We share with you the following cables received from the historic Continental and Oceanic Conferences held simultaneously in La Paz, Bolivia and Rose Hill, Mauritius August 14 through 17.

Hand of the Cause of God Amatu'l-Baha Ruhiyyih Khanum represented the Universal House of Justice in La Paz and Hand of the Cause of God Mr. William Sears represented the Universal House of Justice in Mauritius.

NO SPECIAL STATUS FOR PIONEERS
OR TRAVELLING TEACHERS

To: All National Spiritual Assemblies
Dear Baha'í Friends,

From time to time we receive reports that pioneers or travelling teachers who are subsidized by the International Deputization Fund or receive letters of encouragement from the Universal House of Justice are assumed to have some special status or authority.

In order that there be no misunderstanding, it should be made clear that such individuals have no special status and have no authority or standing other than that of any believer residing in the area where he is pioneering or teaching.

Furthermore, pioneers and travelling teachers are under the jurisdiction of the National Spiritual Assembly of the country or area in which they are travelling or residing, as the case may be, and they must be obedient to the instruction of these National Spiritual Assemblies.

Of course, there may be cases when the Universal House of Justice may call upon a believer to accomplish a special mission on its behalf. In such cases special letters are written to the National Spiritual Assemblies concerned.

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INTERNATIONAL NEWS.....





From the 4th August, 1969 until today, reports have been flowing in to the Holy Land of the exciting events associated with the travels of Hand of the Cause, Amatu'l-Bahá Rúhíyyih <u>Kh</u>anum. Thousands of words have been written and we can only summarise the high-lights of these fantastic and history-making journeys. They are extracted mainly from the reports by Violette Nakhjavani as published in the 'Baha'i News'.

"On August 5, the wheels of our plane touched down at Entebbe Airport, Uganda — at long last the long-promised visit of 'Amatu'l-Bahá to the believers of Africa was commencing..."

"During her ten-day stay in Kampala she was able to attend a reception given in her honour...; to deliver a public lecture in the hall of the National Theatre and to be interviwed for a full half hour on Radio Uganda.."

"Rúḥíyyih Khanum's happiest moment came when she was able to attend a service in the Mother Temple of Africa, sitting between Hands of the Cause Musa Banani and Enoch Olinga.."

She had purchased a large Land Rover, three and a half tons when loaded, which she picked up on arrival in Nairobi, Kenya; her plan was to reach the Bahá'ís in the villages who so seldom have any opportunity to meet their brothers and sisters from other places, how much less other nations and continents. Her programme was a full one. Interviewed on Kenya T.V. on August 17th she spoke for seven minutes and later was invited to the home of Vice-President Moi and his wife. From August 28 to September 2, Rúhíyyih Khanum visited Bahá'í communities along the Kenya Coast and then went along to tour Tanzania. One impressive character she met was an anti-witch doctor. (This is a man licensed by the Government of Kenya to break the spells of the witch-doctors.) Before becoming a Baha'i he was a pagan and some of his sons and a few of his seventy wives have also accepted the Faith. On September 4th she landed in Dar-es-Salaam and addressed meetings, held Press interviews, attended a reception held in her honour, met prominent people, members of the diplomatic corps and Government officials and had a ten-minute interview on the Government radio, all during her whirlwind seven-day visit there. For the remainder of the month she toured Tanzania, visiting the believers in their villages, holding meetings in the open or under large trees and then until mid-October, toured another part of the Kenya Highlands.

On October 15th, Ruhíyyih Khanum went by air to Addis Ababa, capital of Ethiopia. Here the stay of one month was packed with activity and great victories were won for the Faith. She was interviewed by a reporter, and then gave a full half-hour of information on the Faith to a radio director who braodcast it in full—the first time mention of the Cause had been made on the radio. This was a source of great encouragement to the friends who are just beginning to emerge from obscurity in Ethiopia.

The Emperor grants an interview

Probably the most important event of the whole tour took place on the morning after her arrival when she had an interview with His Imperial Majesty, Haile Selassie I, which lasted for a full half-hour.

"We then bowed low, the Emperor again shook hands, and we backed respectfully towards the door. Just as we reached it, His Imperial Majesty said something to his Secretary, who approached Rúniyyih Khanum and asked her to wait a moment. As we stood, he opened a cabinet against a wall, took out a box and handed it to the Emperor, who asked Rúniyyih Khanum to approach. Opening the small case, he showed her the gold medal of his Coronation, saying this was a token of his esteem and not because of any intrinsic value it might have. Rúniyyih Khanum accepted it gracefully, thanked him, and we departed. Thus ended what must truly be considered an historic interview in every way".

