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# "UNPRECEDENTED VICTORIES"

On the occasion of the New Year, the N.S.A. sent the following cable to the Guardian on behalf of all the believers:

"On last Nawruz of first Bahá'í century British community sends loving greetings offers loyal devotion begs prayers."

Two days later came his answer:

"Appreciate message reciprocate loving greetings Thankful divine protection Praying unprecedented victories last year first Bahá'í century."

And so we start the year with such words ringing in our ears. "Thankful divine protection" -we too should all be thankful indeed that we have been so protected, even more thankful that after nearly four years of world war, the Cause in this country is still free to carry on its activities and, by the blessing of Bahá'u'lláh, is growing and becoming more widely known. But with thankfulness for the past and the present should be coupled hope and determination for The Cause is indeed firmly the future. established here, but as yet the number of its adherents is small and its outward influence only beginning, and all our work is still in front of us. At this moment approximately one hundred and fifty people are the vehicle for the destiny of this country, and through that of other countries, since all are inter-dependent. We have been called to this divinely appointed task, this overwhelming but nevertheless thrilling responsibility. And our beloved Guardian is helping us. Twice in the past year he has sent us a munificient gift, but, far more important, he prays at the Holy Shrines for "unprecedented victories" and for the believers who are chosen to help in achieving such victories. thrilled when we read of the successes achieved

by the pioneer believers in South America, when we hear of devoted souls setting out to teach in such difficult places as Bahrein, Arabia or Afghanistan, but we too can do the same. Here in this country is a large field for pioneers, right on our own doorsteps even are opportunities for teaching and for sacrifice. Opportunities to achieve the glorious victories of which the Guardian speaks are manifold.

In this coming year, the last year of the first Bahá'í century, a period unequalled in the history of the world, let us then go forward unfalteringly and with firm determination, confident that the divine power will unstintingly support our efforts. Let us devote ourselves absolutely wholeheartedly to the service of the Faith. Our time, our energy, our capacities, our money, our possessions, for what are they given us except that we may sacrifice them all in the path of the Beloved? We, our lives, everything that we have and everything that we are belong only to Him. Let us use ourselves to the uttermost in His service.

"Verily, I say unto thee that the gifts of thy Lord are encircling thee in a similar way as the spirit encircles the body at the beginning of the amalgamation of the elements and natures in the womb; the power of the spirit begins then to appear in the body gradually and successively according to the preparation and capacity to receive that everlasting abundance. I ask God to help thee that the spirit will carry out its power in thee as desired and wished."

#### Purpose of the Convention.

And now regarding this forthcoming Convention, I feel that the dominating purpose inspiring the assembled friends, delegates and visitors alike, should be a twofold one. The first is a challenge to the individual, the second a collective responsibility. The one seeks to reinforce the motive power of our spiritual activities, the second aims at raising the standard of administrative efficiency so vitally needed at this advanced stage of our work. We should first and foremost endeavour by every conceivable means to revitalise our precious Cause, rudely shaken by the constant vicissitudes attending the outward departure of a vigilant and gracious Master. Our next object should be to seek to approach, through more intimate association, fuller and more frequent consultation, and a closer familiarity with the character, the mission and the teachings of the Cause, that standard of excellence which should characterise the co-operative efforts of Bahá'í communities in every land.

High aims and pure motives, however laudable in themselves, will surely not suffice if unsupported by measures that are practicable and methods that are sound. Wealth of sentiment, abundance of good-will and effort, will prove of little avail if we should fail to exercise discrimination and restraint and neglect to direct their flow along the most profitable channels. The unfettered freedom of the individual should be tempered with mutual consultation and sacrifice, and the spirit of initiative and enterprise should be reinforced by a deeper re-

alisation of the supreme necessity for concerted action and a fuller devotion to the common weal.

Let us also bear in mind that the keynote of the Cause of God is not dictatorial authority but humble fellowship, not arbitrary power, but the spirit of frank and loving consultation. Nothing short of the spirit of a true Bahá'í can hope to reconcile the principles of mercy and justice, of freedom and submission, of the sanctity of the right of the individual and of self-surrender, of vigilance, discretion and prudence on the one hand, and fellowship, candour, and courage on the other.

