



## 15th Jakarta Biennale showcases Australia-Indonesia artistic collaboration

The artistic dialogue between Indonesia and Australia was highlighted this month with the successful launch of 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art's *Vertical Villages: Level Up* installation at the 15th Jakarta Biennale.

4A, Australia's leading Asian Australian contemporary art organisation, has a long history of artistic collaboration with Indonesia. For over 18 years, 4A has continually fostered artistic and community ties between Australia and Asia, this time using their Indonesian experience and networks to mount the ambitious cross-cultural project that is showing at the 15th Jakarta Biennale, until the end of next week.

4A's Director, Aaron Seeto said of the Vertical Villages - Level Up project;

`It is a timely demonstration of the real value of long-term, cross-cultural engagement, and people to people links, in maintaining ongoing regional dialogue.'

*Vertical Villages: Level Up* is the second phase of a collaboration between 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, Jakarta based art collective ruangrupa ArtLab and Sydney based artist Keg de Souza. Earlier this year ruangrupa and De Souza were artists-in-residence at 4A, during which they investigated the experiences of international students living in Sydney's CBD.

The socially engaged project draws on links between Sydney and Jakarta, and shared experiences of a diverse group of students and teachers from international schools and residential developments in Jakarta, as well as Indonesian students living in Australia. The resulting installations examine the role that education has played in increasing mobility and status within the region.

Project Curator Toby Chapman said:

*`Vertical Villages: Level Up* worked closely with expatriate communities and students from various international schools in Jakarta to initiate a dialogue regarding the role of education in the region. Our research was able to elucidate how tertiary education fosters long-term relationships between Sydney and Jakarta.'

Says Seeto;

'4A, and other Australian arts organisations focusing on Asia, play a critical role in sustaining cross-cultural engagement and fostering connections at the grass roots level.'

### About Vertical Villages

Vertical Villages: Level Up is the second phase of the collaboration between ruangrupa ArtLab, Keg de Souza and 4A, presented at the 15th Jakarta Biennale 2013. Vertical Villages: Level Up is based on the theme of the 15th Jakarta Biennale, 'siasat' - translated as 'tactics' - which unpacks the strategies individuals and communities apply to navigate and negotiate the urban environment of Jakarta.

As a continuation of the research in Sydney, *Vertical Villages: Level Up* investigates the spatial and social experiences of students who attend international or private schools in Jakarta, many of whom will migrate to Australia for a tertiary education. Over the last twenty years a number of political and economic factors have led to the rise of a middle class in Jakarta. This development, alongside an influx of expatriate living in the city have influenced spatial changes in Jakarta, including new high-rise and gated community developments as well as over 120 international schools and private colleges

Level Up investigates the nature of these enclaves and the role that education has come to play in people's desire for increased mobility and status. The artists engaged with a diverse group of students and teachers from international schools to garner information about what an international educational involves. A number of Indonesian students currently studying in Australia were also interviewed as a means of creating connections between lived experiences of Jakarta and Sydney.

Vertical Villages: Level Up was the only project with an Australian participating artist at the main biennale venue.