When Rúhíyyih Khanum went to a Bahá'í Conference in Gemeto, the Chief Secretary of the District insisted that she be accompanied to the Conference by the Chief of Police as well as by the Governor of the area. She then said,

"One hundred years ago Bahá'u'lláh, the Founder of our Faith, who was a distinguished nobleman, was taken on foot, bareheaded and barefooted, in chains under the burning sun, from His palace in the mountains to the worst dungeon in Tihran; now, for His sake and in His honour, I accept the honour you are bestowing on me."

(Editorial Note: In future issues of the 'Journal' we hope to give our readers more stories from these journeys and extracts from the wonderful talks given by our revered Hand of the Cause. It was felt, however, that as these events took place just a year ago, some more recent inspiring developments in the U.S.A. would be welcomed now.)

RÚHÍYYIH KHANUM IN THE AMERICAS

'Amatu'l-Bahá Rúhíyyih Khanum cut short her African tour to represent the Universal House of Justice at the National Convention of Educador and at the first National Convention of Guyana, Surinam and French Guiana. On her way she stopped in Panama where she consulted with the National Spiritual Assembly, visited the House of Worship being constructed and met with the friends. After the Conventions she visited Trinidad, and island communities in the Leeward, Windward and Virgin Islands. "The whole experience of visiting the friends from Grenada to St. Thomas," she said, "constitutes one of the happiest memories of my many long travels to see the Bahá'ís in different parts of the world. Their love, their co-operation, their hospitality made the whole trip outstanding in every way."

From June 19-21, Rúhíyyih Khanum spoke to over two thousand Bahá'í Youth at the largest gathering of Bahá'í Youth ever held in the Northern Hemisphere. Youth from every state in the United States including twelve from Hawaii and from some twenty foreign nations were present. Reporting to the Universal House of Justice Rúhíyyih Khanum wrote "...the experience here has been truly a wonderful one...In all I was able to address the young people during three sessions for over five hours. I was astonished at their power of concentration! They listened with rapt attention and at the end of a two hour session seemed to be just as absorbed as at the beginning. To me this is one of the highest compliments one could pay them because one very seldom finds either this thirst for knowledge or power of concentration outside the villages in the 'under developed' countries."

The news of the Conference was cabled to the World Centre:

"Surging Ocean Bahá'í Youth 2,000 strong convened precincts Mother Temple West. Majority recent recruits Army of Light incredibly enriched presence Hands Cause God'Amatu'l-Bahá Rúḥíyyih Khanum John Robarts Dhikru'lláh Khadem Continental Counsellors Auxiliary Board Members entire body National Spiritual Assembly. Inspired contemplation sacrifice Purest Branch century ago praying fervently assistance rise heights sacrifice acceptable Holy Threshold. 200 plus pioneers arose determined spread flame mass awakening abroad home exploit precious moment critical house giving lives to Bahá'u'lláh'"

The National Spiritual Assembly cabled:

"Annals Cause America especially illumined extraordinary success second National Youth Conference indelibly etched memories 2 thousand attendance uniquely blessed radiant galvanic participation'Amatu'l-Bahá. Salutary effects Chicago area loving unifying uplifting behaviour participants already obvious as attested significant number new enrollments enthusiastic expression admiration onlooking public. Supplementary goals five year program whole heartedly adopted include deploying 25 foreign pioneers opening 100 localities in States smallest Bahá'í population increasing number college clubs to 200 undertaking individual study epistle son wolf this year..."

Following this tremendous Conference over 500 believers gathered in Milwaukee, Wisconsin to hear'Amatu'l-Bahá Rúhíyyih Khanum speak, and from there she went to the new 'mass-conversion' Area of the deep south (reported in the last 'Journal'). From the Southeastern Bahá'í Summer School a thrilling cable was sent to the Universal House of Justice. This contained the news that the last 24 hours of the school were used in mass teaching, resulting in 64 new believers in Perry, Georgia; 53 in Fort Valley, 81 in Marshallville and 230 in all. Twelve new centres were opened, six pioneers arose and \$1400 contributed to the Fund.

To raise a pillar many months, nay, years of work must be done on the foundation. With the help of Bahá'u'lláh, the guidance of the mother national assemblies and the work of the local assemblies throughout Guyana, Surinam and French Guiana, a firm foundation was laid.

As the Convention was to take place in Guyana, the privilege of making the physical arrangements for this event was given to the Local Assembly of Georgetown, which worked for months until all was ready, 'all systems go'.

