621 MORE PIONEERS NEEDED

To all National Spiritual Assemblies

Dear Baha'i Friends,

All National Spiritual Assemblies have been aware of the urgency of our Ridvan 1969 message to the Baha's of the world when the call was raised for pioneers to settle in territories in need of pioneer support or as yet unopened to the Faith, and have been cognizant of the emphasis which was placed on the need for the believers to arise quickly to ensure the success of the Nine Year Plan in the pioneer field.

Since that call was raised, no less than 330 of the pioneer posts in the 184 specified territories in the globe have been filled, and in a few of those territories additional pioneers have arrived to supplement the ranks of Bahá'u'lláh's followers at those posts.

As you will note from the attached list showing the current status of pioneer goals, some 417 pioneers must yet arise and settle in the posts previously assigned. After a recent review of pioneer needs we find it is necessary to call upon the valiant, constantly-swelling community of believers throughout all continents to fill yet another 204 pioneer posts where manpower is desperately needed, in some territories in order to win the minimum number of Assemblies or localities called for in the Plan, and in

others where vast new mass teaching areas have been opened to the Faith, thus necessitating additional reinforcements who must arrive soon if the precious gains are to be retained. These 204 new pioneer goals have been assigned to specific National Spiritual Assemblies.

Despite the magnitude of this undertaking and the grave challenge which your communities face in ensuring the homefront goals, we are compelled to point out that each of these goals assigned must be considered as a minimum requirements. Pioneers unable to go to the goals assigned by their own National Spiritual Assembly should be encouraged to fill goals assigned to other National Assemblies. Of course a self-supporting believer is free to settle as a pioneer in any country he chooses.

We call upon the friends to act promptly and decisively in this vital international undertaking in which the followers of Baha'u'llah are, in all continents of the globe, summoned to participate. The time is short and the effort required is truly formidable.

We shall offer ardent prayers at the Holy Shrines, supplicating that the waves of pioneers required to complete this urgent task of the present hour shall arise and quickly rush forth into the arena of service.

Although this call went out to all National Assemblies in August we did not in Britain receive delivery of it and it has only just reached us. No new assignments have been given in this letter to the British Baha'í Community so the full list of all the new goals is not being published. Our own goals are extracted for the friends again to study and meditate upon. Any overseas pioneer offer for any territory should be made to the Overseas Goals Committee. Words are not used lightly by the Universal House of Justice and "...time is short..." Offer now, it may take some considerable time from the actual offer to the final settlement but it is important to set the process in motion as quickly as possible.

PROCLAMATION - AT LAST

At long long last, after two years of working to overcome many obstacles, the Proclamation activities have started in earnest.

Books have been presented to the Prime Minister, Edward Heath; leaders of the Labour and Liberal parties, Harold Wilson and Jeremy Thorpe; Foreign Secretary, Sir Alec Douglas-Home; Historian, Arnold Toynbee; Cardinal Heenan; Roy Jenkins; Cccil King; former Minister of Education, Mr. Short; Mr. Penry Jones and many others are being given weekly as we go to print. A formidable list of other 'leaders of thought' is being systematically worked through, draft letters to arrange presentations are available for assemblies and groups, specimen press releases are available, special tours are being arranged for people with publicity value, and a full report for discussion on this subject will be featured at Teaching Conference.

THE GATHERING MOMENTUM

A letter, addressed to the British Baha'i Youth, but of great import for every believer, from Hand of the Cause, William Sears.

Beloved friends and co-workers:

Margaerite and I have just returned from a five month trip which has carried us to fourteen countries with most of our time spent in Persia, the Cradle of our Faith. During our travels, we remembered the Bahá'í Youth in your area with special prayers at all the holy places associated with our wonderful Cause, beginning in your own region with prayers at the Resting Place of our beloved Guardian. We said prayers on your behalf in each of the three holy Shrines in Israel, at the House of the Báb in Shiraz, the House of Bahá'u'llán in Teheran, in Tabriz, the site of the martyrdom of the blessed Báb, at Maku, Chiriq, Badasht, Shaykh Tabarsi, and at the other sacred places made famous by those unique souls, the Dawn-Breakers of this glorious Age.

I remembered the many happy and exciting hours we spent together when I had the bounty of travelling through your Region. As I looked over my notes, I was impressed again by the many wonderful things our beloved Guardian said about your part of the world, and the victories that were almost within your grasp. Our prayers were said in hopes that this would be the year in which those victories would become a reality. As the Bahá'í Youth are saying in many parts of the world: "Let's Get It Done in '71!" This seems to be the year for Homefront victories on every front.

Imagine! 35 territories in the Baha'i world have achieved all of their Local Assembly Goals for the Nine Year Plan. 108 territories have achieved all of their locality goals, including some Iron Curtain countries! There are now nearly 40,000 centres in the Baha'i World! All of these were achieved five months ago when reported at Ridvan 1970, and were given to me to share with the friends at the Oceanic Conference in Mauritius Island. By now these figures are 'obsolete as the mighty 'radiant army of Baha'u'llah' marches on toward unprecedented victories, What a thrilling message it would be if at Ridvan 1971, your National Spiritual Assembly, the 'heroic Generals' of the Nine Year Plan directing this all-important management in your Region, were to cable the World Centre: "All Homefront Goals won in British Isles!" Next Ridvan we shall have over 100 National Spiritual Assemblies representing over three hundred countries, territories, and islands. What a thrilling commotion it would stir in the Baha'i world if the majority of them were to report their Local Assembly and locality goals all accomplished on that historic occasion with two full years of the Plan still to go! The momentum is gathering rapidly. May the Youth of the British Isles increase its intensity.

In 1939, the beloved Guardian promised to you a 'harvest unexampled in its abundance and glory', a gradual victory that has been gathering speed since the first seeds of our world-redemptive Faith were sewn in your area well over half a century ago. Why should not this be the year when these smouldering embers burst into flame?

