"All the meetings must be for teaching the Cause and spreading the Message, and suffering the souls to enter into the Kingdom of Baha'u'llah. Look at me. All my thoughts are centred around the proclamation of the Kingdom. I have a lamp in my hand searching throughout the lands and seas to find souls who can become heralds of the Cause. Day and night I am engaged in this work. Any other deliberations in the meetings are futile and fruitless. Convey the Message! Attract the hearts! Sow the seeds! Teach the Cause to those who do not know."

N.T.C. LETTER

Dear Baha'i Friends,

"Moving to Ultimate, Total and Complete Victory"

This is the theme of our Teaching Conference this year, to be held in Manchester on 6th/7th January 1962. It is the theme of our life from now on to Ridvan 1963, to ensure the gift which we shall surely lay at our beloved Guardian's feet on that day.

This is the high ideal to lead us along the road, but what of the tasks which we must accomplish as we tread the path to 'ultimate, total and complete victory'?

First, never to stop for one moment in the prosecution of our teaching plans. The Guardian has told us of the "unprecedented increase of our numbers" which will mark the closing phases of the Ten Year Crusade, and what the Guardian has said, we know full well will take place. So it behoves every one of us to be on the alert to recognise those 'waiting souls' and to bring them in to the Faith. Only by teaching can we achieve this end. "Teach ye the Cause of God, O people of Baha, for God hath prescribed unto every one the duty of proclaiming His Message, and regardeth it as the most meritorious of all deeds".

Secondly, we need pioneers. These last few months have been remarkable for the arrival of pioneers to this country from every quarter of the globe - Mauritius, Tunisia, Canada, Pakistan, Hong Kong, Malaya, as well as Persia. Even so, many places still need to be filled, and it is to the British community we now look to make the necessary sacrifices and move to those places where British Baha'is are so badly needed.

Let us remind ourselves of just what we have to do to achieve the Goals of the Crusade:-

- 1) Establish the last twelve Local Spiritual Assemblies.
- 2) Consolidate those Assemblies who have become numerically weak.
- 3) Incorporate eight more Local Assemblies.

This means that every Assembly in the country - all 48 of them - MUST be alert and vigorously working community by Ridvan 1962 in order that 19 of them may be incorporated by Ridvan 1963, and the remainder forming a strong and well-founded basis - our springboard for the future.

Finally, may we remind you of the words of our beloved Master, 'Abdu'l-Baha. He said: "The field is indeed so immense, the period so critical, the Cause so great, the workers so few, the time so short, the privilege so priceless, that no follower of the Faith of Baha'u'llah, worthy to bear His name, can afford a moment's hesitation".

Will you please come to Teaching Conference prepared with ideas and offers of help. We urge every Assembly and Group to ensure representation at this most vital Conference, in order that they can take part in preparing for our 'ultimate, total and complete victory'.

NEWS FROM IRELAND

The Dublin Weekend School was a heart-warming experience for the forty who attended. Baha'is from the north brought several non-Baha'i friends with them and among the visitors was a student from Trinity who a few days later spoke in praise of the Faith during a crowded debate at the University, and also gave Cyrus Rowshan the opportunity to say a few words.

There was a good turn-out for the consultative meeting with the N.S.A. representative, Marion Hofman, and the Dublin, Bangor and Belfast Assemblies. Many points were brought out in discussion which demonstrated the value of these meetings in the process of perfecting the administrative Institutions of the Cause, so that the world-redeeming power of Baha'u'llah may flow freely through them.

Belfast's two recent declarations were Marie Baillie who now joins her sisters, Pat and Christinz, in the Cause of God, and Joe Watson, head boy of one of Ireland's most famous schools, who hopes to enter Cambridge next year. The tempo of teaching work is increasing everywhere, and the Belfast Weekend School, arranged for 9th 10th December is expected to attract more interest than ever. Several bookshops are stocking "Thief in the Night", and a publicity campaign is being planned to promote the sale of this book.