Visitors and friends arrived in waves and pulses as they landed at the airport and seaports. Our beloved 'Amatu'l-Bahá Ruhiyyih Khanum representing the Universal House of Justice; Mrs. Violette Nakhjavani, her priceless companion; Counsellors Mr. Hooper Dunbar and Mr. Donald Witzel (both of South America) and Counsellor Mrs. Betty Reed, who represented the British National Assembly, together with Auxiliary Board Members, Knights of Bahá'u'lláh, delegates, pioneers and residents all took part in a two-day teaching conference, followed by a two-day Convention from 30 April to 3 May.

Soon after her arrival, 'Amatu'l-Bahá Rúþíyyih <u>Kh</u>anum, accompanied by a number of friends, was received by the President of the Republic of Guyana and spent about half an hour with him.

Counsellor Betty Reed opened the first day of the teaching conference and there followed reports from the three countries and a short history of the Faith and its explosive growth here. 'Amatu'l-Bahá Rúhíyyih Khanum spoke on the Institution of the Guardianship and told us something of the intense way in which our beloved Guardian worked. Some of us had the great privilege of meeting her and of being showered by her abundant love. In the evening we followed her trail on the 'Rabbani African Safari' when she and Mrs. Nakhjavani showed slides and told stories of their journey.

On the second day 'Amatu'l-Bahá was interviewed by the local radio station. The gathered friends listened to this conversation and were inspired by Rúhíyyih Khanum's answers to the interviewer. Under Mrs. Reed's chairmanship we read the guidance given by the Guardian on the qualities needed by elected members of the national assemblies and the relationships of the Bahá'í Institutions to each other and to individuals and non-Bahá'í bodies.

In the evening came the celebration of the Twelfth Day of Ridvan, at which we were the guests of the British National Assembly — the room was packed with the multi-coloured flowers of Bahá'u'lláh and radiance shone from the faces of the friends. Tears of joy came to our eyes and our hearts overflowed with a feeling that neither pen could describe nor tongue recount, and the thought in our minds that just over a century ago the Light of God shone in the Splendour of Bahá, whose Rays now reached every corner of the globe.

Convention was opened by Mrs. Reed, followed by roll-call and election of officers. 'Amatu'l-Bahá, as representative of the Universal House of Justice, expressed her gratitude to them and read their messages — one to the world and the other to Convention. There was great joy when the Convention Message was read — already some of the goals had been achieved and others being negotiated.

Then came the time for the election — there was a tremendous devotional programme and the spiritual vibrations of each prayer could be felt. By this time, all but one delegate had arrived, and it was decided to vote, but to hold the ballots until the very last moment — no sooner had the last ballot been cast than in walked the missing delegate, who had been delayed through transport difficulties. Excitement and tension mounted fast as the chief teller handed the result of the voting to the chairman — as each name was called the owner froze in his seat, dumbfounded and bewildered — and as the last name was called arms were extended and tears flowed as the friends embraced the newly elected members and wished them success in the service of the Beloved. The spirit that existed can never be put into words.

In the evening there were gifts for this newly-born child – from the Universal House of Justice, the Counsellors, the Auxiliary Board, National Assemblies, Local Assemblies, committees and individuals. Among these there was one outstanding gift from the British National Assembly – the Ring of Abdu'l-Bahá.

During the last day the Message of the Universal House of Justice was discussed in detail; plans made for the achievement of the remaining goals in the three countries, with special emphasis on French Guiana, where literature and manpower is limited, and resolutions made. Problems of East Indian teaching were discussed and 'Amatu'l-Bahá shared her invaluable experiences with the friends — "They are very receptive, make strong teachers; serve excellently on administrative bodies and are very good at explaining religious truth" she said. As the friends left the hall for a break the national assembly members met to elect officers and the cable committee set to work to write messages. In the afternoon the names of the officers were announced and were warmly applauded, and the cables approved by the delegates.

In the evening 'Amatu'l-Bahá gave a public lecture in the Georgetown City Hall.

These four days are now part of our history; the friends bade farewell with tears in their eyes and hearts burning with the love of Bahá'u'lláh and will remember for ever this period of unparalleled peace and beauty.

The following extracts were taken from a recent letter from the Bahá'í International Community addressed to all National Spiritual Assemblies.

"This year the United Nations celebrates its 25th anniversary. This world organisation, which the Bahá'ís see as a step in the direction of the Lesser Peace foretold by Bahá'u'lláh, has been often more successful in its economic and social work — education, human rights, health, food and agriculture — than in its political activities of maintaining peace and achieving universal disarmament. (Even here, however, the UN continues to make steady progress.) It is not surprising that the economic and social activities — which constitute 85% of the efforts of the UN — should be the most successful, since the United Nations is an association of independent states, nations very conscious of their sovereignty and often not too willing to consider the welfare of mankind side by side with the well-being of their own peoples.