In closing this letter of love and appreciation, I share with you again these messages which we shared and discussed in those happy days together in 1968, messages written by the beloved Guardian's secretary on his behalf to each one of you in the British Isles:

"His unfailing guidance will be vouchsafed to them in direct proportion to the degree of their consecration to their task, and the perseverence, the courage and fidelity they will display as they discharge their duties." (June 12, 1952)

"No time or effort should be wasted. All, young and old, must be aroused to a new consciousness of their collective responsibilities. A greater measure of self-sacrifice, a greater audacity, a greater reliance on the sustaining grace of Baha'u'llah, are required to lend the necessary impetus to the progressive unfoldment and ultimate fruition of this dynamic process..." (May 29, 1946)

"Now that the British believers see tangible results of their labours and perseverance taking shape, they should feel encouraged to make new sacrifices; a little effort on our part is so richly blessed by Bahá'u'lláh – we can only wonder what the rewards would be for a great, concerted, truly inspired effort by all members of the community." (February 26, 1944)

Beloved co-workers, colleagues, and fellow believers, why shouldn't we have that "great, concentrated, truly inspired effort by all members of the community" this year? We hold the destiny of the Cause of God in the palm of our hands in these wondrous Isles. We should never feel discouraged or dispirited by our limited numbers, or the huge mass of skeptical unbelieving people that surround us. The beloved Guardian wrote to you, in the British Isles, these marvellous words of encouragement and inspiration, saying: "This is perhaps what is most glcrious about our present activities all over the world, that we, a band not large in numbers, not possessing financial backing or the prestige of great names, should, in the name of our beloved Faith be forging ahead at such a pace, and demonstrating to future and present generations that it is the God-given qualities of our religion that are raising it up and not the transient support of worldly fame and power. All that will come later, when it has been made clear beyond the shadow of a doubt that what raised aloft the banner of Báha'u'lláh was the love, sacrifice and devotion of His humble followers and lives." (June 20, 1942)

Let us show the world what a "change" His, Bahá'u'lláh's, teachings have "wrought in our hearts and lives" and open the doors to the hungry and thristy disillusioned masses of humanity who are waiting for our leadership. We cannot afford to wait a moment longer. We are assured of uninterrupted guidance and confirmations from on high. Let us use them now, this year, in the closing months until Ridván 1871, as instruments for the spiritual conquest of every one of these many and richly blessed islands.

"The Beloved watches over them from the Abha Kingdom," Shoghi Effendi wrote to you in the British Isles. "The concourse on high extols their achievements and will reinforce their endeavours. They should confidently, gratefully, joyously and unitedly redouble their efforts, extend the range of their activities, rededicate themselves to their historic task and anticipate a renewed outpouring of Baha'u'llah's promised blessings and favours." With warmest and tenderest love to each one of you, in our common task as soldiers battling on every Homefront for the spiritual conquest of the planet; in the service of our Universal House of Justice.

GREATLY ENCOURAGED CABLE GENEVA CONFER-ENCE. PLEASE CONVEY HANDS ALL PARTICIPANTS ASSURANCE ARDENT PRAYERS HOLY SHRINES ENTIRE BODY BELIEVERS EUROPE WILL ARISE RESPOND CHALLENGE FAST FLEETING WEEKS REMAINING PLAN REVITALISE EVERY COMMUNITY WIN EVERY GOAL DEEPEST LOVE UNIVERSAL HOUSE OF JUSTICE

We urge you to make the House of Justice's cable known to every believer in your country and to consider urgently and carefully in your Assembly and with the friends how we can all indeed respond to the "challenge fast fleeting weeks Plan". We on our part, together with the Auxiliary Board Members, will do our best to call the attention of all the believers we meet to this message and will help in every way we can to fulfil the goals.

ATTENDANCE AT NINETEEN DAY FEASTS

It would appear that the statement of the Universal House of Justice that "...the non-Bahá'í should be made welcome" is being given, in some communities, over emphasis and a subsequent phrase, "...it is much better to avoid such problems where possible..." is being overlooked. (Ref. 'Bahá'í Journal', No. 200, Page 3).

The Guardian said,

"...concerning Nineteen Day Feasts...as to non-Bahá'ís attending, this should by all means be avoided,...a Bahá'í should not invite a non-Bahá'í to attend..."

The National Spiritual Assembly considers that this principle of noninvitation applies equally to every part of the Feast. Even if a non-Bahá'í is waiting in an adjacent room, the believers may feel under some compulsion to hurry their consultation rather than keep the friend or relative waiting, thereby restricting their freedom.

The Guardian wrote:

"If it seems essential to expose non-Bahá'í relatives or close contacts to the spirit that should prevail at the Nineteen Day Feast, special meetings can be arranged for such purpose, wherein there could be a beautifully arranged period of devotion followed by sociability, with all members of the community in attendance."

Additional Note

It is still found that some hosts, when selecting the readings for the devotional part of the Nineteen Day Feast, use excerpts from the Baha'i Holy Writings which include passages on various specific teachings. The beloved Guardian made it quite clear that the readings for the Feast should be only the prayers and mediations for the central figures of our Faith. He then said,

"...if after this, there is a period of reading the teachings, his (the Guardian's) writings may be included, but this does not form part of the devotional aspect of the meeting..."

"LET THE SPIRIT FLOW INTO THE ENTIRE COMMUNITY"

"When criticism and harsh words arise within a Bahá'í community, there is no remedy except to put the past behind one, and persuade all concerned to turn over a new leaf, and for the sake of God and His Faith refrain from mentioning the subjects which have led to misunderstanding and inharmony. The more the friends argue back and forth and maintain, each side, that their point of view is the right one, the worse the whole situation becomes.

When we see the condition the world is in today, we must surely forget these utterly insignificant internal disturbances, and rush, united, to the rescue of humanity. You should urge your fellow-Baha'is to support you in a strong effort to suppress every critical thought and every harsh word, in order to let the spirit of Baha'u'llah flow into the entire community, and unite it in His love and His service.''

