- Fatima Farheen Mirza took almost 8 years to write this book. She started when she was 18 years old.
- This is her debut novel. Do you like debut novels?

STYLE:

- Author lets you in on what the characters are thinking and feeling
- The book is a character study on a family
- Nod to Romeo and Juliet/West Side Story
- Tiny decisions that landed them in the place of the opening scene at the wedding. Small scenes narrowing in on a moment
- In the interview, she talks about inhabiting the characters' perspectives
- A novel about memories that you cannot escape
- Each family member has their own story and arc, but with their interactions with Amar
