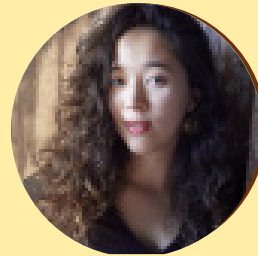

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR/ CEO'S MESSAGE

Over the past year, 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art has continued to deliver strongly against the priorities of our NUWORLDS Strategy, demonstrating organisational resilience, artistic ambition and deepened community impact. Working through a partnership-led model, we have strengthened our foundations while expanding the scale and reach of our programs.

A key milestone was the successful completion of our match-fundraising campaign Plus1, supported by Creative Australia and directed support towards the growth of 4A LAB and our emerging artist initiatives. This outcome reflects increasing philanthropic confidence in 4A's vision and future. We also completed significant capital works, including improved accessibility, a new physical connection between 4A LAB and the lower-level galleries, energy-efficient LED lighting and a renovated kitchen. Together, these upgrades enhance visitor experience, support staff workflows and contribute to the long-term sustainability of the organisation.

Community-centred practice remained at the heart of our work. Club 4A at AsiaTOPA extended 4A's engagement with Asian and diasporic audiences nationally, while 4A LAB continued to nurture early-career artists through residencies, mentorship and public outcomes. Across the year, our programming engaged 22 diasporic communities as artists, collaborators and audiences, reflecting the breadth of voices shaping 4A.

This year also marked a step-change in the scale and visibility of our artistic program. Highlights included Chunxiao Qu's first institutional exhibition in Sydney, the Man&Wah commission through Creative Australia's Visual Arts and Craft Strategy grant, the national tour of Dr Christian Thompson AO's House of Gold, *Infinite Scroll* at the University of Sydney's Chau Chak Wing Museum and a *Tear in the Fabric* at Bathurst Regional Art Gallery. These projects demonstrate 4A's capacity to originate, co-produce and sustain ambitious work across multiple contexts.

Digital innovation continues to shape 4A's distinctive contribution to the sector. The Transmedia Worldbuilding program supported South Asian women and gender-fluid creatives in developing immersive projects, while *Haymarket 2050* offered a research and development phase for an augmented reality walking experience – imagining future urban narratives.

These achievements reflect the collective effort of artists, communities, partners and supporters. Together, we are ensuring 4A remains a resilient, responsive and forward-looking organisation – one that continues to champion Asian Australian and diasporic voices while shaping new possibilities for contemporary art.

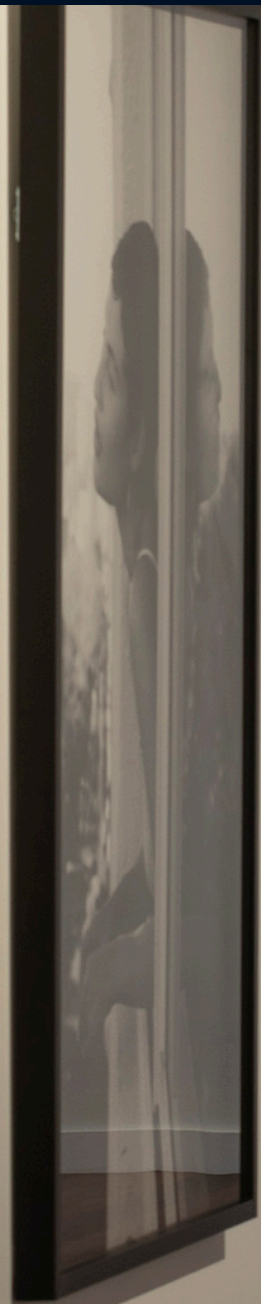

Reflecting on experiences of discrimination, stigma and hate speech, these artists transformed notions of harm into gestures of self-affirmation, exploring identity, sexuality, gender and the migrant experience as acts of personal and collective healing.

MAN&WAH: Propagate/Germinate/Bloom

Propagate/Germinate/Bloom, was a major commission by Brisbane-based artist duo Man&Wah. Transforming the gallery into an immersive, cosmic environment, the exhibition blended soundscape, installation, large-scale prints, plants and video projections. Drawing on their migration from Asia to Australia, the artists reflected on memory, identity and the interconnection of life and the universe. Plants, buds and blossoms became metaphors for cosmic forces, embodying cycles of growth, energy and transformation. Across photography, moving image and site-specific installation, Man&Wah shared vivid stories from Hong Kong and Australia, offering audiences a spiritually resonant, contemplative experience that celebrated nature, memory and the mysteries of existence.