SCIENTOLOGY

The National Spiritual Assembly wish to share with the Friends some guidance from the World Centre, shared with us by the Continental Board of Counsellors in Europe.

"...it (Scientology) definitely appears to be one of those types of organisations with which the Baha'is should not become involved and which they should not waste their time upon."

THE KEEPING OF RECORDS AND ARCHIVES:

Some time ago the National Spiritual Assembly produced a memorandum for national committees on the keeping of records and archival material. It is reproduced below as a permanent guide to local assemblies and their committees and for all new national committees.

At the end of each year the committee should ensure that all relevant material is available for the coming year:

- i) Copies of all letters from the Universal House of Justice received over the past ten years.
- Minute Book or a set of file minutes for the past three years.
- iii) Copies of all letters from the National Assembly which refer to matters still relevant, over the past three years.
- iv) A 'Carried Forward' file of all matters still requiring action by the committee.
- v) Any file on matters that are likely to arise again and where past experience would be useful, reduced to their essentials.

If the committee is re-appointed these items should be handed over to the new committee. If the committee is not re-appointed then the secretary should seek guidance from the National Assembly as to whether these items should be sent to any other committee.

Archives Further to this carrying forward of useful information there may be a number of items worthy of being kept as Archives. The following items should be put into a single bundle and marked: "ARCHIVES. YEAR: NAME OF COMMITTEE List of Contents", and then sent to the National Office at 27 Rutland Gate, London SW7.

- i) Minutes of all years previous to the last three, or the Minute Book when full, and a year out of date.
- ii) Any letters from Hands of the Cause, letters from outstanding Baha'is (such as early pioneers), and any letters which seem to be of a specially inspiring nature and useful for posterity.
- iii) Reports of any special events or campaigns that are not already included in the minutes.

All other material which is no longer of use as information or as Archives should be destroyed thoroughly, preferably burnt. If in any doubt about the archival merits of any items the officers of the committee should consult the National Assembly.

COMMITTEES WITH RECORDS GOING BACK FURTHER THAN 1963:

Those committees should take especial care when sorting out the older records to ensure that all material that will be of use to the Baha'i historians of the future is kept. If there is a large amount of material it may be necessary for the committee to appoint one member or person to sort the old records. The same rules as above should be followed but especial attention being taken to keep the following for Archives: Any letters from the beloved Guardian (not duplicated copies); any letters from Hands of the Cause, any letters from early pioneers and teachers; any record of the opening of towns to the Faith; letters referring to early recognition of the Faith or early opposition. Once sorted the material should be wrapped and sent to the National Office, clearly marked as above.

BAHA'I HOUSE OF WORSHIP IN PANAMA

Steadily rising into view on a 740-foot elevation, and overlooking a rapidly-developing urban area on the borders of the city of Panama, is a unique, modernistic and outstanding construction which catches the attention and incites the curiosity of all those who get a glimpse of it from the much-travelled highway connecting the cities of Panama and Colon, known as the Transisthmian Highway. This most singular building, when completed (completion projected for December 1971) will be the Baha'i House of Worship for all Latin America and will represent another monument of architectural grandeur, accentuated by elegant simplicity, colour harmony, and futuristic emphasis. It may rightly be considered a gem in the field of engineering and will not only serve to gladden the eye and warm the heart, but, most important of all, in this atmosphere of simple beauty and restful calm, the spirit of man must inevitably be lifted above the earthly and material into the very presence of the God of Life and Love, the Creator of all things. Yet more, it will be the realisation of a hopeful dream of a House of Worship for all the velievers of Latin America.

It is with some satisfaction that our Baha'i Engineer, Paul Thiele, reports that the work is progressing rapidly (in spite of unexpected delays and heavy rains) and indications are that we will meet our projected completion date of December, 1971. So far, pouring of concrete for the basic structure up to the 16-foot level balcony has been completed, as well as six of the nine sets of prestressed concrete ribs. Our goal for October is the construction of the 78foot scaffolding of angle iron and pipe, in preparation for the installation of the dome ribs and the 240-ton nine-pointed star which will form part of the ceiling pattern. When completed, the dome will rise to a height of 78 feet from the floor of the auditorium. Actually, it will start at the balcony level with a 118-foot diameter base, curving inwards to a 14-foot diameter opening into which the symbol of the Greatest Name will be placed.

After careful study and much consultation, it is anticipated that the Gunite process will be utilised for the dome construction. This is a process in which a dry concrete mix is sprayed under high pressure, simultaneously with water, over steel and wire mesh reinforcement forms. Expert supervision and workmanship have been guaranteed for this phase of the work.

It is expected that all concrete work on the basic structure will be completed by May, 1971. Interior decorating, caretaker's cottage and access road should be completed by December, 1971. The interior of this magnificent edifice will reflect truly creative artistic designs, as will be evidenced in wall slabs, interior plastering and terrazzo flooring of the 85-foot diameter auditorium.

Landscaping is under way and over two hundred palms, almond, rubber and flowering trees, donated by one of the friends, have been planted. There are still hundreds of trees to be planted as time and ground clearing permit.

With hearts full of joy and gratitude, the local friends assemble monthly at the site for prayers and brotherly fellowship. People from different parts of the world also pay visits to the site. This vast circular building, with no beginning or end, with its 9pointed star and nine entrances, seems to symbolise infinite oneness, absolute tolerance and ready admittance for all regardless of colour, race, or creed.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS



'AMATU'L-BAHA RUHIYYIH KHANUM CONTINUES HER FANTASTIC TRAVELS.

Following her very successful tour of Ethiopia, Ámatu'l-Bahá Rúhíyyih Khánum returned to Kenya to complete her tour of that country. Mrs. Violette Nakhjavani, who is accompanying Rúhíyyih Khánum on her journey, said, "It is not possible to go into the details of a tour such as this when already, in a little over four months, we have visited more than sixty-three Bahá'í localities, driven 5,000 miles and flown all over Ethiopia. However, many of the highlights are of interest and their recounting may help fulfil the second reason Ámatu'l-Bahá undertakes these arduous journeys – to stimulate the friends, young and old, to take heart and arise to spread the message of Bahá'u'lláh, particularly among the villagers and illiterates in different parts of the world.