We well know that the transition from nationalism to internationalism will be a slow one and that the promise that Bahá'u'lláh has given us of an eventual world federation will not occur overnight.....

More and more one hears at UN Headquarters mention of the "interdependence of all peoples", of the needs for "global strategy", of a "partnership of the rich and the poor"—the developed and the developing countries.....We also frequently hear Secretary-General U Thant refer to the indivisibility of mankind, to the organic oneness of humanity.....

In celebrating the 25th anniversary of the United Nations, there is much that Bahá'í communities throughout the world can do. First of all, since the Universal House of Justice has established as one of the goals of the Nine Year Plan the strengthening of our ties with the United Nations, Bahá'ís can gain a basic understanding of the United Nations — what it is, how it works, what it does. Also, since now the Bahá'í International Community has been granted consultative status with the Economic and Social Council and will be working closely with that important body of the UN and its subsidiary organs such as the Commission on Human Rights, the Commission on the Status of Women, and the Commission for Social Development, as well as with the important United Nations Development Programme, it would be valuable for Bahá'ís to be familiar with the contributions that the UN is making in in economic and social fields, not only throughout the world, but specifically in the countries in which they live.

If Bahá'ís can view the United Nations as an expression of the power of unity released into the world by the Bab and Bahá'u'lláh when those Manifestations came to mankind, they will see the UN in a different light. They can instead view it as evidence of the gradual awakening of man's consciousness to the essential need for the unity of mankind, world peace, universal justice and a good economic and social life for all people.

If Bahá'ís can see in the UN the first steps towards the development of full human potentialities, and if they see this new awareness of man as the result of the spirit of Bahá'u'lláh, they can then support the work of the UN as a significant contribution towards the Lesser Peace — a political peace which will be brought about through the agreement of nations and governments.

If, as Bahá'ís, we are familiar with the work of the United Nations and understand the relationship of the Faith of Bahá'u'lláh to the UN, we can support willingly and without misgivings the constructive UN work that is in harmony with the Bahá'í Teachings. In educating the public on the UN, it is often better to emphasize the economic and social work of that world organisation — "peace-building" — since this area of activity increases year by year and presents the UN — to the uninformed and the sceptical — in a positive light. Furthermore, "peace-building" is essential to "peace-keeping", and may prove in the end to be its key.....

There are several ways in which you might wish to observe United Nations Day, October 24, and Human Rights Day, December 10. Public meetings, a tea, luncheon, a dinner, a banquet, or any other social function in observance of United Nations or Human Rights Days.

The only principle to consider here is that our support of the UN should not place us in a position to contravene or compromise the Teachings... As always, we are most happy to co-operate with you in your Bahá'í-UN Activities, and we wish you full success in this work so essential for establishing ever closer ties between the Bahá'í world and the United Nations.

AFRICAN CONFERENCE OF NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS

Representatives from seven National Spiritual Assemblies in Africa and from the Bahá'í International Community in New York were the largest delegation to the first African Conference of Non-Governmental Organizations held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, February 17-21. Of the 104 Non-Governmental organization delegates and observers attending — representing 74 organizations from 20 countries in Africa — ten were Bahá'ís; and two Bahá'í representatives were the only participants from Mauritius and Swaziland.....

More than once the Bahai's were praised for their efforts and dependability by the NGO liaison representative of the Ethiopian government and by other UN personnel.

AUSTRALIA

Six public meetings were held; there were two Human Rights Day luncheons and seven Human Rights Day displays.

The meetings, using both United Nations and Baha'í speakers, drew an overall attendance of 500 people. Some 700 United Nations pamphlets were distributed.

BRAZIL

Bahá'ís celebrated United Nations Day from North to South in Brazil. A Bahá'í newspaper representative..was quite successful in obtaining coverage for UN Day. Some communities also had public meetings and had publicity on TV and radio.

CAMEROON REPUBLIC

Two hundred people attended a United Nations Day program in Victoria sponsored by the Bahá'ís, the Red Cross and the City of Victoria. The theme, "Youth in the World Today", was used. Guest speakers were the First Assistant Secretary

in charge of UN Liaison at the Prime Minister's office, Buea; the Director of Red Cross of Victoria Chapter and Mrs. Laquetta Karch, member of the National Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of Cameroon Republic. The meeting was publicized both in the press and over the radio.

DENMARK

The Bahá'í community of Denmark has established close relations with the United Nations Information Centre in Copenhagen...Instead of celebrating Human Rights Day on December 10, the Bahá'í communities of Denmark sponsored a photography exhibition for one week in June.

