Dinosaur Designs (Louise Olsen, Stephen Ormandy, Liane Rossler) creates distinctive, bold jewellery and contemporary homewares. They are inspired by natural forms, textures, hues and colours, and each piece is handmade and imbued with care, quality and individuality. Dinosaur Designs has four stores in Sydney and Melbourne and has outlets in Tokyo, London, Milan and throughout the USA.

**Peter Atkins** is a Sydney based painter. His exhibition last year titled Soft Edge, presented a series of starkly graphic paintings that drew on the shapes of domestic and representation and abstraction, art and life. Atkins was the representative for Australia in the 1994 Indian Triennial, and has exhibited extensively in Australia and internationally including France, Italy, Taiwan, Japan and Korea.

Pol Nettleton studied fashion in Sydney and worked in London in the early 80s. before travelling to Japan where he became a designing icon and fashion star. Nettleton worked in Japan for eight years designing clothes, jewellery, hats and shoes, and collaborating on projects with Japanese artists. He returned to Sydney in the 90s, where he designs for a regular clientele. Nettleton's designs are at once, sophisticated couture and passionately bizarre. They are as complex and intricately constructed as an origami crane, yet infused with honest self awareness and sensuality.

He has participated in various group exhibitions since migrating to Sydney including Fresh Art at S.H Ervin Gallery and Beyond China at the Campbelltown Regional Gallery.

Collette Dinnigan's lavish couture is instantly recognisable. She first started making exquisite lingerie for a small clientele, in fine silks and lace, and within a year had become the darling of fashion editors and exclusive boutiques. Dinnigan's confidence and love of intricate, quality fabrics ensured that she maintained her **Clinton Garofano** is a Sydney based artist vision of designing romantic creations that whis-

pered with an aura of innocent, nostalgic beauty. Dinnigan is now planning to extend her range of lingerie and couture, to include shoes, hosiery and perfume.

Bronwyn Oliver is an established Australian sculptor whose works are concerned with forms which dissolve into light and shadow. These whimsical copper wire sculptures play with negative space, suggesting a search for another state of being. Oliver was awarded the Moet & Chandon Australian Art Foundation Fellowship in 1994, and has exhibited throughout Australia, the UK, Europe and Asia.

Kewday Skateboards for Bartie House of Accessories predominantly design skateboards, and are currently concerned with the impact of the internet in the circulation of original images, logos and ideas. Kewday are based on the Gold Coast and distribute their boards throughout Australia and the US.

Scott Redford is interested in Kurt Cobain as an archetypal avant-garde figure. His installations frequently feature pop posters and text which question Cobain as a model of artistic life. Redford shows his work regularly at Bellas Gallery, Brisbane and Sutton Gallery, Melbourne. He has also been included in numerous Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras exhibitions. A monograph on his work titled "Guy in the Dunes" has also been published by the Institute of Modern Art in Brisbane.

Ron Muncaster's costumes are synonymous with the Sydney Gay & Lesbian Mardi Gras parade, for which he has been designing since 1981. At that time the focus of the

event was a political march, and it was Muncaster and friends - who loved dressing up - who changed it into the carnival atmosphere that we know today. Muncaster's extraordinary designs have been exhibited in the Australian Museum and the National Gallery, and are in the collection of the Powerhouse Museum and the new National Museum of Australia.

Nike Savvas is a Sydney based artist whose intensely bright and dazzling installations draw upon childhood memories and fairy stories. Savvas has recently returned from staging solo exhibitions in Europe, and has also exhibited throughout Australia and the Pacific, in shows such as the 1997 Moet & Chandon Tour and Australian Perspecta. Natasha Ivachoff from PIGSINSPACE designs for young women who are slightly naughty, overtly sexy and who have fun with fashion. Miles Whippy is a young Sydney based artist. His paintings and installations are funky and street inspired, with a refreshing spontaneity and immediate impact. Whippy has recently completed a studio residency at Artspace and has created site specific installations throughout spaces in Sydney, including a building site in George Street.
