### LONDON BÁHÁ'I YOUTH GROUP - A REPORT

The first and a very interesting activity of this Group was to organize a day-trip to Brighton on Sunday the 14th May 1950. The response was enthusiastic There were eleven persons - nine Baha'is and two nonand highly encouraging. Báhá'is - who travelled together from London in a separate compartment in a very friendly atmosphere. They were received at Brighton station by the Secretary of the Local Assembly and a Baha'i youth. En masse they invaded a small seaside restaurant, where they had a very sumptuous lunch - heavy enough to make them bask in the blazing sun on the beach, immediately afterwards. On such occasions it is necessary to feed the likes and dislikes of all the party in an accommodating spirit, and so they had a long walk along the sea front at the suggestion of some though it was hateful to two young ladies in high heels. To go to the Brighton pier and not to enjoy the many amusements it caters for, would not befit youths - so they banged one another riding the tiny electric motors. Bright sun, a happy carefree group and seven cameras stopped the crowds at many points to witness the photo-taking feats of the party. It was really a wonderful outing in all respects, of course with the necessary requisite of a prayer in the evening. They came back with the usual discomforting feeling that the day passed so swiftly but with songs on their lips.

It should be mentioned that the trip helped the local Baha'is in getting some more contacts - from the beach, from the pier and from the dance hall.