ETHIOPIA

In Addis Ababa the attendance of the United Nations Day celebration, sponsored by the local Bahá'í community, was three times that of a year ago. Some 300 people attended the public talk given at the auditorium of the Chamber of Commerce. The speaker was Dr. S. Cooppan, a Bahá'í who works for the Economic Commission for Africa as an expert in Manpower Development and Training.

FALKLAND ISLANDS

The Bahá'ís of the Falkland Islands planned and executed a most attractive display to celebrate UN Day in 1969. The exhibit was arranged in the Secretariat Building and was up for two weeks. The Bahá'í efforts were the first approach to a UN Day observance in fifteen years.

INDIA

Twenty-four Bahá'í communities in India celebrated United Nations Day in 1969...Bahá'í speakers were featured at meetings which drew an attendance of over 3,000 people.

SWAZILAND

Almost 300 people attended a United Nations Day celebration in Swaziland. Sponsored by the Bahá'í community, it was held in the assembly hall of the Agricultural College. A representative of the U.N. Development Programme outlined the aims and purposes of the United Nations...The private secretary to the Prime Minister spoke on 'Why Swaziland joined the United Nations'. The last speaker, Mr. Ben Dlamini, a Bahá'í, presented the benefits of forming a United Nations Association, a suggestion which was received enthusiastically. A steering committee was appointed. It consisted of three Bahá'ís, the Editor of the Swaziland Times, the professional photographer for the Department of Public Information, and the private secretary to the Prime Minister.

United Nations activities were also reported from Italy, Kenya, Liberia, Malaysia, N. Zealand, Pakistan, Paraguay, Taiwan and Uganda.

TRAVEL TEACHING IN AFRICA

My attempts at pioneering to Africa having landed me in the Hebrides I could hardly believe the wonderful request that I make a trip to some of the French-speaking territories of Africa in my summer holiday. I was to make a teaching/deepening trip to Chad, Dahomey, Niger and Mali.

After a visit to the Guardian's grave in London I flew to Paris and then on over the Sahara to Fort Lamy, Chad, where I was to stay with the Morgans, a wonderful American couple who have been pioneering since 1958 in Vietnam, Cambodia, Uganda and now, since two years ago, in Chad — one of the hottest, most cutoff and least 'developed' of the African countries.

Dempsey Morgan spoke no French on his arrival and speaks little now. Adrienne speaks rather more. They have put up with great hardship since their arrival there. There was not a single Bahá'í there when they arrived. When I got there there were over 2,000 of whom more than 1,000 are in the city itself, the remainder being in neighbouring villages. There is a high degree of unemployment and poverty, and there are no addresses which makes communication most tricky.

The receptivity of the Chadians is amazing. There are no mass meetings, no publicity — rarely groups of more than a dozen or fifteen at a time. Most of them declare at their first fireside, in which it is normally explained how Bahá'u'lláh is the Promised One and that his purpose is unity. This they understand because they need it. Firesides are every day between 8 and 10 a.m. Nearly all the declarants are young, Muslim and Christian alike. Travel is by foot, hired bicycle or for more distant villages a hired seat in a lorry. The work is wonderful and exhausting. Able teachers and funds are minimal in so fruitful a field. I spent most of my time visiting different districts of the town by bicycle accompanied by a wonderful Congolese Bahá'í; Monsieur Valentin. Despite my pills, I spent my last week with a fever. I was becoming to feel acclimatised.

I then flew down through Cameroon and over to Lagos where I spent two nights and had a brief consultation with the National Teaching Committee there before arriving at Porto Novo in Dahomey where I spent one hectic week with the dear Pioneers from Haiti visiting nine different communities, mostly already possessing their own L.S.A. At that time there were some 600 Bahá'ís, the majority in the villages. They are wonderful and their meetings are so joyful. Dahomey is tom-tom land and they will dance and play their drums for hours and are so endearing and responsive. Again the possibilities seem to be only limited by lack of teachers and funds. We had nearly 100 declarations in that week.

Reluctantly I left them to fly to Niamey, capital of Niger on the river of that name. This is virtually an all Muslimcountry. The two Persian pioneer families (Sadiqzaheh and Djoneidi) gave me a wonderful welcome. There were about 50 Bahá'ís in Niamey, but most were from Dahomey or Togo and of Christian background. After consultation we agreed to experiment with teaching in the all-Muslim villages near Niamey, where little or no French is spoken. This we did and established beyond doubt their genuine receptivity. Niger's first two villages were opened, all with young new believers. At one we even spoke to over 100 men at their mosque. We also had deepening sessions in Niamey with storytelling and music. They were truly happy days which proved the great potential in Niger.