On November 27th we returned to Kenya to complete our tour of that country. Three days later Ruhiyyih <u>Kh</u>anum delivered a public talk in one of the halls of the University of Nairobi following the reception given in her honour by the National Spiritual Assembly and the Nairobi Local Spiritual Assembly at which distinguished non-Baha'is and friends were present.

December 3rd we returned to Kampala, almost four months to the day from our arrival in Africa in August. This is not the official tour of Uganda, and Ruhiyyih Khanum has only met informally with the Kampala community, at the homes of the ever-hospitable Baha'is and attended several services at the Mother Temple of Africa. Amatu'l-Baha, however, has met with Hand of the Cause, Enoch Olinga and some of the members of the Continental Board of Counsellors, as well as members of the National Spiritual Assembly, and planned her next move, which will take us overland in the Land Rover through the Congo, Central African Republic, Chad, Gabon, Niger, Dahomey and Togo to Ghana. Counsellor Oloro Epyeru is accompanying us, at least as far as Fort Lamey in Chad. It is a long trek, a jump into the unknown, but we are confident that Baha'u'llah will watch over us and that as we go to serve His Cause, only that which He wishes can come to pass.

Amatu'l-Baha Ruhiyyih Khanum, accompanied by Mrs. Violette Nakhjavani and Mr. Oloro Epyeru, member of the Continental Board of Counsellors in Central and East Africa, embarked on her journey to Congo (Kinshasa), Central African Republic and Chad on January 1, 1970. In one of her recent reports, Amatu'l-Baha has said, "We left Kampal January 1st and crossed into the Congo on January 3rd where we stayed overnight in a place called Beni. From the day we left Beni until the day we arrived at Bangui (Central African Republic) we drove over fifteen hundred miles, seven full days' driving through the jungle. It was beautiful and wonderful but no-one who has not done it can conceive of the vast, never-ending spaces of the Congo in which there is NOTHING. Every now and then a mud village sprawls out along the road and then only the virgin bush again. The roads are a single track, often with a hump of grass growing down the middle for miles on end. Passenger cars are to be seen only in the 'big' towns, nothing but trucks and four-wheel drive vehicles can get over the roads in the wilderness...The Congo women are the most beautiful we have seen on this trip, very beautiful."

In **Chad** she met pioneers Adrienne and Dempsey Morgan and Bill Davis. Of **Niger** she wrote,

"When we arrived after three or four days on the road (we)... have to practically dig ourselves our of the dust, everything has to be beaten, brushed and washed, and it takes us hours to do it. Our insides are also coated with dust and that takes days to get out of our lungs and then we leave and start the whole thing all over...

Yesterday at 11a.m. we were received by the President at his residence (it was Sunday) and had a 20 minute interview...and he is an extremely nice man, much esteemed in that part of the world."

Several months after the visits described above, when she was in Canada, the following words were used about her:—

"Rúĥívyih Khánum's title 'Amatu'l-Bahá", the National Spiritual Assembly informed the friends, "means 'Maidservant of God'. When we realise that she travelled 18,000 miles prior to her visit to Canada and that she will spend a year travelling to South America and in Africa before returning to her home in Haifa, we must surely agree that her title is most appropriate."

NEWS BRIEFS

Alaska

A news bulletin, "Wind of Bahá" is specially written for believers with a limited reading vocabulary; it is very well received and here is an excerpt:

"Everyone talked about what the Indians do for the Bahá'í Faith. They remembered that 'Abdu'l-Bahá, the Servant of God, called upon the Indian and Eskimo people to give light to the world. No one else is telling us, but God is calling us. Many Indians are working hard. They are going to Bahá'í Feasts and meetings. They are listening with their ears and their hearts and then telling other pople about the love of Bahá'u'llán for all men and His plan for love and peace..."

Argentina

After a teaching conference which followed the La Paz Continental Conference a group of people left to reach several large concentrations of Toba Indians, a tribe not yet contacted. This group included a local believer aged seventy-five and a boy aged nine with his mother. Twenty new localities were opened and in one week the total membership of Argentina was doubled.

Australia

Last January, Australia held its first National Teaching Conference. Two newly enrolled aborigines were amongst the 131 believers who attended from Australia, Soloman and New Hebrides Islands. There were six pioneer and four travel teaching offers.

Belize

A most successful series of activites to support United Nations was carried out by the National Proclamation Committee. They included a poster contest in secondary schools with a camera and air trip as prizes; a variety show in the largest theatre with much publicity giving the Bahá'ís credit for the event; whilst a soloist sang 'People who need People' full screen slides of Bahá'í world gatherings were shown. The show's proceeds went to UNICEF Children's Fund and the Minister of Education arranged for pictures to be forwarded to the U.N. to show what the Bahá'ís were doing; good radio and press publicity was obtained.

Botswana

Now has its own Newsletter, half in English and half in Tswana. The youth in this country are particularly active and following a National Youth School they visited some local villages. Altogether nine villages witnessed meetings when a total of 683 people heard of the Faith. Two exciting cables were received in September, 1970.

"First Shua Bushwoman embraced Faith Baha'u'llah to-

- day leaves to teach her people in the desert."
- "First of Kgalagadi people desert nation akin Tswana accept Bahá'u'lláh."

Brazil

It is believed that mass teaching has started amongst the 'Campesinos' in Fortaleza. Forty-one new believers were enrolled by four teams of teachers on a Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning. Other work was proceeding apace in different parts of Brazil and on September 12, when the National Assembly was in session, a telephone call advised them that the total Bahá'í membership of Brazil had almost doubled since Ridvan.