A TEAR IN THE FABRIC

A Tear in the Fabric presented new and existing works by nine Asian and Asian Australian artists who employ distortion as a mode of aesthetic and conceptual disruption. Presented in partnership with Bathurst Regional Art Gallery, the exhibition examined how artists challenge established forms and conventions through material, visual and narrative interventions. INFINITE SCROLL 荧屏沉溺

Infinite Scroll 荧屏沉溺 brought together three Chinese artists whose practices examine the cultural and political dynamics of contemporary online life. Through humour, parody and interactivity, Xia Han, Gao Hang and Ye Funa explore how digital platforms shape behaviour, identity and perception.

Across video, game engines and AI-generated avatars, the artists remix the visual languages of internet culture to reflect on the systems that structure digital participation. By exposing the mechanics behind digital environments, *Infinite Scroll* invites viewers to reflect on their own position within the continuous flow of images that shapes everyday life online.

INTERNATIONAL INITIATIVES



High Altitude Exchange

Arts House Melbourne, 4A Centre for Contemporary Art Sydney and Kalā Kulo Kathmandu co-designed *High Altitude Exchange*, a reciprocal residency and exchange program connecting First Nations artists from Australia with Adivasi artists from Nepal. The initiative centred artists' agency in international conversations on Indigeneity and supported dialogue on history, geopolitics, the environment and contemporary issues through creative practice. Following residencies in Nepal and Naarm/Melbourne, the Sydney phase concluded the program with exchanges and a symposium at 4A featuring presentations, screenings and discussions reflecting on creative practice as a space of translation memory movement and shared resilience across landscapes and communities.

Transmedia Worldbuilding Residency

4A LAB, in partnership with Antariksha Studio, welcomed five South Asian Australian women and gender-diverse artists to this year's *Transmedia Worldbuilding Residency*. The program supports practitioners working at the intersection of art, technology and cultural storytelling.

Across six months, participants undertake a collaborative online development process and a one-week intensive at 4A LAB, engaging with tools such as Unreal Engine alongside mentorship from international industry leaders. The residency will culminate in public presentations at 4A LAB and the 4A+ platform, and internationally at EyeMyth Festival, Mumbai, showcasing new transmedia prototypes.

FILM SCREENINGS: SUMMER SHORTS

Presented in partnership with Platform Asia, 4A hosted *Summer Shorts*, an evening of short film screenings. The program brought together Australian and UK-based filmmakers from the Asian diaspora, offering audiences a cross-regional snapshot of emerging moving-image practices.

Spanning experimental fiction, documentary and hybrid forms, the films explored themes of queerness, grassroots resistance, intergenerational care, environmental memory and cultural heritage.

4A TALKS: CURATORIAL VOICE

As part of 4A TALKS, this program brought together curators and artists to explore contemporary practice across Vietnam and Mongolia – contexts often underrepresented globally. Vietnamese curator Linh Lê presented a screening and talk examining how artists have depicted working-class life in rapidly urbanising conditions, highlighting shifts from collective histories to personal perspectives.

Curator Tian Zhang convened a panel discussion on Mongolia's evolving arts ecology and the development of the 2025 Ulaanbaatar Biennale. The program fostered cross-regional dialogue and deepened understanding of artistic exchange across Asia and Australia.

4A LAB is a dynamic hub where art, technology, and experimentation converge to shape digital culture and drive industry innovation. As a hyper-curated street-level space, it is activated by creative practitioners including artists, technologists and thinkers.

4A LAB platforms emerging artists, showcases independent media and highlights artist-made products. Visually accessible 24/7 and dedicated to Asia-Pacific contemporary arts practice, it serves as an incubator for new ideas, fosters diverse artistic expressions and engages new audiences.

ANTIVENOM: VERMIN

ANTIVENOM: VERMIN was a site-specific installation and immersive showroom exploring how an environmental hazard – the feral cane toad – can be transformed into a sustainable luxury fashion material. Artist, designer and curator Lia Tabrah, in collaboration with Perina Drummond, examines the cane toad as a cultural figure, environmental pest and fashion design resource. The project highlights the scale of ecological damage across Australia while demonstrating the creative potential of repurposing this invasive species.

HAYMARKET 2050: Community Stories Gathering

Haymarket 2050 is a multidisciplinary creative tourism project that reimagines Sydney's Haymarket through augmented memory and speculative futures. It is led by interdisciplinary creative directors Gene Leung and Dan Tse of INJURY X REAL PARENT.

In 2025, Leung and Tse undertook the project's first phase, gathering stories from residents, community leaders, business owners and workers connected to Sydney's Chinatown across generations. These experiences, memories and hopes informed the fully realised *Haymarket 2050* project, presented in March 2026.

CLUB 4A x Asia TOPA

Since 2018, CLUB 4A has reimagined how leading artists from Asia and the subcontinent are presented, shifting their work beyond traditional galleries into social, embodied contexts that generate new meaning and resonance. Through its partnership with Asia TOPA, CLUB 4A extended to Melbourne, creating a communal platform that pushes the boundaries of cultural expression and participation.