There were only three days left to me in Bamako, capital of Mali, still on the River Niger, South of Timbuctoo. Mali is virtually virgin territory, like Niger, all Muslim. It had two local believers and a single, retired Belgian lady pioneer, quite new to the Faith herself.

I touched down at Ouagadougou in Upper Volta and who should get on but Shidan and Susan Kouchekzadeh on holiday from their pioneer post in Sierra Leone. We could not believe our eyes!— and they were going to Bamoko, so we travelled together and stayed in the same hotel. The main feature of this visit was a public meeting at which the claims of Bahá'u'lláh were very clearly stated and related to Islam and were well-received by an audience of about fifty. There were two further declarations, both by young men who already knew of the Faith.

Reluctantly I boarded my plane to leave French-speaking Africa, so full of promise; if only they can have more pioneers and teachers, literature and funds.

The work in these territories is endless, exhausting, full of difficulties and often sickness, but very rewarding.

I visited the Guardian's grave upon my return to ask God's blessing on the fruits of my trip and on those heroic and steadfast pioneers and the receptive and dear souls in these countries.

P.S. In a letter since received from Niger, following the visits of Hands of the Cause Enoch Olinga and Dr. Mohajer, their goals for this Ridvan are to have one village completely Bahá'í; one 50% Bahá'í; to open nine new villages each with two declarations, a total of 200 declarations and to send two travelling teachers to the interior of the country (there were no travelling teachers when I was there). On top of that they have to develop the Fund, acquire a Bahá'í Centre in Niamey and start to attempt to get the Faith officially recognised.

HAZIRATU'L-QUDS

This name for the Local or National Bahá'í Headquarters literally means 'The Sacred Fold', and should always be used in full. 'Hazira' means 'a stable'!!



EALING, BAHA'I COMMUNITY

With forty-five other floats, this display, constructed by members of the Ealing Bahá'í Community, was drawn through the streets of Hanwell. The word 'Bahá'í' was seen by many thousands of people and the Ealing Assembly feels that their teaching work will have been enhanced by so much publicity. The float is dismantled and the Ealing Bahá'ís will be glad to lend it to any other community which might be able to make use of it.

NEWS FROM THE COMMUNITIES

ABERYSTWYTH A local assembly has to be established here by Ridvan 1971, and at the end of September the Maude family were joined by Miss Helene Momtaz, so bringing the total of adult believers to three. Weekly firesides are held which are well attended, but many extra activities are planned for the autumn and winter in an effort to stimulate further interest in the Faith amongst the people of the town. Nora Maude offered a slide show to local Women's Institutes entitled 'Round the World with the Bahá'is' and has been placed on a list of speakers which is circulated to the fifty-seven Women's Institutes in the county. Women's Institutes do not accept talks on religion or politics, but if a slide show offered is of the 'travel' type it is acceptable.

BERMONDSEY Under a prominent headline — "Religious movement pays the price of enthusiasm" a London local newspaper recently carried an article about the Faith, an extract from which follows:— "A group of Bermondsey people who joined a religious movement have broken up — because they were sc enthusiastic! The members of the Bahá'í Faith decided to travel to other parts of the country to start new groups."

HARINGEY Jagdish Saminaden, chairman of Haringey Local Assembly, London, interviewed Meherangiz Munsiff of Wandsworth Local Assembly on the programme 'London calling Mauritius', of the BBC Overseas Regional Service, on the ideal of Justice which the Bahá'ís are striving to establish in the world and sent her greetings to the Friends in the Indian Ocean who were holding their Oceanic Conference in Rose Hill, Mauritius.

From the Oceanic Conference, Board Member from India, Shirin Bowman, sent this message. "It was indeed very wonder ful to have a representative from London in the person of R. Runganailaloo of Haringey. We are sure he carried the spirit and the great success achieved at the Oceanic Conference. He will surely convey all that he witnessed but he cannot fully describe the joy and the spiritual atmosphere which prevailed and ended in 170 friends offering their services as pioneers. Dear Friends, please pray at the resting place of the beloved Guardian for the success of these pioneers. Much Love, Shirin Bowman."

LEICESTER One Sunday in September some of the Leicester friends met together at their centre to say the Remover of Difficulties 500 times. It took them an hour and fifty minutes and their reason was to pray for the achievement of the goals of the Nine Year Plan.

