A Note About the Data

Taking our community's pulse is a collaborative effort and we rely on a number of community partners for insight and local data. Mindful of our theme of belonging, we wanted to ensure a range of diverse voices and experiences were represented in this report. With the Foundation's commitment to reconciliation, the plan for this Vital Signs report included more information about the Indigenous population living in the city. Unfortunately, not as much local and recent data was available as we had hoped. We are committed to working with all of our partners to increase access to this important information and are aiming to publish additional material on this topic in the coming months.

Educational Attainment

*All numbers below refer to the London CMA

- The percentage of the population aged 25-64 who have completed a high school diploma or equivalency certificate increased slightly from 2006-2016.*
 - 2006: 84.5%
 - 2011:87.8%
 - 2016:88.2%
- In 2016, 88.2% of people aged 25-64 had a high school diploma or equivalency certificate in London (CMA), compared to 86.3% in all of Canada.*
- In London, 27.7% of people aged 25-64 had a bachelor's degree or higher, 28.8% had a college, CEGEP or other non-university certificate or diploma, and 6.4% had an apprenticeship or trades certificate as their highest level of education.*
- 15.6% of women in London aged 25-64 with a bachelor's degree or higher studied STEM (science, technology, engineering and math), compared to 33.3% of men.*

Educational Attainment – post-secondary education (% aged 15+ with university degree, post secondary certificate or diploma)

In 2016, in London (CMA), 54.8% of individuals, 15 years and older, had attained a post-secondary education (university degree, post-secondary certificate or diploma). The percent of individuals who had a post-secondary education was up 4.4 percentage points from 2006 (50.4%). The percent of individuals who had a post-secondary education in London (CMA) was 0.3 percentage points lower than the provincial average (55.1%), and 0.5 percentage points lower than the national average (55.3%).*

In 2016, in London (CITY), 55.6% of individuals, 15 years and older, had attained a post-secondary education (university degree, post-secondary certificate or diploma). The percent of individuals who had

a post-secondary education was up 4.2 percentage points from 2006 (51.4%). The percent of individuals who had a post-secondary education in London (CITY) was 0.5 percentage points higher than

the provincial average (55.1%), and 0.3 percentage points higher than the national average (55.3%). *

In 2016, in London (CMA), 8.4% of the population, ages 25-34, had not completed high school. The percent of the population, ages 25-34, who had not completed high school is down 5.5 percentage points from 2001 (13.9 percent). Indigenous High School Completion Rates (% ages 15+)

In 2016, in London (CMA), 72.6% of the population, 15 years and older and identifying as Indigenous, had completed high school - at least one certificate, diploma or degree. The percent of the population identifying as Indigenous that had completed high school is down 0.4 percentage points from 2006 (73.0%). The percent of the population identifying as Indigenous that had completed high school in London (CMA) is 1.7 percentage points higher than the provincial average (70.9%), and 6.2 percentage points higher than the national average (66.4%).*

In 2016, in London (CITY), 72 percent of the population, 15 years and older and identifying as Indigenous, had completed high school - at least one certificate, diploma or degree. The percent of the population identifying as Indigenous that had completed high school is up 1.9 percentage points from 2006 (70.1%). The percent of the population identifying as aboriginal that had completed high school in

London (CITY) is 1.1 percentage points higher than the provincial average (70.9%), and 5.6 percentage points higher than the national average (66.4%).*

Education in the Trades

In 2016, in London (CMA), 6.2% of individuals, 15 years and older, had an apprenticeship or trades certificate or diploma as their highest level of educational attainment. The percent of individuals educated in the trades is up 1.3 percentage points from 2006 (7.5%). The percent of individuals educated in the trades in London (CMA) is 0.2 percentage points higher than the provincial average (6%), and 3.6 percentage points lower than the national average (9.8%).*

In 2016, in London (CITY), 5.6% of individuals, 15 years and older, had an apprenticeship or trades certificate or diploma as their highest level of educational attainment. The percent of individuals educated in the trades is up 1.3 percentage points from 2006 (6.9%). The percent of individuals educated in the trades in London (CITY) is 0.4 percentage points lower than the provincial average (6%), and 4.2 percentage points lower than the national average (9.8%).*
