

THE SAGRADA FAMÍLIA: A WORK IN PROGRESS

D ating back to the 1880s, Antoni Gaudí devoted over a decade of his life to one of Barcelona's most renowned structures, the Sagrada Família. When Gaudí died, less than a quarter of the project was complete. The cathedral has remained under construction for hundreds of years as debates concerning whether or not its current state is too far from the original vision continue to spark controversy.

Today, more than 130 years later, the building of the church follows Gaudí's original plan. It is some time now since the old wagons gave way to powerful cranes, the old manual tools have been replaced by precise electric machines and the materials have been improved to ensure excellent quality in the building process and the final result.

Even after years of construction, however, the Sagrada Família is still years away from completion. This is largely due to the fact that the construction work is mainly funded by tourists' entrance fees.

The architect Jordi Bonet led the construction work

for about 30 years. Bonet, the son of an architect who assisted Gaudí, was introduced to the Sagrada Família as a child at 7 years of age. Bonet is a true believer in the idea that Gaudí left room in his vision for creative liberties to be taken. He told *The Times*, "Almost every cathedral has been the work of many people and over many centuries. Even when Gaudí was in charge, there were 40 different sculptors working for him, and of course he inspired them, intervened and commented on their work – but it remained the work of several different sculptors."

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Bonet focused on the altar area, a place where Gaudí has not left strict guidelines (for other parts, Gaudí has outlined instructions in writings, drawings and plaster models).

Although thousands have contributed to the work in progress, there is still no definite end point in sight. In 2012 architect Jordi Fauli replaced Jordi Bonet as chief architect of the works of the Sagrada Família.