CLUB 4A x Asia TOPA is an immersive nightlife experience exploring Asian futurist themes through a dynamic blend of visual art, performance and sound. Set within the club environment, the project uncovers layered histories, identities and cultural narratives, transforming the night into a space where past, present and speculative futures intersect.

HAYMARKET UP LATE

In 2025, 4A continued its partnership with local contemporary art spaces to present *Haymarket Up Late*, a dynamic late-night program celebrating the creative energy of Haymarket. Galleries, laneways and public spaces came alive with experimental installations, artist talks, and site-responsive works, inviting audiences to experience the precinct in new ways.

This year, our partnership also extended to Neon Playground, with 4A featuring two window commissions by Chunxiao Qu, further activating public space. The initiative strengthened connections between artists, local businesses and cultural organisations, providing an immersive platform for artistic experimentation and intercultural dialogue. It also enhanced night-time cultural activity and reinforced 4A's role in the precinct's creative ecosystem.

Ripple: Disability and Culturally Diverse Internship

In 2025, 4A welcomed Australian Pakistani filmmaker and content creator Sufiya Naqvi as part of the Ripple Internship program, delivered by Arts NSW and Diversity Arts Australia. Based in Western Sydney, Sufiya joined the 4A team to contribute across a range of projects, including updating the organisation's accessibility guide and supporting curatorial and communications work for upcoming exhibitions through text development and social media content.

Reflecting on her experience, Sufiya shared:

"I feel immensely grateful to have completed the Ripple Internship with 4A. The time went by so fast, but the connections and knowledge I gained will stay with me. Interning at 4A helped me appreciate how important it is to have spaces that celebrate both the work of artists and the artists themselves.

As a CALD artist, I've experienced barriers to finding creative spaces that feel supportive. Working with the team at 4A allowed me to contribute insights on how the organisation can continue strengthening cultural inclusion and accessibility for people with disability. I look forward to seeing more opportunities and positive change across our beautifully diverse arts sector."

Through the Ripple Internship, 4A continues to support pathways for emerging practitioners from culturally diverse backgrounds, strengthening access, inclusion and professional development across the contemporary arts sector.

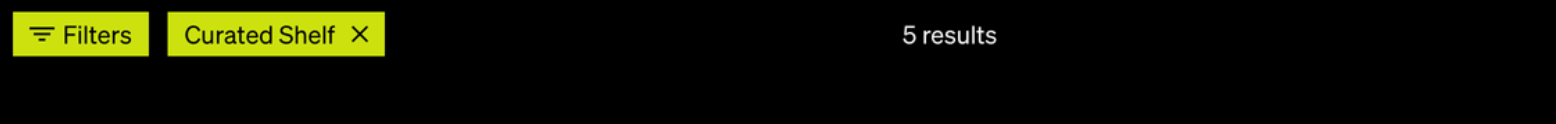
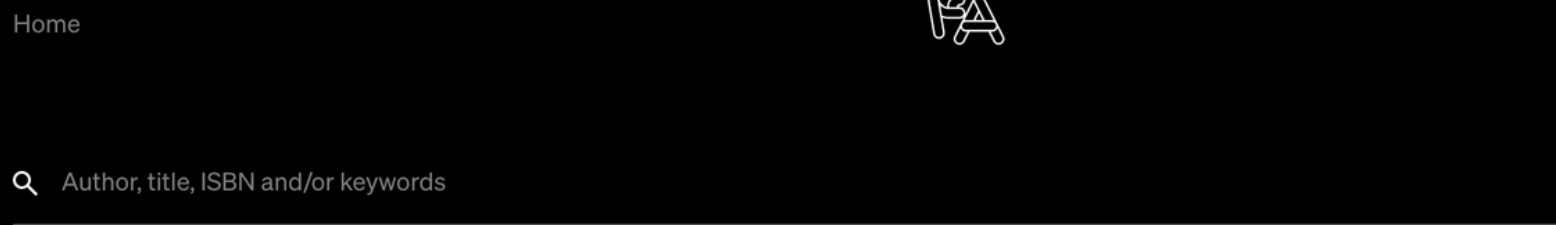


4A LIBRARY

Over more than 30 years, the 4A Library has grown into a vital archive of contemporary Asian and Australian art, shaped by donations, strategic acquisitions and archived exhibition publications. In 2024, the collection entered a new chapter with the launch of a digital catalogue and a dedicated library space at 4A in Haymarket, significantly enhancing access for scholars, students and the broader community.

While the collection remains non-lending, visitors can now browse the catalogue online, reserve titles and read them onsite – strengthening the Library’s role as a hub for research and discovery.

Supported by a new grant from the NSW Government, we also established a welcoming public reading area. Here, curated selections of books connected to current exhibitions invite deeper engagement, creating meaningful links between art, ideas and audiences, and enriching the overall visitor experience.

