Rather than operating as service providers, private electric utilities function as profitdriven businesses. Too often, they prioritize shareholder needs over the good of the community.

Public power, when implemented with energy democracy principles, would distribute wealth, power, and decision-making equitably.



Local, renewable electricity generation

A public power system must shift to the use of local renewables to protect people and the planet.

When renewable energy is kept local, communities benefit economically. Local generation can create construction jobs and add funds to the local economy.



Democratic governance

Every day people have a say in energy decisions through local control.

In addition to making electricity rates affordable, public power can also invest in energy efficiency and renewables ownership to cut down costs.
