Traditions form us

As 3.G's the whole school congratulate you – and you walk through a long row of flags starting from our youngest learners in Indskolingen. Those who are starting school life can look up to those who finish it. It's telling that at both our 15 year and again our 25 year class reunion we had almost full attendance – and most of us keep continued close contact."

25 years after Maria and Thomas' graduation, the trip to Norway and the traditions around the graduation hat still remain at the school.

Our many traditions have different goals. Some want us to create and strengthen the community across all of NGG and reinforce that we are a "WE" across all classes and departments. We do things together – it's a distinctive feature of NGG.

The aim of other traditions is to involve parents to strengthen well-being in the class and strengthen the NGG identity. We look forward to once again, after Corona, be able to hold the big Christmas Bazar where learner sell coffee and Christmas cookies, stand in a

raffle stand or the flea market – and parents take on the role of happy buyers. Also the lovely "International Day" in our international department was held with as many as 55 nationalities gathered in national costumes, after which each country was represented by parents and learners with events and culinary experiences.

Other traditions and activities are based on the school's social responsibility. These happen, for example, with our oldest learners taking part in "Operation Dagsværk" to work a day's work for a project in the Third World. Our youngest learners participate in the Rynkeby Run the day before the Easter holidays to fundraise for children with lung diseases. On Pink T-shirt day, where the whole school participates, we get to repeat the narrative of the Canadian school learner who was bullied because he showed up in a pink T-shirt. In solidarity with him, we all walk in a Pink T-shirt on that day and we take each other by the hands and form a chain around Cirkelhuset to say no to bullying and yes to difference and diversity.

Traditions must constantly be renewed or we will end up only looking backwards. We constantly look for balance between the safe old traditions and constant renewal. In this search for balance, NGG must find that which is of importance and gives value. And we must constantly remember to tell each other why we have this tradition. Without exploring meaning, traditions become obsolete and goes into oblivion.

What, then, is the greatest and best tradition at NGG? Well, it depends on the age and grade level. For Sebastian in 2. kl it is surely Fastelavn and "hitting the barrel". Maybe he hopes he becomes the cat king. Charlie from Year 4 best remembers this year's celebration of the 25th anniversary of NIS. A full week of memorable festivities in the themes "Past, present & future".

Mads from 9.klasse highlights the trip to Berlin, where 150 NGG learners filled the city. Amalie and Oliver in 1. G and 1. HF still think back to the gala in the beautiful conference center in Allerød. Maybe next year they'll win the competition in dancing les lanciers.

For me, one of the best traditions of the year takes place on the last day of the school year during graduation. We sing with the learners and applaud them, when they deservedly receive their high school diploma. But then comes a very special NGG tradition: All the learners who have attended NGG since 0.kl, come on stage and is handed an NGG mug. Some years it is a third of the learners as well as STXs and HFs. It's something special to see them standing on stage on their last day of school at NGG after so many years. We have known them and their families for 12-13 years and we hope, that the sum of the many traditions we together have had, has settled in the special NGG spirit, and personal development, "which cannot be explained and can only be experienced".



Community has never been more important

"A good place to be is a good place to learn". It's one of the cornerstones of the philosophy of NGG. You can't develop academically and personally without feeling happy, safe and motivated in a class community. By community we at NGG mean both learners, their parents and school teachers.

Well-being at schools across the country has been put to the test through the last two school years. We have also experienced this at NGG, although we have

been praised for maintaining teaching throughout the Corona period.

We now see, that learners across the country are experiencing post-reactions after this period of many changes and deprivations; and we experience the same thing here at NGG. Learner's individually and in classes need more focus on well-being and therefore well-being and community have been high priorities. Never before has community been more important.



We work a great deal to focus on learners' relationships with each other. After all, they have missed the face to face contact, and some of the social rules have changed during the time with all the restrictions. Across all year groups, work is done in being a good classmate; inclusive and open, but also how everyone should have a will for being part of the community and how precious it is.

As we begin to resume all the traditions of the school and study trips, we can also see the joy and spark coming back in many learners and it testifies to the fact that class community has been missed.

NGG continues its preventive well-being work with the school's Task Force Wellbeing department, which have practiced for several years with great success. Our younger learners work with the "Free from Bullying" concept, which is developed by The Mary Foundation and Save the Children and targets our youngest school children. The concept is based on the values tolerance, respect, care and courage.

Older classes work with more individual topics, which are tailored to their age and current class specific needs.

Good thing they are only just around the corner! It is always both a solemn and touching experience to send a group of ducklings off to school, ready for their next adventure at NGG.