Canada

News of tremendous victories come from all parts of the country. Eskimos expected to enter 'by troops'.

So great was the success in the Yukon that when a drive was made to find thirty-nine new believers to achieve their goal, a total of sixty-eight were enrolled. The July/August Canadian Baha'i News with its entirely 'new look' dedicated its first one and a half pages to the visit of 'Amatu'l-Baha Ruhiyyih <u>Kh</u>anum, and a whole page, 17" x 11", to new declarations. The September issue contains a half page chart which shows in an unusual way the relationship of the many national committees to each other and to the National Spiritual Assembly.

Cocos Island

Nine Year Plan goal achieved by settlement of Australian pioneer, Keith Brown.

Colombia

Thirty-five native travelling teachers opened twenty-four new localities and enrolled 1500 new believers.

Congo (Kinshasa)

After a few Pygmies had accepted the Faith at an Institute, a group of Baha'is left for some of the Pygmy villages, singing hymns to Baha'u'llah as they went. As they passed through one village on the way the Chief said, "You go to see the Pygmies who live beyond my territory to tell them good news, why don't you come to me?" They did.

December 1970

Cook Island

Although over fifty years of age, Mr. Peni Tut'ila had never left Tonga until he set out on a travel teaching trip to Cook Islands.

Dominican Republic

A young mother of three children is the first woman to be elected Chairman of a Local Spiritual Assembly. She is Mrs. Paulino of San Fransisco de Macoris.

Ecuador

A woman of 100 years old recently accepted the Faith in a massive teaching campaign which opened many new areas, won recruits from a new tribe and enrolled over 1000 new believers.

Finland

Extensive publicity given to Linda Marshall's visit was followed by a Public Information Day on the Faith. It began at 10 a.m. and lasted until 5 p.m. So many guests came that at times people had to wait at the door for a seat. Some visitors waited all day, listening from morning to evening.

Guatemala

About 1000 people are receiving the Baha'i Correspondence Course.

Germany

Early this year sixty-two newspapers mentioned the Faith in sixty-nine articles during a two-month period. This compares with ninety articles during the whole of the preceding year. With a reading public of about seven million it is possible that during those two months more than 10% of the population could have read of the Faith.

India

So much news comes from India, it is even impossible to give the headlines but of particular note was a 'Civic Address' given by the Municipal Council of Kanakapura to the National Spiritual Assembly when it met in Bangalore. This address remarks on the coming of the Faith to that area, praises the Teachings, calls it a 'noble Faith' and refers to the goal of uniting mankind. It continues, "...We, the Municipal Council, and the people of Kanakapura, request the National Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of India to enlighten us further as to how we could co-operate in achieving this noble goal..." The magazine, 'Goa Today' recently featured on its cover three Baha'i young ladies, one a medical student and the others science students. An article dealt most favourably with the Faith and concluded: "If the people of Goa are not disposed to follow the Baha'i Faith, they must at least give these girls a hearing."

Italy

Nine declarations at the Summer School, the enrolment of the first San Marino believer, great publicity by Dizzie Gillespie in Palermo, and proclamation of the Faith by a Uruguayan musician who became a Baha'i in Italy all indicate a fine upsurge in the teaching spirit in this country.

Japan

After a world tour, pioneer Philip Marangella returned to Japan and the largest English language newspaper featured an excellent story of the tour. It was the first time in more than fifteen years that the Faith has obtained news space.

Laos

From the war-stricken province of Muon Phine comes the news of enthusiastic reception of the Faith, particularly through visual aids,

Philippines

Holy Days recognised at the Mindano State University and the first legal Baha'i Marriage with a large amount of publicity are amongst the exciting news items from these islands.

Seychelles

A 'flash-back' to the Congress in 1963 was made when a selection from the talk given by Hand of the Cause Bill Sears in the Albert Hall was given over the radio during a fifteen minute broadcast for World Religion Day. Wide-spread interest was aroused as a result of this broadcast,

Spain

A difficult and important goal was achieved by the declaration of a Gypsy lady, Mrs. Maria Camacho Martinez.

United States

The wonderful teaching news continues to flow in; it is estimated that sometimes as many as one thousand new Baha's enroll in a month. Many are youth and represent a wide cross-section of the people.

NEW NATIONAL COMMITTEE FORMED

A new responsibility to contact African students and visitors in these Islands, with 'the prupose of introducing the Faith to them, so that when they return to their home countries they would be at least knowledgeable about the Faith and hopefully favourably towards it, if not already converted to it...' has been given to us by the Universal House of Justice.

To the United States many years ago, the Guardian wrote,

"He hopes that wherever it is possible the believers will make every effort to contact African students and visitors, and to show them kindness and hospitality. This may not only lead to the conversion of some while in America, but will also make friends for the Faith in Africa".

To study this question, make recommendations, and to advise assemblies and groups on what might be done in this field, a new committee has been established, centred on the Cambridge area.

Komdu til Islands

Encircled by the Gulf Stream which moderates its temperature, lceland is a delightful place to visit in September.

Icelanders speak some English, Scandinavian, or German. The people are predominantly of Norse origin, but there is an admixture of Celtic and British blood. It was in 1000 A.D. that this nation adopted the Christian faith.

Iceland has long green valleys, high plateaux separated by icecapped ranges of volcanic formations, spouting geysers and hot springs in which one can bathe in the open even in mid-winter, beautiful lakes, thundering waterfalls, winding rivers and fertile meadows. There are thousands upon thousands of seabirds nesting on the ledges of the towering cliffs. Two hundred and twentyseven different species of birds have been identified in Iceland. In November, 1963 a 50-60 metre high column composed of ashes and smoke suddenly rose from the surface of the sea. A mighty volcanic eruption had begun in the ocean. Thus emerged the new island — given the name of Surtsey.

