Dear Baha'i Friends,

Never in the history of the world has a small group of peoples been honoured by God to the extent the Bahá'is are at this present time. To be bidden to hold out hope to a fear-stricken world and to help build the Kingdom of God on Earth! What a privilege! So great that it is impossible to 'take in' the immensity of it.

Permanent building must be done by adding units one to another and to each one of us is apportioned the particular unit we should work with and for. To carry out our appointed task adequately we need to recognise and accept our spiritual responsibilities, to divest our own minds of conventional thought and to re-adjust our lives to enable us to carry on that work in love and unity with our Baha'i co-workers.

Our guidance is direct. According to our Guardian's letter of February 25th, in this tiny corner of the Earth's surface our contribution to the mighty theme is made clear to us. "Propagating the Faith among the people dwelling in the British Isles through active teaching", and in the near future to take "whatever measures will facilitate the future recognition of the Faith by the civil authorities in the localities where its followers reside, and eventually by the central government in Westminster". "Within the means at their disposal." This is one of our great problems. Our Treasurer never knows in advance what means will be available. How can work be planned with the ever present uncertainty about adequate funds to carry it out?

In Persia, for some time past, a method has been used by which the members of the communities are asked to estimate the amount they will be able to contribute in the course of the year, so that a guaranteed sum is known, and can be relied on. This is entirely confidential and does not prohibit them making larger donations if they desire or circumstances make it possible to do so.

Our Treasurer will soon send out a form that we may state our contributions to the Fund. Here we should meditate over these words of our beloved Guardian:

"We must be like the fountain or spring that is continually emptying itself of all that it has, and is continually being refilled from an invisible source. To be continually giving out for the good of our fellows undeterred by the fear of poverty and reliant on the unfailing bounty of the Source of all wealth and all good - that is the secret of right living."
