FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS DURING THE CONSULTATION PERIOD



FAQs raised during consultation:

- Does priority access reduce the voluntary nature of the CRM if it creates inefficiencies in the energy market?
- Does the queue model deter future investment if future generators face all the congestion risk?
- There are concerns raised about the impact of priority access on the connections process – including both delays to connect and a rush to connect.
 - What are the assumptions made about the impact of the queue or tier position in the connections process?
- The design intent of priority access is to improve investor confidence, and the ability to manage congestion risk. Some members have said they do not have confidence that it will deliver that objective.
 - Why would this model not deliver that? What is your thinking?

We would like to share our project team views and to explore how TWG members are considering the matters. We want to better understand the underlying issues and assumptions, so that we can factor these considerations into the model design to address them.