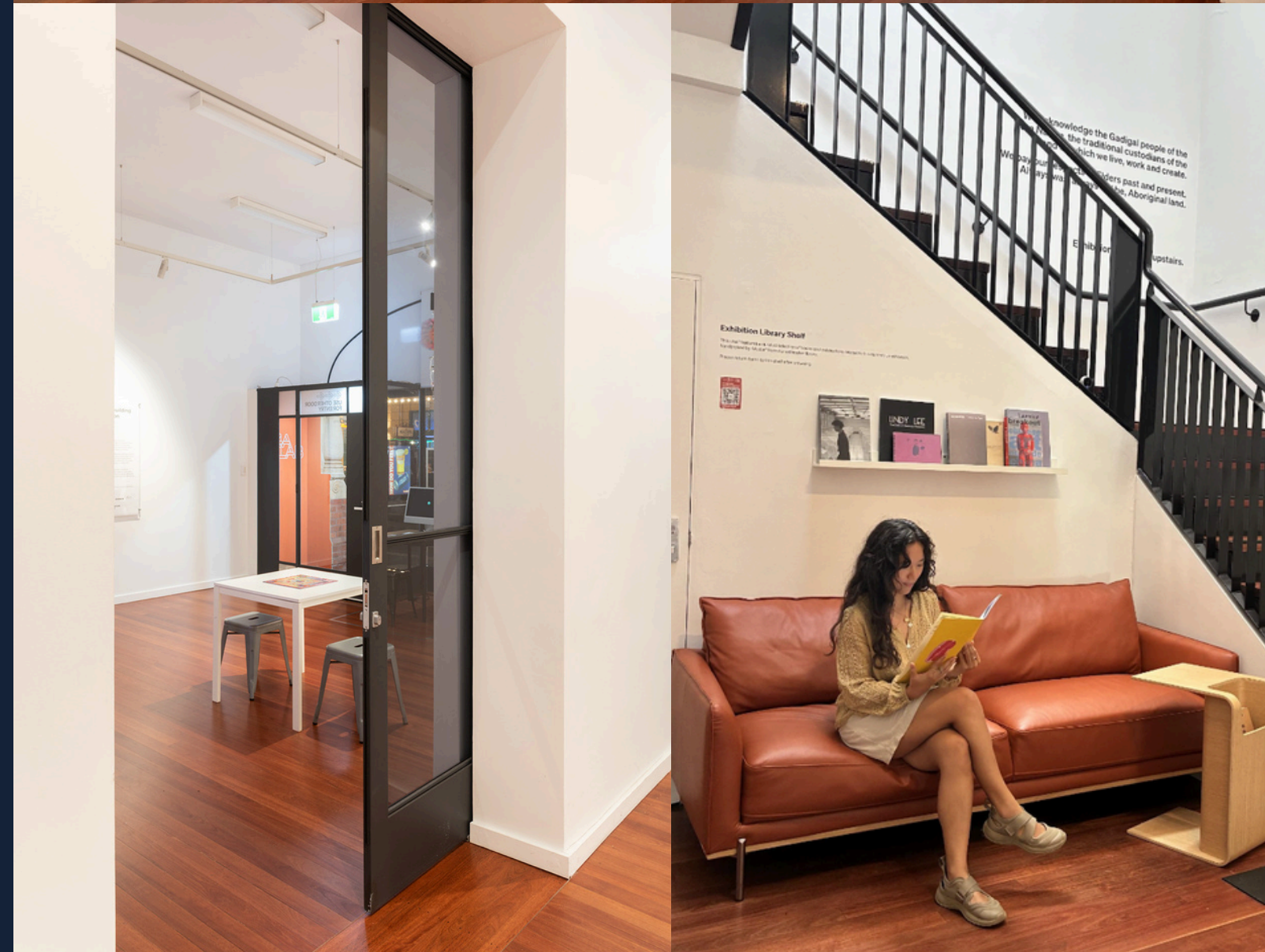

CAPITAL WORKS PROJECT

Launched in conjunction with our 2026 Lunar New Year Festival, 4A successfully delivered a major venue upgrade that strengthened our role as a leading destination for contemporary Asian Australian art and innovation. The project expanded access, visibility and community connection across our spaces. We connected 4A LAB to the main gallery, creating seamless physical and visual access between spaces. The street-level gallery was transformed into a dynamic reception, retail and gathering area, while a new reading zone deepened engagement with our on-site library. Upgraded LED lighting, refurbished timber floors and stairs, enhanced kitchen bar facilities and improved storage strengthened accessibility, sustainability and WHS standards.

These improvements increased disability access, expanded community engagement and activated our presence within the precinct. Aligned with Haymarket's revitalisation, the project affirmed 4A as an inclusive, visible and future-focused cultural hub celebrating Asian Australian creativity.
