Community and care

The major first-aid project of the year for all learners at NGG aimed to ensure their vital competencies, while also teaching them about the importance of community and taking action.

In September and October, NGG initiated a unique school collaboration with the Danish Red Cross in Lyngby-Taarbæk. The largest of its kind in Denmark. All of NGG's 1,200 Danish- and English-speaking learners, as well as all teachers, received first-aid training from Red Cross instructors. The courses were tailored to the learners' ages and consisted of both theory and practice with exciting, educational, and fun activities for all.

Secretary-General of the Danish Red Cross, Anders Ladekarl, visited NGG for a grand celebration.

"You are now part of the Red Cross," Secretary-General of the Danish Red Cross, Anders Ladekarl, said as he, along with paramedics, visited NGG on November 1

for a concluding celebration. Both a proud principal, Thomas Thrane, and the Red Cross emphasised the importance of learners taking care of each other and everyone they meet. With their new first aid skills, all learners can make a difference. The excellent collaboration does not end here, and the upcoming year offers exciting lectures in collaboration with the Red Cross. We plan to offer first-aid to all learners every three years.

It's all about the community

For many years, values that nourish the sense of community have shaped the work we do at NGG. These have laid the groundwork for some of the school's finest traditions such start and end of term celebrations, where the youngest and oldest learners in the school come together, as well as the unique "Pink Shirt day," where community values are also demonstrated and celebrated. The school's values must be practiced, and respect, care, courage, and tolerance are values that all learners and teachers at the school should show. These align with the IPC Personal Goals and IB Learner Attributes at NIS.

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In the first-aid courses, the children learned how to act in case of an emergency. Additionally, they learned how to provide both physical and psychological first aid.

The courses were tailored to the learners' ages, so the youngest learned how to approach an accident, comfort an injured person, call for help, and be introduced to the recovery position. The older students received what we call a crash course in basic resuscitation. Here, they learned to assess unconscious individuals and provide first aid to people with cardiac arrest - including CPR and the use of a defibrillator.

There is no doubt that children, even at a young age, can make a difference with the basic set of first-aid skills they have gained. The cardiac arrest survival rate has increased where children and young people are involved, and a general desire to help whenever and wherever possible is growing, for example with the heart runner program.

In Red Cross First Aid, our vision is that everyone should know first aid - we appreciate that NGG shares this sentiment. We are also pleased to be able to contribute to making everyday life safer for NGG learners both during and outside school hours.

Creating bonds across classes and year groups is highly valued, and we were invited to visit the 2. klasse for a reading session. This was a special and memorable experience, and we also invited them to visit Ællingen. It was a great joy for everyone involved. The children have shown great enthusiasm upon seeing each other again,

We started at the reception, where the patient was registered, the necessary documents were filled out, and the specific injury was addressed. Then, the children waited patiently in the waiting room until they were called in by the first available doctor. Our hospital was state-of-the-art, equipped with the latest in X-ray equipment and plaster casting, and the doctors had broad knowledge and expertise in various fields. This proved to be fortunate, as there were injuries ranging from broken tails and memory loss to nosebleeds and strained muscles. How all these injuries occurred deserves a chapter of its own!

Once the patient was treated, they visited the local pharmacy with a prescription in hand, hoping the provided medicine would soothe and heal them. It was a truly fantastic experience that brought out the playful child in all of us, also the adults!

The Red Cross

Our collaboration with the Red Cross was another wonderful experience this year. A very kind and skilled instructor visited us and showed the Ællingen children

how to help someone in need. It was a very child-friendly presentation that emphasized the importance of helping each other whenever we can.

The Sea

One of the major themes this year was "The Sea." The Ællingen children were so fascinated by it that we lost track of time. Luckily, that is perfectly fine. In Ællingen, we base our activities on our shared curiosity. We learn best through play, active participation, and a stimulated curiosity. In this case, it resulted in Ællingen creating a book, with each child contributing a chapter about their chosen sea creature. We explored the science of the different zones of the ocean, learned about ocean pollution, and delved into studying many different marine animals. We were particularly fascinated by the octopus!

er wonderful activities and experiences. We are already bubbling with excitement to start implementing all the new and exciting ideas we have for the next school year.

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
Early Years (3-5 year olds)

Preparation for education

Our Udskoling houses nearly 400 learners across 17 classes. In these final three years of Grundskolen we introduce students to concepts and methods that they will need in their future education. A good example is this year's GymCamp8, where learners work on projects with guidance from both their own teachers and Gymnasium teachers. This way of learning is something they will frequently encounter in the Gymnasium, making it very beneficial for them to become familiar

with it now. This school year's topics included politics, narcissism, and mealworms as a sustainable source of protein.

In Grade 8, learners spend a week in work experience, getting a taste of their dream job at a real workplace. 130 learners participated this year, including Nanna, whose dream is to become a child psychologist. She spent her work experience week at a kindergarten.

Out debut year with LifeScience

This school year, we opened the doors to our first 5-year Gymnasium course: the LifeScience class, commonly referred to as 8.l.

All learners in the class were admitted based on their interest in science and will work together over the next five years towards a science-focused diploma from NGG.

It has been a fantastic first year! Engaged learners, parents, and teachers have collectively developed the class, which is thriving both academically and socially. In the new school year, we will open another LifeScience class and a SocialScience class with a focus on social studies, English communication, and economics.



Trips and projects

Every other year, our learners go on a study trip. In Udskolingen, Grade 7 goes to Bornholm. This year's trip was fantastic, with great weather, wonderful cultural experiences, and valuable practice in becoming more independent. The learners lived together in houses and took care of their own shopping and cooking.

The Grade 9 classes traditionally travel to Berlin, and once again, we were proud to take so many learners to a major foreign city and have a great experience with them.

In addition to the annual study trips, this year included many local experiences outside the classroom. 9.c visited the Klunkehjemmet and the National Gallery of Denmark as part of a course on the 'Moderne Gennembrud' and 'Romantikken'. Several Grade 9 classes also visited the Catholic Church for a lecture on original sin. Additionally, several classes had a joint trip to Tivoli, where Herman Bang was the main topic. They wrote and presented their own reports.

There were also several exciting scientific projects, such as the science days at Tivoli, Science Day at Danfoss with 8.b, the Plastic Mission at Novo Life Laboratory with 7.c and 7.e, and several Grade 8 classes visited the Vestforbrænding Laboratory.

First and foremost, I will be celebrating all my graduating friends in the Gymnasium. In addition, I'm going to Italy to train for my first triathlon.