LONDONDERRY The Londonderry Group has lost four new declarants who had to move away for various reasons, and the group was reduced to FOUR again just after the BAHA'I EXHIBITION held earlier this year. Great publicity was achieved during the Exhibition — Linda Marshall spoke in schools and judged a local beauty contest. Since then the

Bahá'í Centre was involved in a fire, but was protected by the Grace of Bahá'u'lláh. Unfortunately we cannot return until early next year. The Group must be brought to Assembly status by Ridvan 1971; at present a pioneer and a declaration have brought our number to SIX. We await with great happiness the arrival of another pioneer and soon we hope to form our beloved local spiritual assembly.

SHREWSBURY Group held an exhibition over nine days, as a result of which there were three declarations and some fifty books were sold. At a public meeting, addressed by Philip O'Brien, about twenty-five non-Bahá'ís attended. There was good publicity and 5,000 leaflets were distributed.

SUTTON COLDFIELD On three occasions during the past months, Sutton Coldfield have held events in Sutton Park. One of these days, a sports day and picnic, saw a gathering of over forty adults and children enjoying themselves. The friends from Birmingham and Stafford have joined us, together with some of their 'contacts', two of whom remarked how happy Baha'is are when they are together. We hope for more such events in the future.

WANDSWORTH On the 26th July the Wandsworth Assembly held a small gathering at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Munsiff for some of the new believers in London to meet one of the oldest surviving Bahá'ís in this country, Mrs. Isobel Slade. Mrs. Slade who is now ninety-six years old, lives just outside London with her family, and very rarely gets the chance to meet other Bahá'ís. so the Assembly arranged to transport her by car.

She spoke clearly and wittily about how she became a Baha'í and of the people she knew who have already become part of Baha'í history, names like Lady Blomfield, Mr. Asgarzadeh, Dr. Lotfullah Hakim, Dr. Esselmont, Miss Ethel Rosenburg, Effie Baker, Fugita and Martha Root. Mrs. Slade, the daughter of a parson, first heard of 'Abdu'l-Bahá at a time when she felt that the spirit of Christianity was dying out and a new prophet must have come in the East. Later she heard about the Baha'í Faith in detail and after reading what little literature there was available in those days, accepted the Faith. At that time there was no question of signing a declaration card; she was invited to write to 'Abdu'l-Bahá. Her pilgrimage came at the crucial time between the death of 'Abdu'l-Bahá and the emergence of the Guardian as head of the Faith, and she vividly recalled her meeting with the Greatest Holy Leaf.

Her memory is almost perfect and she was able to speak, apart from a short break for tea, for about one and a half hours, virtually one minute for every year of her life. Her sense of humour and depth of understanding of human nature inspired the friends present.

It is hoped that other assemblies will discover that these rare and precious souls, of whom few are still with us in this world, can give such inspiration and pleasure, and will in return give them the chance to meet the fruits of their fortitude and steadfastness.

THE TRAGIC LOSS OF A VALIANT PIONEER

At a time when a small band of Bahá'ís of the Republic of Ireland have been struggling to build up the two new Spiritual Assemblies of Cork and Limerick, essential to the establishment of their National Assembly, the Hand of Providence suddenly robbed them of one of their most dedicated and self sacrificing pioneers — Stan Wrout.

When the call for Pioneers was raised at the Teaching Conference in Birmingham, Stan - a relatively new Bahá'í - was the first to respond.

Filled with a spirit of faith, trusting in Bahá'u'lláh, ne gave up his job in London and, in the month of May 1970, pioneered to the small city of Limerick where the prospects of employment are not good. With great confidence he persevered day after day in search of a job, but did not live long enough to find one.

On August 9th the police found his motor-bike and clothes and some personal belongings, among them his prayer book, the Hidden Words and Bahá'í pamphlets, beside a deserted beach on the south side of the Shannon estuary where he had been spending a short holiday touring the countryside. Being a poor swimmer at a place where the currents are known to be strong he was drowned. His body was washed up a week later on the north side of the estuary at a place near Kilbaha.

Grieved with this tragic loss, almost the entire Irish Community attended his funeral at the Kilbaha Cemetery situated on an open field beside the Ocean. Those who attended this Bahá'í funeral can never forget the spiritual atmosphere which was created in that beautiful spot.

No doubt those who, centuries ago, called this place Kilbaha (many towns in Ireland begin with the word 'Kil' — meaning church) were inspired to do so. And now this small village has been immortalised through this miraculous act of God.

Stan was a believer of outstanding qualities. His devotion and love for Bahá'u'lláh, his steadfastness in the Faith, his soul which radiated love and sincerity and his courteous manner derived from a high degree of humility and self-effacement which so well characterised him — all these endeared him so much to his Irish friends that his memory shall, for ever, be treasured in their hearts and his name immortalised in the annals of the Faith as an exemplary pioneer who died in the service of Bahá'u'lláh.

