Nineteen-Day Feasts' Procedure

To facilitate the entry of late-comers, and to avoid disturbance during the Devotional part of the Feast, someone will always be on duty to open the door at the end of each reading, to see whether there are any friends waiting outside. Readers should not start when the door is open. The back row of seats and the seats near the big table, will be kept empty for late-comers.

Volunteers for providing the Feast, should inform the Committee (Secretary: Mr. H. Backwell), giving alternative dates where possible. Hosts and hostesses who will sometimes be in pairs to ease the work involved, should arrive early, bringing food, and arrange assistance for washing up. Milk can usually be provided by the Committee. The drawing up of the Devotional Programme is the duty of the hosts and hostesses, but should they feel unable to carry out this duty, they should inform the Committee as soon as possible. If they so desire, they can beforehand send their proposed programme to the Committee. The readings should be of a devotional character and have a concerted theme. They must be taken only from Prayers and Scriptures. They should not exceed half an hour in length, or be much less than twenty minutes.

The co-operation of all the friends is particularly requested in carrying out this procedure.