Early Years (3-5 year olds)

Early Years is made up our youngest, most eager and most moldable learners. Throughout these years, we are setting the foundation for their educational career, whether that be here at NIS or off in another land. We focus on developing the whole child, understanding

that their social-emotional and cognitive skills are as valuable for a healthy and successful future as their math, literacy and science understanding. We use the International Early Years Curriculum to follow the interests of our learners in a fun, engaging and playful way.



If I could pick one word to describe this year, it would be 'growth'. Not only are our youngest learners growing up quickly before our eyes, but we have grown significantly in size. We started the year in August with a class of seventeen learners and three teachers. We now have thirty learners, four teachers and two classrooms. This growth has come with a lot of thought from the teachers and much enthusiasm and adaptability from our learners. We are thrilled and fortunate to have the large class size, but small group feel that we strive for with these young learners.

Throughout this year, we have followed the interests of our learners through learning about superheroes and everyday heroes in our To the Rescue! unit, studying fairy tales in our Once Upon a Time unit and exploring different modes of transportation in our Going Places unit. Most recently, we have been diving into beach and ocean life in our unit, Ocean Treasures with a windy trip to Rungsted Havn and a deep dive into their favorite ocean creatures.

Though a year of growth could sometimes feel unsettling, it is not the case with our Resilient, Adaptable and Empathetic learners. We are so proud of each of them and thrilled to be here to help shape them as they grow.



Indskolingen (0-3. klasse)

Our youngest classes, namely 0.A and 0.B have created a lovely oasis in the middle of the school with two identical classrooms with a common room connected to their patio. It has provided a fantastic social and professional collaboration between the two classes and this is not least thanks to our two kindergarten leaders Vivian and Mette-Louise, who value good cooperation. The 0.kl learners have often gone on trips during the course of the school year. They have gone to the open-air museum and zoo, among other places and always together, of course.

Our wonderful learners in 3. klasse have been working hard this spring on their own puppet show, where they made their own stick puppets and wrote manuscripts. Year 1 participated as part of their Danish lessons and also were in our audience as the theatrical performances took place. 1.kl and 3.kl also saw "The Wolf and the Seven Young Kids" as a musical narration and then themselves sung the songs. At the time of writing we

are reading and studying "Clumsy Hans" - which we will perform for all the other learners in elementary school. 3.B have again this year focused on their friendship with Breelteparkens Nursing Home. This is one of our traditions and before Easter this year, it was the fifth time the class visited the nursing home with their homemade seasonal decorations. Visits to the nursing home takes place several times a year and for the children, it goes without saying that their "old friends" should have their doors and common areas decorated according to the season. Among other things, the children created cardboard flowers in summer, "nisse" in December, as well as Easter eggs and Easter lambs in Spring.

"It makes a difference that we have formed this relationship between the two generations. It is both about expressing empathy and to experience how the joy their interests, gifts and visits brings, also is a gift to themselves. It should preferably feel natural for them to want to make a difference to others. It's part of their personal development".



We asked kindergarten class leaders Vivian and Mette-Louise what good collaboration across the 0. klasse means.

We love NGG traditions in Indskolingen and Fastelavn is a very special day when we "hit the cat off the barrel" and we crown the cat queens and cat kings.

Our teachers in Indskolingen fortunately also turned up in their lovely costumes ready to participate in all the fun. Halloween was also held, where learners went on "a spooky trip" in the basement.

2. klasse have this year been on a trip to Copenhagen both to see the play 'Frøken Ignora and Mister Georg' in Anemonen Theatre as well as Egebæksvang Church, where parish priest Cecilie spoke about life as a priest. The Organist Yuzuru spoke about the organ, after which there was a tour of the cemetery.

Class community, experiences and hygge have been incorporated into the class schedule for 3. klasse. In May learners, together with teachers Astrid, Lise, Annette and Vibeke went on a school trip to Møn. The learners visited the Geocenter. They found fossils on the beach and watched 3D movies.



What do you collaborate on across the 0. klasse team?

The collaboration across 0. klasse mainly occurs through regular dialogue and sharing of ideas. We support each other across teams, but also across year groups. As a classroom teacher, the indskolingen focus is on the general well-being and development of the child. Subject teachers main focus is on children learning in their subject. These two perspectives on the child cannot be separated and we are therefore in close daily dialogue with each other.

Why does this work so well?

There is strong collaboration between the two kindergarten class leaders in 0.klasse. The kindergarten class leaders are responsible for the structure, rules, well-being work, friendships, etc.