Iceland is one of the most volcanic countries in the world. In 930 the Althing (Parliament) was founded, and in 1918 Iceland was recognised as a sovereign state in a personal union with the Danish king, and in 1944 it became an independent union Republic. Iceland's famous hot springs are used to heat green houses in which vegetables, fruit and flowers are grown. They also heat some public buildings. Entire towns are heated in this way, and since 1943 most of Reykjavik has been heated by hot water from the springs.

The National Spiritual Assembly of Canada is responsible for the planning of a North Atlantic Conference to take place in the city of Reykjavik, Iceland, from September 2nd to the 5th, 1971. This is one of eight such conferences called for by the Universal House of Justice as part of the goals of the Nine Year Plan.

"...these...conferences...will doubtless demonstrate yet again the spirit of joy which pervades such gatherings of the friends and will reinforce them in their determination to seize whatever means and opportunities they may find to raise the divine call...These conferences, focal points of the love and prayers of the friends everywhere, magnets to attract the spiritual powers which alone can confirm their work, will, it is confidently hoped, be potent sources of unity, spiritual enthusiasm, and realistic planning." Universal House of Justice

NEWS FROM THE COMMUNITIES

AYLESBURY. The Buckinghamshire Herald carried a very good account of a successful public meeting in October at which Philip Hinton spoke. For the celebration of the Birth of the Bab, the community entertained twenty-one members of staff of a local school, including the headmaster, to a Persian supper, preceded by a talk about Baha'i Holy Days. A member of our community who is a student at King's College, London, distributed 600 pamphlets on the Faith with an invitation to attend an introductory meeting at which a Baha'i Society was formed.

BARNET. This community carried out a survey last May with three objectives in mind:— to spread the name of the Faith; to determine the effectiveness of advertising in local papers; to determine the proportion of people who have heard of the Faith and to acquire useful information for future teaching projects. A questionnaire was prepared and a team of eleven interviewers positioned themselves in six of the main shopping areas of the borough. Altogether 716 people were interviewed and of these 17.5% had heard of the Baha'i Faith. It was found that the public did not mind being approached and that there is no need to have trained interviewers.

BATH. Seventy Bahá'ís and their friends attended the weekend school held on October 31/November 1. The school included talks on the Covenant, Progressive Revelation and the Claims of Bahá'u'lláh, together with a slide show and a public meeting. We are particularly grateful to Edgar Boyett, who spoke at the public meeting, as he gave a most enlightening talk and had to take over at the last moment. The school was most successful and we all took away that spirit of love and unity which helps us to teach the Cause of Bahá'u'lláh.

BRISTOL. One of the believers had the misfortune to be ill and while in hospital organised two well attended meetings on the Faith, featuring the slide show 'Carmel, the Mountain of God'. One of his fellow-patients was so excited that he declared soon afterwards and his wife's declaration followed soon afterwards. Baha'i books were also presented to members of the medical staff. A Baha'i student at a Church of England teacher training college wanted to organise a World Religion Day meeting as part of the regular student prayers. As a result of this he has been asked to prepare a series of readings each term. The same student was asked to show slides of a holiday which resulted in a halfhour discussion of the Faith. This same set of slides had a similar result at a travel club. Among other activities Bristol has recently held a deepening school entirely in Persian for the benefit of the Iranian friends which was a great success. The Bristol Baha'is have subdivided their large city into forty-four community areas, following the Council boundaries, and plan to hold a meeting in each one. Finally, when they go to meetings, the Bristol Baha'is take along their own contacts - just in case there aren't any at the meeting!



CAMBRIDGE have recently had two declarations, the outward manifestation of a continuous stirring of enthusiasm for the Faith. The Local Assembly has adopted a plan to visit a nearby goal town once a week. The Baha'í Society at the University has had two meetings and will be holding a Proclamation weekend on 28/29 November. The community wishes to thank the Cardell family for the Sunday picnics which they organise during the summer, which not only bring together the Baha'í so fthe region, but provide a useful opportunity to bring together contacts.

LEICESTER were recently asked by the religious instruction teacher of a local teacher training college if a class of students might be brought to see the centre and hear about the Faith. Seventeen students, both men and women, ranging in age from teens to middle age, spent over an hour at the centre and asked many and varied questions. When they left, the Leicester Centre pamphlet shelves were bare!

LINCOLN sends out a Mayday call...they have eight Bahá'ís and have set themselves a goal of nineteen by Ridván...a public meeting is arranged for 7.30 p.m. on Saturday 9 January, the week after Teaching Conference. Arrangements have been made with the local youth hostel for beds at six shillings a head if at least twenty Bahá'ís want accommodation. If you would like to attend, and require this accommodation, please write to Mrs. Rose Alexander, 1 Woodfield Avenue, Birchwood, Lincoln. The community would also be very glad for any ideas or help you can offer them.

ST. AUSTELL with FOWEY recently held a very successful weekend school at which five adult enquirers were present. Everyone played their part and the children contributed to the programme in a delightful way. Friends came from all over Devon and Cornwall as well as Chippenham and Bath and it is hoped that as a result of this school a family may move to St. Austell.

SHREWSBURY. Recent declarations have brought the community up to nine within the civic limits, with four Bahá's outside the boundary. Alas, one of the friends within the city limits will have to leave before Ridván, leaving our numbers at eight. The Shrewsbury community is deeply grateful to Dr. and Mrs. Ta'eed and their family for their unfailing efforts in the service of the Cause. A meeting organised in Wolverhampton in November was attended by forty youth and as a result of intensive teaching work the Faith must now be known to over a thousand students of the college where the meeting was held.

SWANSEA. During the summer months, Swansea has been engaged in a number of supporting ventures. The month of May saw us in the goal town of Llanelli with three firesides a week in an empty shop hired for an exhibition. This was followed by a couple of weeks in a Swansea shop, which our whole stock of leaflets disappeared! In August we had the Welsh National Eisteddfod, where we had the pleasure of a declaration from a Llanelli boy. Three Persian boys visited Swansea for a week after Harlech Summer School and held a successful fireside in Llanelli, after spending the day touring libraries, bookshops, record shops and so on, asking for Bahá'í literature and records.

