



Gospel Meditation: Fourth Sunday of Advent

A priest friend recently told me a remarkable story. One of his cousins reported having a vivid dream in which an angel told him the family needed to exhume their grandmother’s body from a cemetery in New York and return it to her birthplace in Romania. She had been dead nearly 10 years. As you might expect, the family thought it was, well, crazy. But astonishingly they exhumed her body. It was incorrupt, showing no signs of decomposition. That experience sparked healing, faith, and reconciliation throughout the family.

In this Sunday’s Gospel, Joseph also receives a dream. He’s confused, afraid. But in the quiet of sleep, God speaks: “Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home” (Matthew 1:20). When he wakes, Joseph acts. He doesn’t overanalyze or dismiss the message. He trusts, and acts.


God still speaks — not necessarily through literal dreams but through those deeper intuitions of the heart. St. Ignatius of Loyola taught that God’s voice draws us into peace, courage, and love. But we have to listen to it. Advent is a time for stillness. As we prepare for Christ’s coming, we’re invited to enter that quiet space where God’s voice can be heard.

When and how do you become most receptive to God? Is it in silence? In prayer? In nature? At Mass? This week, go there. Be still. Listen. And like Joseph, have the courage to act on what God shows you.

From Fr. Frank:

I was walking down a street in Assisi, taking in the beauty of Christmas slowly coming alive, watching the people decorate their shops and dwellings, and this the first week of December! Christmas isn't just to make one feel good and rush the season, but a "preparation" having deep religious significance. Yes, I was actually experiencing ADVENT!!!! How ironic to have an experience of this beautiful season of anticipation in a foreign country. In America, we've pretty much ignore Advent completely, except at Sunday Mass. We want Christmas and we want in now, in November!

As I was walking, I heard a tiny "ding" sound but kept walking forward until a woman came up behind me and said, "ring," pointing down on the pavement to a silver ring... my ring!! It slipped from my finger and truly felt nothing. She smiled as I thanked her and she took my hand. It was clear in those few seconds she didn't speak English but I asked her as best as I could, "Where are you from? I am American."

Her face brimmed with joy as she said, "Kiev." Stunned, I repeated the name and just said, "Ukraine?" She nodded and the smile disappeared. All I could do was make the sign of the Cross and put my hands together in prayer. The last thing she kept saying was, "please... please," but it wasn't quite the word "please". She was trying to communicate something to me but I just walked away slowly, waving my hand. After a lot of prayer, it came to me that she was saying "priest," and I had no collar or clergy shirt on.

This is one advent I'll never forget. Let Christ come into your life with a heart not focused on Christmas decorations but on waiting for Him to come to you. It's quite simple. Christ came to me in that woman from Kiev who heard that little "ding" sound.

Many thanks to Michael \_\_\_\_\_ for waking up early to take these outstanding photos.



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
## Calling All Those Who Enjoy Cooking!






## Saint John the Apostle | December 27

Saint John was one of the Twelve, part of Jesus' inner circle, among the few that witnessed the Transfiguration, the raising of Jarius' Daughter, and the Agony in the garden at Gethsemane. He and his brother James were the sons of Zebedee and Salome. When Jesus called them, they left their father mending nets and followed him. Jesus called the brothers "Boanerges," meaning "sons of thunder" — they were passionate in their faith and Jesus had to rebuke them for their fiery zeal on more than one occasion. John, the younger brother, possibly the youngest disciple, was the only one present at Jesus' death.

Saint John the Apostle is traditionally thought to be the author of the fourth Gospel, the three Epistles of John, and the Book of Revelation. However, there has been some debate among scholars from antiquity to the present. Tradition also gives him the title Beloved Disciple and John's Gospel sees him seated next to Jesus at the last supper and the one to whom Jesus gives the care of Mary at the crucifixion.

Although Church tradition says that John survived the other disciples, living a long life, much of it is steeped in myth and legend. Some say he retired to Ephesus after the crucifixion with Mary and remained there until he died. But in other traditions he is more active. For a time he remained in Jerusalem with the other disciples, then founded churches in Asia Minor. In a legend of his persecution, during the reign of the Emperor Domitian, John is taken to Rome and thrown into a cauldron of boiling oil but preserved from death. He is then exiled to the island of Patmos where the Book of Revelation was written.

Most accounts agree that after his exile and the Assumption of Mary he returned to Ephesus where he died sometime after 98, during the reign of the emperor Trajan.

### Catholic Q & A :

#### Tithing vs. Stewardship

##### Question:

What is the difference between tithing and stewardship?

##### Answer:

Both tithing and stewardship are part of a spiritual way of life that calls us to use all of our resources for the service of the Gospel. Everything we are and everything we have comes from God. Offering back to God what He has given us is part of how we worship and give thanks to God.

Tithing is the practice of giving back 10 percent of what we earn. It comes from the Old English word for “ten.” The first Scriptural example of tithing came from Abraham who gave a tenth of his possessions to the priest Melchizedek. He did so as an act of thanksgiving to God.

Stewardship as a way of life calls us to use well all that we have and all that we are, placing all things in service of others and God. Stewardship helps us see the good we can accomplish by making God and our spiritual life the most important values in our life. Whatever we accumulate in this life stays here. We can’t take it with us! Both tithing and stewardship help us remember that nothing is mine or even ours ... all belongs to God.

### Devotions, Explained!

#### Las Posadas, Explained!

Las Posadas, typically celebrated between Dec. 16 and Dec. 25, is a Mexican tradition which recreates the Holy Family’s search for lodging in Bethlehem. A novenario, or a devotion which extends over a period of nine days, Las Posadas is a celebration of anticipation for the birth of Jesus Christ, who seeks refuge in the heart of every man and woman.

Each night of Las Posadas, a couple portraying Mary and Joseph knocks on the doors of different homes looking for a place to stay. Traditionally, the Holy Family is accompanied by a procession of people singing hymns and bearing candles who stand outside the home as they are denied entry again and again. Finally, they come to the “inn,” the house or church that welcomes them. Carols are sung, a feast is enjoyed and star-shaped piñatas are broken open.

Still practiced in Mexico today, Las Posadas has also become an important cultural and spiritual touchstone for communities of Mexican immigrants who have moved abroad.