But this was no death - this was VICTORY!

He was a simple chap, Stan; sterling, so rare, honest. Quiet, determined for the right, he left his home — Farewell, awhile, to Pat — to pioneer for God; Settled in Limerick town to strengthen the Baha's.

Unintroduced, there were, of course, difficulties: no work — Or none with chance of a quick start — for English; And his accent, ways and dress marked him that, There on the West's frontier with deep Shannon.

Ireland accepted, Shannon took him, one August day; Tragic and far too soon. He left a note 'Few days round Kerry on the scooter'. The weather hot; He never came alive from the green water.

Nine frantic days — his bike and clothes found by the Guards — And what housed Stan's indomitable soul washed up By ocean's fringe, Loop Head, quick for near grave.



BAHÁ'Í DISPLAY AT THE WELSH NATIONAL EISTEDDFOD

For the fourth time in five years a Bahá'í stand was erected at the Welsh National Eisteddfod held this year in Ammanford, Carms. An estimated 50,000 people from all corners of Wales, and many from overseas, attended during the six days' cultural festival, and many hundreds of these passed by each day. The display, which was designed to be very bright and colourful, yet simple and direct in its message, attracted continuous and sustained interest. The sympathetic approach and keen interest shown by many enquirers each day brought great joy to those Bahá'ís who were privileged to help in manning the display. It seemed to us to be a confirmation of the words from the Universal House of Justice that people will now begin to be prepared to listen more than has been the case in the past.

A bounty for which we had hardly dared to hope was vouchsafed within a few hours of opening, when a twenty-year old youth from Llanelli came to ask for more information. He had first heard of this Revelation from Margaret Metcalf, our pioneer in Llanelli, some twelve months previously. After one brief hour's conversation he asked for, and signed, a declaration card.

The eye-arresting centre-piece of the display was a wall-paper merchant's display machine which had been converted to show thirty-five consecutive statements about the Faith. A very large number of those who passed by paused to read this four minute programme through from start to finish, and most of them were seen to help themselves to a 'Questions and Answers' leaflet from the adjacent stand.

A fireside gathering in the tent for each of three evenings was well supported by young people, some of whom are now continuing their investigations into His Cause. Altogether a most rewarding and heart-warming week of continuous teaching.

Committies and assemblies who are anticipating the staging of a shop window or other display may do well to consider the use of our 'Bahá'í-o-scope'....it really is most effective, and it would be a pity for such a valuable but extremely effective teaching medium to remain in idleness. - AYLESBURY Unfortunately, the National Assembly were most regretfully obliged to withhold recognition of the Aylesbury Assembly last Ridvan following queries on residence. This means, therefore, that Ayelsbury, who have a total of seven Baha'ís at present, need another two by Ridvan, 1971.
- BANGOR (which comes under the jurisdiction of the E.G.C. although it is in Wales) This community is strengthened by the arrival of Mina Rowshan (now Mrs, Kevin Beint). It is hoped that Richard St. Barbe Baker will be visiting Bangor during his tour of Wales and there is no doubt that with Mina and Kevin establishing a Bahá'í home there will be plenty of activity in the coming months. The goal for Bangor is to achieve Assembly status by Ridvan, 1972.
- CHELMSFORD This young community is truly full of the love and spirit of Bahá'u'lláh and held their first Weekend School on the 26/27 September. They have been delighted to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Behrouz and family from Iran which brings the total of Bahá'ís there to five adults and two youth. It is hoped that the London Communities in particular will give these friends all the assistance they can with their teaching work to enable them to form their Assembly by Ridvan, 1971.
- CARLISLE This continues to be a thriving community with a total of seven Bahá'ís. They are also assisted in their teaching work by the friends from Burnley, Kendal and other surrounding communities and are well on the way to achieving their assembly by next Ridvan.

If you turn back to the last 'Baha'i Journal' (July/August 1970) you will see that donations from the L.S.A.s and individual believers need to reach the sum of £16,580, as a minimum to keep the work of the Cause going. Now, if you look again at the statement above, you will see that donations for 5 months total £4,669,17.11. This means that we are behind our target by £2,238.8.9 for the five months of this financial year. This is a serious position, and again we appeal to every single believer to search his heart, and turn his or her thoughts to the words of the Universal House of Justice when they made the plea for us all to give until it hurts. Already the National Assembly has shared with you fully the position, and really, to keep the Fund solvent, it need not 'hurt' as much as all that, but it does need Universal Participation, for if each of us give what we can, the fact we are all participating in this precious way to our beloved Cause, will result in tremendous happenings. The very act of every single sould taking part releases wonderful powers.