WANDSWORTH. An inter-faith service was held on United Nations Sunday at the charming old church of St. Mary the Virgin in Putney, at which the main address was given by the Rt.Hon. David Ennals and local Church of England, Catholic and Baptist officials led the congregation in readings and prayers from their individual doctrines. The chairman of the local United Nations Branch, Eruch Munsiff, read a selection from the writings of Bahá'u'lláh. About twenty-four Bahá'ís from the London area attended this service and formed about half of the small congregation, which was also attended by Mr. Hugh Jenkins, M.P. The Wandsworth Assembly was most grateful for this support which enabled them to draw the attention of the M.P. and other officials to the active interest of the Bahá'ís in the work of the United Nations.

The Wandsworth Bahá'í Ball was held again this year and was attended by Bahá'ís and their friends from all over the country. The ball was opened with the reading of a prayer after which the chairman of the Wandsworth Assembly welcomed the Mayor Mayoress, Lady Helen Nutting and Mr. and Mrs. Pat Green. After the Mayor had replied, Lady Nutting presented to him a copy of 'Bahá'u'lláh and the New Era' and Najla Baghdadi presented a bouquet of flowers to the Mayoress. An ample supply of buffet food was served all evening with coffee, and the bar was open for the sale of soft drinks.

A shop window display in the main street has attracted great attention and a weekend school was held in early November. The school was supported by about seventy of the friends, some from as far away as Nottingham, and Counsellor Betty Reed and Board Member David Lewis and his wife were present. Both these events have given opportunties .to make contact with new enquirers and we are most grateful to all the friends who helped us by manning our display and coming to our school.

MAKING CONTRIBUTIONS BY DEED OF COVENANT

A deed of covenant is a promise to pay a fixed amount annually for a period in excess of six years and such deeds are therefore normally for a seven year period.

Because the National Spiritual Assembly is registered as a charitable organisation it is not liable to tax. Any member of the Bahá'í community who pays income tax at the standard rate, which is at present 8/3d in the £ (to be altered to 7/9d on 5 April 1971), can greatly help the National Fund if they will make their donations under deed of covenant because, as a charitable body, the National Assembly is able to recover the tax you have paid from the Inland Revenue.

Thus, for each £1 of taxable income, you actually receive only 11/9d, the Inland Revenue having collected 8/3d through P.A.Y.E. or by some other form of deduction. However, Income Tax does not have to be paid on sums donated under covenant to an approved charity, so it is this 8/3d you have already paid in tax which is collected back from the Inland Revenue, for each 11/9d you give.

As you will see, this adds 70% to the amount you have actually paid out and, if widely adopted by the Friends, could add hundreds of pounds to the income of the National Fund, without their actually contributing any more money at all!

THIS TYPE OF COVENANT WE CALL 'A' TYPE CONVENANT

If you are a regular contributor to your Local Fund (Assembly or registered Group) it is possible for the National Assembly to recover the tax on this also, if you will covenant for it. The National Assembly will undertake to transfer the amount fixed by you to your Local Fund while the National Fund benefits by the tax recovered each year, thus:-

'B' TYPE COVENANT

This is another method of covenanting for those who want to give a contribution all at once instead of spreading it over seven years, and is a loan covenant. From a single donation the National Assembly recovers the tax over a period of not less than seven years. Tax is recovered each year on one-seventh of the sum donated under 'loan', thus:-

Whichever type of covenant is considered a word of warning is necessary in that the National Assembly can only recover tax from the Inland Revenue if the friend making the covenant has paid tax to the full amount recovered from the covenant. If the friend has not paid tax to the full amount, the Inland Revenue would require the friend to make up the recovered tax, and covenants, therefore, are not recommended in such cases.

MAKING A COVENANT

It is quite simple to make a covenant. The National Assembly are fortunate to have the services of John Morphew, who is a Baha'í and an accountant, to help with this work. If you are thinking of entering into a covenant, either write to John as follows:

and tell us what you wish to do, whether it be an 'A' type covenant, or 'B' type, whether it be monthly, half-yearly, or annually, and we will make the arrangements for you.

If you write to the National Treasurer, she will advise you, and pass on your query to John. If you write to John directly, he will, if you have given him all the information he requires, draw up the necessary forms of covenant for you to sign.

Any friend who would like to receive a duplicated copy of this information please send a stamped addressed foolscap envelope to the National Treasurer.

In its message to the Baha'is of the world at Ridvan 1967, the Universal House of Justice wrote:

"The House of Justice believes that the financial needs of the Cause should be met by universal participation in giving and urges National and Local Assemblies to pursue this goal with vigour and imagination, recalling to the Friends the plea of the beloved Guardian to every believer unhesitatingly, to place, each according to his circumstances, his share on the altar of Baha'í sacrifice."

Some of the Friends may feel that they have so little to give that it is too small to send to the Fund. These donations are all the more precious because of the sacrifice involved! Besides, we are all in this together — and when we can joyfully report that there is indeed 'universal participation', that the gifts to Bahá'u'lláh are flowing in, in a great stream of love from young and old, rich and poor alike "each according to his circumstances", then the Faith will grow stronger than ever before because we are achieving another unity in the world.

A Deepening School was held recently in Peterborough and was well attended. Regular monthly public meetings are held and the Friends are asked to continue to support their efforts.

YORK

There are at present four Baha'is resident in York and they continue to be actively supported by the Assemblies of Bradford and Leeds with regular meetings and Firesides. The Youth will be holding their annual Winter School in York again over the Christmas holiday and certain activities are planned to coincide with their visit.