Leaders interact with each other around their own and each other's learners. Our goal is to have a relationship with each child from both classes.

Through collaboration across the team, we get a wider insight into each child's learning, but also in terms of their conduct in other contexts. Again, this is done through dialogue and concrete meetings where all children are reviewed.

What is the result of the good collaboration?

The result is difficult to measure concretely when working with people. However, we would argue that it is clear that in both 0.klasser we work towards the same goals and speak in the same language to our learners. The children know that our words weigh equally.



Primary (Years 1-6)

Udskolingen is characterized by preparing our oldest grundskole learners for gymnasial youth education as well as what it means to take exams.



Sports College isn't just about playing sport. Coaches help young people with planning their everyday life, as well as their knowledge and approach to a healthy mental


and physical life. Among other things, they can through the learners' sports diaries provide ongoing advice and guidance to learners.

Tutors were ready to receive all the new Gymnasium learners at NGG at the start of the year. Games and hygge was planned so all learners could get to know each other. The NGG Gymnasium is always full of excitement and atmosphere is great this time of year.

This school year has been full of exciting projects, ttrips across Denmark and abroad. Former NGG learners have always been kind to inspire our high school learners with insight into the business world. Two of our HF learners had the opportunity to meet Mads who today is a P6 Beat radio host. He spoke about DR as a cultural institution and workplace and the class were allowed to visit the radio center and the production room up close.

In our 21st Century Skills Week, the Innovation Group delved into competencies such as: "Critical thinking, communication, creativity and collaboration. Cases were assessed by, among others, Thomas Tuxen a former NGG learner who is now successful with his own company Craft Soda.

This school year, study trips took place in Hamburg for 10. klasse, Berlin for 1. and 2. HF. The topics of focus

were World War II, Nazism, the Holocaust, the DDR and the fall of the Berlin Wall. 2.X and 3.X got to experience magnificent Greenland and could report on the Northern Lights, the Ice Sheet and exciting local food. NGG has throughout 20 years organized trips to Greenland with a focus on natural sciences trials, but also Danish and English are also incorporated in this educational journey that learners described as a "truly unique experience we never will forget." 2.Y and 3.Y travelled south, namely, to beautiful Cyprus, where they experienced St. Hilarion Castle: one of the mediterranean's most beautiful castle ruins and as part of their history and social studies learning, they studied firsthand the conflict over the divided Cyprus.

It is no secret that we love science at NGG. That's why we also participated in the annual Science Festival. The festival aimed at children and adolescents to create engaging science experiences. Biology and chemistry learners were visited by Jesper Vind from Novozymes and the room was full as he provided an insight into enzymes: how they reduce energy and water consumption and what we use them for. All 1.G's went on a field trip to Fredtoften to attempt water analyses as well as measurement of oxygen and carbon dioxide.



We are particularly proud of our cooperation with local ALK Abelló. As part of our high level chemistry and biology classes, our high school learners have a unique opportunity to gain insight into the real world of research. The cooperation with ALK, who specialize in allergy and allergy vaccination, consisted of lectures, a project assignment with experiments in ALK's laboratories as well as a presentation of the results of the project to ALK's employees. Learners were closely guided and were coached by ALK's own research team as well as associate professors from NGG's High School Science Department.

Yet another great collaboration took place during the year. Namely with academic language consultant Sophie Swerts Knudsen from KU. The course consisted of three workshops focusing on Academic Literacy for the 3.G classes and aimed to prepare learners for the high level of academic English in higher education!

In October, social studies learners in 1. to 3.G, as well as 2.P received a visit from Europe Alive to participate in a role-playing game that simulated the legislative process in the EU in an exciting and alternative way.

Learners across yeargroups, were divided into roles and teams, to reflect the complex size of the EU and how many interests are at stake when the EU legislates. It brought cheers and frustrations around a bill on the free working movement, which after much effort and hard work was not voted through.

The same was true when former foreign minister Martin Lidegaard visited NGG for a debate on political change, personal development and education. The inquiring high school learners demanded answers and explanation and put the seasoned politician to work.

10.klasse worked with many different professional subjects this school year.

One of the topics that gets much attention every year is the compulsory self-selected project, about preparing learners for their future educational choices and jobs. It is a task in which learners must reflect and be realistic about their future prospects. True to tradition, we ended the year with our legendary NGG beer tasting, which was organized by our Chemistry- and Biology B teams. The home-brewed beer brought great enthusiasm to teachers and learners.


