servant for acting prudently" (Luke 16:8). What is the Lord saying to us?

Most of us treat our spiritual lives like a lazy teenager at an Apple store. We really don't care. We go through the motions. Then, if we are lucky, something happens that shakes us to spiritual action; to employ whatever time, money, and resources we have to build around us a strong network of love. Every saint did that. Our Lord is so good he wants us to use his stuff to forgive debts and to bless others. He wants us to ensure our future. So do it!



From Fr. Frank:

We have a Deacon!!! Yes, St. Teresa of Avila has been given the privilege of helping to prepare Brian Junkes, "yunkes", for ordination to the priesthood next May. He will first be ordained a transitional Deacon in October and will exercise his ministry as Deacon here at St. Teresa's from October through May.

Brian is a seminarian for the Divine Word Missionaries, an order of priests that works in a variety of parishes and ministries around the world. Brian will be involved in a number of our ministries, including our religious education program for children, our outreach ministries, helping with adult formation and serving as Deacon at our Sunday and holiday liturgies, including preaching. Deacons have the credentials to preach at public liturgies.

Brian will be introduced on Sunday, October 5, which will give parishioners an opportunity of giving him a warm welcome. We are blessed to have him as he prepares to be ordained to the priesthood. Brian was raised in West Palm Beach Florida, has much experience in martial arts (I won't get him angry), loves walking in nature and is preparing for a Masters of Divinity and a Research MA. What a great addition to our parish community!

He will be the Deacon at our masses on Sunday, October 19th.

Blessing of the Pets

On Sunday, October 5th we will commemorate the 800th anniversary of St. Francis of Assisi's Canticle of Creation, his magnificent poem/song giving praise to the beauty of God's Creation. Francis had a deep relationship with the various expressions of God's creating genius, including the sun, moon, stars, water, the wind, fire...his "brothers and sisters." This beautiful Canticle is displayed on the wall near our statue of St. Francis with images of these "brothers and sisters" illustrated with local, Chicago accents.

As part of this commemoration, pets will be blessed in honor of this Saint of animals, a wonderful expression of God's Creation. Bring your beloved pets to the church. They can come in the church provided they can behave themselves. If your dog gets a bit feisty, the gathering space or parish center can be places of refuge, for the dog and you. Please be cognizant of those parishioners who are either not fond of animals or have allergies. The well being of our parishioners takes precedence.

On October 12th we will celebrate the Feast of St. Teresa of Avila, the actual date of her Feast is October 15th.

On Sunday, October 26th, our 10:00 liturgy will celebrate the mystery and joy of Halloween and All Saints. Dressing up, carving pumpkins, baking delicious, spooky treats will add a festive nature to the celebration. The traditions of Halloween are rooted in Celtic culture and they allow the unknown mysteries of the world to emerge, causing wonderment and a bit of unexplainable fright. A "creaking" sound in the middle of the night can rouse one from sleep. A rumbling of thunder quickens the beat of the heart.

October will be a delightfully busy time.



Fiscal 2025 Finance Report:



As outlined in the accompanying table, St Teresa's net surplus for fiscal 2025 (the year ending June 30, 2025) equaled \$211k. Excluding investment results, the net surplus equaled \$42k, a continuation of our more than decade long string of full year net surpluses.

The net surplus excluding investment results was \$20k higher than last year and \$77k better than budget. Per Archdiocese reporting guidelines, results are segregated between Net Ordinary (recurring activities) and Net Other (non-recurring activities). The favorable variances versus last year and budget resulted entirely from non-recurring activities included within Net Other.

Other Revenue included the first tranche of the parish's share of contributions to the Generation to Generation Capital Campaign (\$28k), a major gift to Loaves & Fishes (\$25k), prior year contributions for capital improvements recognized as income in the current year (\$19k), and support of Fr Frank's Camino de Santiago (\$11k), among others. Another \$25k gift to Loaves & Fishes was received this year but will be recognized as revenue next year.

Other Expenses were lower due to lower Capital Improvements. This year's capital improvements included expenditures for HVAC, kitchen equipment, and the roof, among others.

Net ordinary income, excluding investment results, equaled a loss of \$35k. This amount was \$48k below last year and \$31k below budget. A successful Together in Joy, included within Fundraising, accounted for the favorable revenue variances. However, higher Ordinary revenues were more than offset by higher expenses.

The unfavorable expense variances are largely the result of higher Salaries and Benefits. Staffing accounts for approximately 60 percent of recurring expenses, and the number of staff was at planned levels for the entire year. The variance versus last year largely reflects planned salary increases. The unfavorable variance versus budget reflects higher than forecast visiting priest costs and staff bonuses. These items will be better reflected in future budgets.

Looking ahead, the budget for next year anticipates a modest net loss. However, we will continue working diligently towards a full year net surplus. Thank you again for your attendance at Mass, your contributions of time to our ministries, and your financial support of the weekly collection and Together in Joy. They are essential to the parish's success.


