

ONE SVN SHINES on the Moravian vineyards, but they give wines of infinite variety, characterised by their fruity taste and spiciness, their broad spectrum of aromas and their typical full flavour. The diversity of Moravian wines results from a surprising number of grape varieties, the variability of the landscape and the terroir of the vineyards. If you set out to discover the magic of Moravia, you will be surprised by a multitude of varieties, experiences and inspiring encounters. WELCOME TO MORAVIA!

FROM HISTORY TO THE PRESENT

Viticulture in South Moravia is one of the oldest in Europe; vine has probably been grown here since the time of the Celts, and experts claim that nowhere else in the world are there as many small wine cellars as here. Moravian wines already had a good reputation in the Middle Ages; they were distributed throughout Moravia and Bohemia and supplied to aristocratic and bourgeois houses; interest in them was in Poland and Silesia.

When King John of Luxembourg decreed in 1325 that no Austrian wines could be served in Brno from the grape harvest until Easter, the experienced wine tasters were put outside the city gates. If we are looking for proof that wine from South Moravia has always had a distinctive character, here it is - the wine tasters tested the origin of imported wines on the spot and only allowed Moravian wines into the city. Just like today's lovers of Moravian wines, they were able to recognise ripe and juicy acids, rich extracts, spiciness and a pronounced

The coats of arms of Moravian towns and villages often depicted goblets, branches, grapes, vine leaves and wine knives. Mikulov has two curved vine knives in its coat of arms, a bunch of grapes is depicted on the town seal of Hustopeče, and an original document from 1580 has been preserved authorising the municipality of Dolní Dunajovice to use the coat of arms with the theme of wine.



VARIETIES

Moravian white wines are characterised by an interesting aroma, rich extractives and a harmonious combination of full flavour with fresh acids. Thanks to modern processing technology, red wines are fullbodied and pronounced, with fruity, soft, velvety tones in their flavour and aroma. A common feature of white and red wines is an extraordinarily diverse range of varieties.

Although vineyards with grape varieties from France and Germany have been planted in Moravia since the 13th century, only cuvées were produced at that time, which were prepared according to traditional customs. Sylvaner, also known as "Morávka", was probably the most widely cultivated white grape variety at the time. Blauer Portugieser, which Count de Fries brought to Austria from Portugal in 1772, was also very popular at the time. Rotgipfler, Jakubské or Modrý Janek are the varieties that disappeared due to the phylloxera catastrophe at the beginning of the 20th century, and since then the Grüner Veltliner, Müller Thurgau, Riesling, Welschriesling, Pinot Gris, Blaufränkisch and Saint Laurent varieties have prevailed.

A network of more than a thousand kilometres of well-signposted cycle paths crosses the area of all Moravian wine sub-regions.

VINEYARDS - SOIL

The Moravian wine region consists of four sub-regions: Znojemská, Mikulovská, Velkopavlovická and Slovácká. It covers about 96% of vineyards area in the Czech Republic, while the total area under vineyards in Moravia is 17,025 hectares. Different geological origins and soil composition, a climate that differs from most European wine-growing regions and a very rugged landscape relief - these are three main reasons why Moravia in particular offers unique and infinitely versatile wines that are characterised by their full-bodied taste and a particularly gentle spiciness from ripened but not overripe grapes that emphasise their freshness. Over the last twenty years, Moravian viticulture has undergone great quality development and our wines are now among the best in Europe.



The wine trails zigzag between vineyards and orchards, connecting the most beautiful places in the Moravian countryside and not missing a single sight. Thanks to them, you will get to know the Moravian countryside as a land of picturesque landscapes, unique historical monuments and excellent wines. The cycle routes generally lead along quiet roads, sometimes along field and forest paths and can be travelled on both mountain bikes and normal road bikes.

The originators of the idea of the wine trails have involved 250 wine-growing

communities in this project, marked 1,300 kilometres of routes and published special maps for the individual hiking trails. On each of these maps you will find sufficient information not only about interesting places in the region, the length of the individual trails, but also about their altitude profile and surface. All hiking trails are marked with a common logo, which differs in colour depending on the trail. Interesting places and services near the hiking trails are marked with information signs, and in the wine-growing communities you will find information about open wine cellars, communal wine shops and other points of interest. Ten tourist circuits offer a range of combinations for excursions and multi-day stays full of active exercise, enjoyable experiences and adventure.

Not only the vineyards and orchards, but also the Podyjí National Park and the mediaeval castles and chateaux are famous tourist attractions of the Znojmo region. The region's main variety is Grüner Veltliner, but Riesling, Müller Thurgau, Sauvignon Blanc and Pinot Gris are also popular. The surroundings of Dolní Kounice and the Jihlava river valley are famous for the production of red wines, especially Blaufränkisch and St. Laurent.

An enchanting landscape dominated by the limestone slopes of the Pálava Hills, which have always been planted with vines. This hot piece of land above the Dyje river valley is known for the best sites for growing Welschriesling grapes. Grüner Veltliner, Riesling, Chardonnay and Sauvignon Blanc also thrive here. The Vine Cultivation Station in Perná has produced the Pálava and Aurelius varieties.

Velké Pavlovice, one of the sunniest and warmest places in the Czech Republic, is a centre for the production of red wines, especially Blaufränkisch, Saint Laurent and Zweigelt, thanks to its ideal location and favourable climate and soil conditions. Among the white wines, Grüner Veltliner, Müller Thurgau and other most cultivated varieties - Welschriesling, Pinot Gris and Chardonnay - are represented.

Slovácko is a paradise for sun worshippers and those seeking relaxation; the hilly landscape with its vineyards, old pilgrimage sites and the culinary specialities of the region will revitalise your body and soul perfectly. Riesling, Müller Thurgau and Chardonnay thrive here, as well as red wines - Blaufränkisch and Zweigelt. The Moravian Muscat variety was cultivated at the Vine Cultivation Station in Polešovice.
