

How to Get Started with Telemedicine

- Update your resume
 - Consider layout order: education, licenses, experience/employment, extra information (professional memberships, research, hobbies/interests)
 - Highlight state licenses at the top
 - Emphasize remote care experience
 - Make yourself human

- Acquire multi-state licenses
 - Consider the big four: Texas, New York, Florida, California
 - Consider getting licensed in a compact state

- Review telemedicine research
 - Brush up on essential telemedicine clinical outcomes
 - Review patient satisfaction in telemedicine studies

- Talk to a telemedicine recruiter
 - Verify his/her specific telemedicine placement experience
 - Get input on most reputable telemedicine companies
 - Identify your schedule and salary expectations
 - Review typical telemedicine compensation

- Interview and explore job options
 - Compare compensation, benefits, patient volumes, shifts/schedule, licensure requirements, and malpractice and credentialing support
 - Consider asynchronous vs. synchronous telemedicine roles

- Setup your home office
 - Establish a telemedicine home office space
 - Identify equipment needs (laptop, tablet, smartphone, headphones, etc.)

- Network/attend industry events
 - Setup a LinkedIn profile
 - Search LinkedIn for telemedicine connections
 - Explore telemedicine Facebook groups
 - Join associations like the ATA
 - Attend a national or regional telemedicine conference