REMOVAL OF VOTING RIGHTS

HEAVY PENALTIES SPIRITUALLY

The removal of voting rights is an administrative sanction, it is not excommunication. A believer who has had his/her voting rights removed is still a Baha'i. It is, however, a very serious step indeed. As well as being removed from the voting list, which means that the believer without voting rights is not eligible to be elected to a local assembly, or as a delegate to Convention, or to the National Assembly or the Universal House of Justice, the removal of voting rights brings other sanctions. Shoghi Effendi's guidance on this matter is to be found on p. 86 of "Principles of Baha'i Administration", under the heading "Effect of Deprivation", and reads as follows:

"Regarding the matter of believers who have been deprived of their voting rights; just as no one should ever be deprived of his voting right lightly, it should, likewise, be realised that to be deprived of it is a grave matter, and involving heavy penalties spiritually. People who have been so deprived should not be permitted to attend any meetings involving the administration of the Cause, such as an election or a Nineteen Day Feast. They can attend the Nine Holy Days however; they should not be married by Baha" Law, no money should be accepted from them, they should not be given credentials (which imply a member of the community in good standing) nor should they be used officially as teachers or speakers."

SOMETIMES NO ALTERNATIVE

The National Assembly is always reluctant to remove a believer's voting rights, and tries by every possible means, sometimes over periods of many months, to help the Friends to make the necessary adjustments in their lives so that the removal of voting rights is not necessary. When all efforts are to no avail, however, voting rights are removed. When a Law of Baha'u'llah is deliberately violated, such as the Law requiring parental consent to marriage and a Baha'i marriage ceremony, then there is no alternative but to remove the believer's voting rights. The National Assembly asks everyone carefully to note all this, especially the heavy spiritual penalties involved, for a believer without voting rights is deprived of playing a full part in Baha'i Community life, and his/her services to the Faith are very much restricted. Voting rights can be restored whenever the believer has corrected that action which was the cause of their removal, and the National Assembly always welcomes the opportunity to restore a believer's voting rights.

YOUTH NEWS

The National Youth Committee is delighted to announce the formation of the first Irish Youth Committee, which will act as an arm of the National Youth Committee. We are sure that this new committee will prove invaluable in the Proclamation of the Faith in Ireland.

The Youth Winter School will be held again this year at York, from 20 to 28 December. Any youth who has been to a large gathering such as a winter school will know that the atmosphere is electric, and leaves everyone with renewed enthusiasm to do something for the Faith. It is with this in mind that the National Youth Committee is consulting with the Goals Committees to find out what are the respective goal town priorities, so that this enthusiasm can be channelled to priority goal towns. It is hoped that groups of youth will invade various goal towns after the winter school to help with the teaching work there.

A European Congress of Youth will be held in BELGIUM from 10-13 April, 1971. Sessions will be held in English and French. More information about this exciting occasion will follow later but in the meantime, if any youth who are considering going can translate English into French, would they please contact the secretary of the National Youth Committee:

A Swiss Winter School will be held in Fiesch, Valais, Switzerland between 25 December 1970 and 3 January 1971. Sessions will be held in French and German. If anyone should require more information about this school, please contact the National Youth Committee secretary, address above. Several itineraries arranged by this Committee have now taken place. Hand of the Cause John Robarts and his wife Audrey toured the British Isles for six weeks and it is evident that there is a new spirit of prayer and dedication amongst the Friends since their visit. An outstanding example of the success of the meetings was the declaration of six new believers in Birmingham.

At very short notice Counsellor Betty Reed visited Epsom, Isle of Wight, Portsmouth, Brighton, Hove, Bournemouth, Poole, Chelmsford and Durham. She has reported successful meetings and has confirmed the "wonderful bubbling spirit throughout the community, and a lot of activity."

Two very spiritual young American Bahá's from Hawaii, Sheldon and Linda Ramer, visited various communities and their complete reliance on the Will of God was an inspiration to all those whom they met.

One declaration in Cambridge was a result of their visit.

Geoff Bridle of Peterborough had some very good meetings on his travel teaching trip to Durham, Carlisle, Kendal, Burnley, Liverpool and Kirkby. Not only was he a great help in these places, but the trip gave him new spirit and inspiration.

Richard Battrick, whilst visiting Britain from New Zealand, and before going on Pilgrimage, visited Newton Aycliffe, York, Leeds, Peterborough and Cambridge, showing some excellent slides of Bahá'ís in New Zealand and New Caledonia where his parents, Owen and Jeanette Battrick, are pioneers.

Philip O'Brien from Dublin had an excellent ten days in Eccles, Manchester, Chester, Shrewsbury, Hereford and Newport. He reports that he "couldn't be happier" with the trip and feels "completely rejuvenated". We have heard from various places that they were very pleased with his visits and Shrewsbury, in particular, want him back soon!

By next issue of the Journal we hope to have some news for you regarding a new scheme to carry out the Universal House of Justice's request that 'Systematic plans' for a 'constant stream of visiting teachers to every locality' be made. This will require the wholehearted co-operation of every Bahá'í in every Bahá'í Community which we are sure will be forthcoming.

DECIMALISATION AND PRICE CHANGES

Decimal currency

On February 15th next existing shillings and pennies will cease to be used, being replaced by the new decimal currency.

New Catalogue

In readiness for this change the Trust are preparing a new descriptive catalogue to be accompanied by a price-list giving all prices in NEW PENCE (N.P.).

All local Assemblies in the British Isles will be sent a copy FREE as soon as it is available, which is expected to be in early February; individuals will then be able to obtain copies at 10NP (2/-) each, post free.

Increased prices

Constant rapid rises in printing costs are forcing us to frequently y increase our prices so the **price-list** will be revised and issued afresh every six months.

Imported books and pamphlets

Owing to substantial rises in postage, carriage and other costs we are forced to increase the price of all imported items by 10%.

To avoid confusion and for the convenience of the friends we are postponing this increase to coincide with the change to decimal currency and, **providing we have the items in stock** so that we can despatch them before February 1st, we will not charge this extra 10% on orders **received by us** before January 10th.

Invoices

Invoices for goods despatched by us before the end of January will be priced in shillings and pence; all invoices for goods despatched by us on or after February 1st 1971 will be priced in New Pennies (N.P.).