Dr. John Lee has obtained a post in a Londonderry hospital, thus establishing a new Baha'i centre in this historic city. Lisbeth Greeves, who has already a little group of contacts there, will be putting him in touch with them on her return homefrom Australia.

TRAVEL TEACHING

One of the most helpful and enjoyable ways of teaching the Faith is by travelling and visiting the friends, the regular visits to neighbouring communities, for social as well as study purposes. LONDON is undertaking outings of omnibus proportions. Recently some 40 friends and contacts spent a day with the Canterbury friends. After a tour of the Cathedral and other places of interest in this ancient city, the party gathered together at the Friends' Meeting House for an informal discussion. Their latest 'outing' was a mass visit to Romford (their extension Goal Town) for a Unity Feast on 2nd December.

We are sure that there is more of this kind of activity going on and we would like very much to hear about it. Small communities derive so much stimulation and encouragement from the love and warmth of a large gathering of Baha'is, especially in their home territory.

Another form of travel teaching is being carried out by James Forsythe who has now completed four organised tours in which he visited 30 Assemblies and Groups in Ireland, Wales and England. We hope to plan another tour in Scotland in February or March. He has a very beautiful collection of coloured slides of his Pilgrimage for which he has prepared an excellent commentary, attractive to Baha'is and non-Baha'is alike.

Adib Taherzadeh is an indefatigable tourer - he has recently visited 7 Centres in the West and South of England. David Hofman seems tireless, as do many of our well-known and loved speakers, so much in demand. Most of them are also "Helpers" to Goal Towns and numerically weak Assemblies.

But, please, we need many more - friends who will visit a fireside, an isolated believer, or join a new community at their Nineteen Day Feast.

John Morley is visiting the West Country during this month, and Aldie Robarts and Michael Blakey are able to visit many of the friends during the course of their business travels.

We would like to take the opportunity here of expressing our thanks to Dr. Alexander Reid, until recently Secretary of the Chilean N.S.A., and now spending a few months in London. He is helping us very much in our teaching work and has already visited Reading, Cambridge and Winchester.

Visits over a period of time, probably a few days or a week or two are perhaps more difficult to arrange, but reap rich rewards. Shomais Afnan spent three weeks in Motherwell in September, helping the Group there with their intensive teaching campaign. Harry Charles is concentrating on making contacts in Salisbury. To small communities, this kind of help is invaluable, and with the Christmas holidays in view, we appeal to all those who have time to spare to consider how best it can be used in teaching the Cause.

All in all, travel teaching presents many opportunities of serving the Faith and is undoubtedly an enjoyable and rewarding experience.

STUDY INSTITUTES

Our first and most important obligation is to demonstrate to the world that spirit of unity which is to be found no where on earth except within the community of the Most Great Name. This is the meaning of consolidation - this is our most imperative goal of achievement. True unity can only be achieved through the spiritual understanding of the Covenant, through the operation of Baha'u'llah's Administrative Order, through completely living the life.

The Institute on the Covenant and Administration has therefore been devised, so that we may gain a common understanding of the true meaning of unity, that our community may become firmly consolidated.

It will be remembered that a very successful weekend was held in Oxford to study the Institute, and this experiment was followed in Edinburgh and Birmingham with varying success. The main difficulty seems to be that in order to obtain the greatest benefit from a study of this kind, it is necessary to concentrate the attention of the pupil until the end is reached. The Institute is so compiled that breaks are damaging to the sequence, and therefore complete understanding of the subject matter. For this reason, we have endeavoured to arrange suitable weekends for the complete study of the Compilation, and it takes the whole of the two days to do so. On the other hand, in some areas, sufficient friends have not been found who are able to devote the whole of a weekend, and suggestions have been made that the study be carried out throughout two consecutive Sundays, but this too has failed for lack of support.

The N.T.C. would welcome suggestions. Will those who would like to take part in a study Institute, please send their names to the N.T.C. Secretary, clearly stating whether they are willing and able to devote the whole of one weekend, or will need two separate days.