# NATIONAL TEACHING COMMITTEE

Ask any Jew what are the big events that stand out like milestones in his calendar year, and he will immediately tell you, "Passover, Chanuka, The Day of Atonement, etc." The Christian thinks that a calendar without Christmas and Easter in it would be unthinkable. Even though he may be of the type that is so divorced from religion, that these Church festivities are only thought of as occasions when he can close his shop or office, and (in peace-time) go off into the country or indulge in some other form of favourite pastime, there are also people of the devout type who celebrate every Saint's

Day. This was the case in some parts of Central Europe where, greatly to the delight of the children, the schools were often closed every few days for the sake of another Saint.

That era is being left behind, together with so many everyday things that will not return after the lapse of the first half of this century of the Christian Era. As Bahá'ís, we are conscious of the fact that already we are living in the dawn light of a New Era, while the light of the Old Era fades around us. So, too, we must be fully conscious of the things that belong to the Bahá'í Era.

Our year, with its milestones, should become indelibly engraved upon our consciousness, even though we have not had the advantage—most of us—of having the Bahá'í Festivals woven into the pattern of our earliest childhood memories, and so indissolubly blended with our rhythm of life.

There are nine Feast days which Bahá'u'lláh enjoined us to keep as days free from work and to be spent in communion with each other. The first of these is, of course, Nawruz, our own New Year day, on March 21st, and this is a date that every Bahá'í most easily remembers.

Taking the others in chronological order, as historical events, they are as follows:

November 12th. The Birth of Bahá'u'lláh, in Tihrán, in the year 1817, before the Cause of the Báb became known, since it was not until

October 20th, that the Birth of the Báb took place in 1819 in Shiráz. Our Era dates from the year 1844, when on

May 2nd we celebrate the *Declaration of the Báb* to Mulla Hussayn, two hours after sunset, in Shiráz. It is an interesting fact that this date also coincides with the birth of 'Abdu'l-Bahå.

July 9th we commemorate the Martyrdom of the Báb, a young man only thirty years old, at noon in the barrack square at Tabriz, at the hands of the firing squad. This was in the year 1850. After a time, Bahá'u'lláh, an ardent follower of the Báb, became the recognised leader of the Bábis. Just before he was sent into exile in Akká, he called together his friends, in the garden which afterwards became known as the Garden of Ridván, in which he encamped during the preparations for the journey. Here on

April 21st, 1863, at 3 p.m., he made the momentous Declaration that He was the One foretold by the Báb—He whom God shall make
manifest—the Promised One of all the
Prophets of earlier times. This was the
first day of the period spent in the Garden
of Ridván, and in spite of the sorrow of his
impending departure, the friends were filled
with joy at the wonderful news they had
received; and so we celebrate the whole of
these twelve days, and in particular

April 29th, the ninth day, and

May 2nd, the 12th and last day of Ridván. The last of our Days of Commemoration is,

May 29th, the anniversary of the Ascension of Bahá'u'lláh at 3 a.m. in the morning of that day in 1892 at Bahji, where He lived after He left the fortress of Akká.

These are the Nine Bahá'í Days of Commemoration, which form our milestones, and in addition, we mark the Day of Covenant on 26th November, and we commemorate the Passing of 'Abdu'l-Bahá, on 28th November, 1921, at 1 a.m.

For greater convenience we summarize the dates in calendar order:

Mar. 21st.—Nawruz.

April 21st-3 p.m., First day of Ridván.

" 29th—Ninth day of Ridván. May 2nd—Twelfth day of Ridván.

" 22nd—Two hours after sunset, Declaration of the Báb.

" 29th—3 a.m., Ascension of Bahá'u'lláh. July 9th—Noon, Martyrdom of the Báb.

Oct. 20th—Birth of the Báb. Nov. 12th—Birth of Bahá'u'lláh.

Nov. 26th—Day of the Covenant.

" 28th-1 a.m., Passing of 'Abdu'l-Bahá.

Pioneers! Do you know that you can get stacks of useful pamphlets for teaching purposes from us?
